Cat Skins in Demand

CHRISTMAS MAIL TO COST BIG SUM

(By International News Service)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The United States government will play the role of Santa Claus to tune of about \$9,000,000 this Christmas season, in that it will cost the government approximately that amount above and beyond ordinary expenses of running the mail service to handle the 1927 Christmas mail. This figure is based upon compilations of similar additional expenditures for the previous year, with due allowance for the usual normal increase.

Last year the Postoffice Department disbursed \$8,688,215 for additional service to take care of the great volume of Christmas mail that poured into the vast postal machine from every possible source. Most of this amount was expended for salaries of additional employees. Figures for the additional income resulting from the Christmas mail rush were not announced.
