SMITH DENOUNCES DRY LAW IN TALK TO WOMEN

DENIES HE WAS IN ON MURDER

(By International News Service) MAYS LANDING, N. J., Dec. 3.—Willis Beach, jointly charged with Mrs. Margaret Lillendahl in the murder of the woman's husband, testified in his own behalf this morning and flatly denied that he had conspired with his reputed lover to murder her aged husband.

Previously Mrs. Ellen Parker, of Lynwood Heights, Pennsylvania, testified that Beach was visiting in her home on the day the state claims he confessed the crime to Samuel Barks in Baltimore.

(By International News Service) ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 3.—Gov. Alfred E. Smith, in a ringing denunciation of prohibition before the New York State League of Women Voters, said that the leaders of both major parties were guessing today.

Breaking the year's silence on this question, Gov. Smith told the women he favored the enforcement of all laws but he felt that a person had the right to oppose any legislation to which he did not subscribe.

The Democratic leader declared that in all his years as a public official, he had sustained all laws that he had sworn to uphold although he hated some of them and continued to oppose them.

BLOODY CAR AT ANGELO LEADS TO MAN'S ARREST

A bloody car, a torn shirt and a glove in the road beside some trampled bushes led to the arrest of a man by T. C. Rutledge, deputy sheriff Thursday night. The car was an old style Ford touring and was found at Randolph and 20th Street. No charges have been filed against the man.—San Angelo Standard.

FOKKER PLANE STATE RULES ON CLARK'S FEES

(By International News Service) MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 3.—The trimotored Fokker marine corps monoplane bound for Managua, Nicaragua, took off from here at 6:22 this morning. Major E. S. Brainerd, chief of the Marine Corps aviation section, was a passenger, and Sgt. N. T. Shepherd is the pilot, with Corp. N. M. Winchester as the mechanic. The aviators expect to make the 1,035-mile spin in ten hours. Most of the trip is over water.

STATE RULES ON CLARK'S FEES

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, Dec. 3.—Ex-officio fees of county clerks are limited by articles 3895 and 3932, the attorney general's department ruled today. The commissioners court may allow \$500 as ex-officio compensation as provided if the entire compensation does not exceed \$4,250, the department ruled.

SAYS CONGRESS FACES DEADLOCK

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The 70th congress faces a possibility of a paralyzing deadlock the moment it convenes, owing to a pending battle to bar Senators-Elect Frank L. Smith of Illinois, and William S. Vare of Pennsylvania. The Senate's parliamentary experts decided that no other business can be transacted until both cases are settled.

Fifteen hundred gas companies, with 2,500 gas tanks or holders, are going to use the broad, smooth steel holder-tops for aviation guide poses. Names and arrows pointing to the nearest landing fields, will be painted in orange letters on a black background; and it is expected that most or all of the signs will be illuminated for night flying. The movement was started by the American Gas Association.

It seems that the other name for gas is service; in the home, the smokeless streets, refrigeration, the air-signs now promised.

SUPREMACY OF NEWS-PAPERS RECOGNIZED

Mareoni, radio wizard, thus compares the field of radio and newspapers:

"The newspaper has this distinct advantage: It is a record. You cannot paste radio announcements in a scrapbook; newspapers put the news down in black and white.

"Of course, the radio has its advantages. A radio impulse can travel around the world in one-seventh of a second, and news can be transmitted almost instantaneously."

The newspaper cannot give the world the splendid musical programs available through the radio; but the press, he feels, will always be the big power in the world for expressing opinion by rulers and statesmen, and for the big events of news.

While the famous inventor does not exactly say it, the press is original and constructive instead of being largely a repeating agency.

The newspaperman who respects and lives up to his privileges has a power above that of kings. Even the radio is under him.

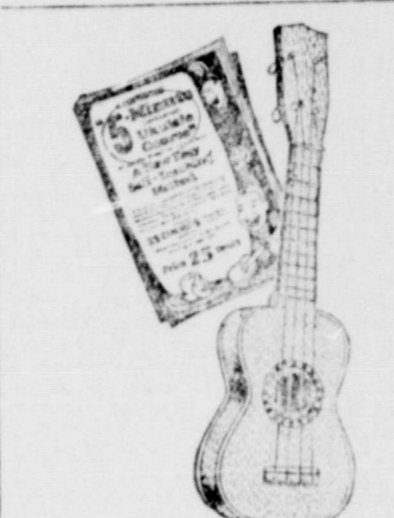

L. E. Derriberry, local aviator, said he had a hard fight against bitter cold winds in bringing the serum here.

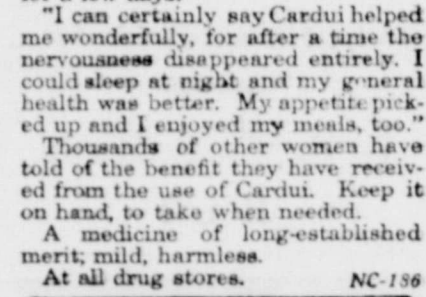
