AMUNDSEN TO LEAD ITALIA RELIEF PARTY

(By International News Service)
OSLO, June 1.—It was announced here today that Roald Amundsen and Lincoln Ellsworth, who flew over the North Pole in an airplane, will lead the international relief expedition in search of General Umberto Nobile's lost dirigible, the Italia.

In the meanwhile, relief efforts are continuing but it will require a week before the condensed and saved search gets under way.

MOSCOW, June 1.—It was confirmed this afternoon that an amateur radio station, 2-B-2 at Vladivostok, picked up an extremely weak SOS call from the lost dirigible Italia, on May 29.

This leads to the belief in some quarters that the dirigible was wrecked off the Alaskan coast.

TO START DRIVE ON MONDAY FOR CONVENTION TRIP

ULSTER CONSTABULARY HAS A REAL BARONET SERVING IN ITS RANKS

BELFAST, June 1.—The Royal Ulster Constabulary is probably the only police force in the world with a baronet serving in the ranks.

HONOLULU, June 1.—Roaring down a brisk tail-wind the monoplane Southern Cross landed at Wheeler Field here, this afternoon, after approximately 27 hours and 24 minutes in the air, safely completing the first 2,400 miles of its projected 7,800 miles flight to Australia.

The last hours of the flight to this city was a desperate battle between the plane and a falling fuel supply. So desperate was the outlook that the crew despaired at times of ever reaching land. Less than twenty minutes' supply of gasoline was left when the landing was negotiated. The flyers at one time radioed "Stay with us we may have to swim yet."

Thousands assembled at the field here and gave the daring aviators a most enthusiastic welcome.

HONOLULU, June 1.—(Flash)—The Southern Cross, trans-Pacific monoplane, landed at Wheeler Field here at 12:19 o'clock, Pacific time, this afternoon.

HONOLULU, June 1.—Less than 150 miles from Honolulu, the monoplane Southern Cross flashed to the Radio Corporation of America station here today the following message, "We are lost, (Continued On Page 6)

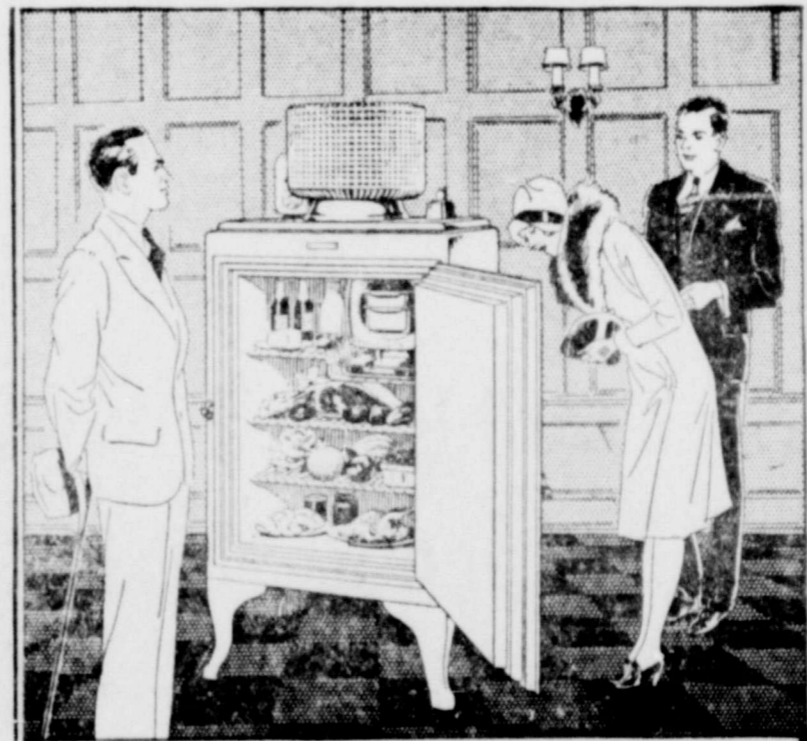

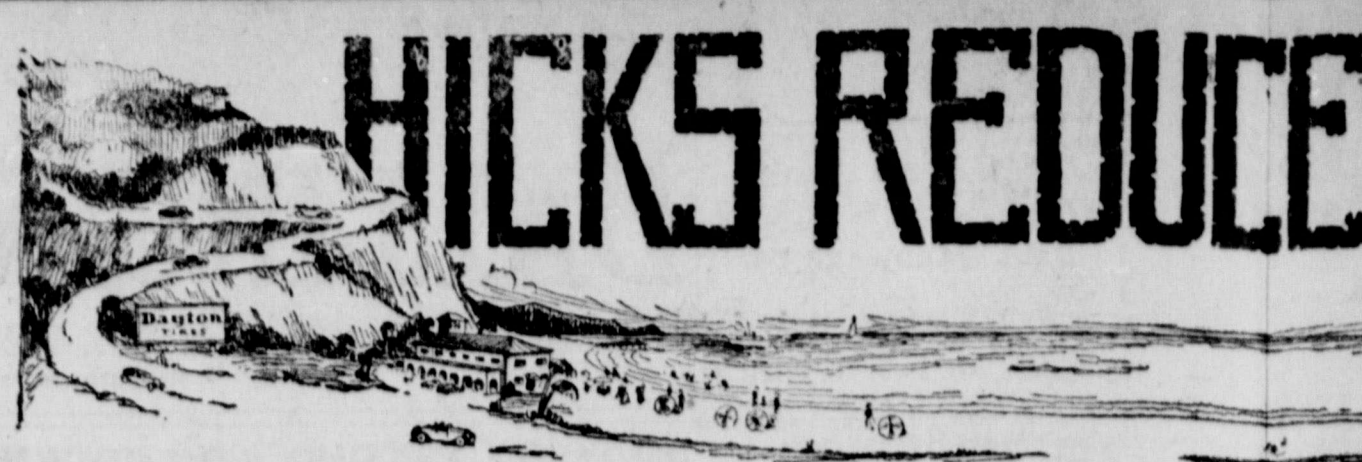

our radio battery went down. Please get ships with receiving sets to get our bearings on 740-meter wave lengths. We will keep on going so they can track us." This was followed by another message, "Land yet unsighted. We have mistaken clouds for land and sent message by mistake. Have sufficient gasoline for four more hours." Army planes took off immediately to escort the trans-Pacific flyers. Officials are confident that the plane is close enough to the Islands to sight land soon.

HONOLULU, June 1—Flying true to the radio course throughout the night, the Southern Cross sighted land 6:35 o'clock island time, this morning, the flight commander radioed amateur station 6-EXOH, here. The plan is due to land at Wheeler Field here within an hour.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1—The monoplane Southern Cross, bearing two Australians and two Americans, is reported to be nearing Honolulu and progressing splendidly. The plane is due at Wheeler Field between 9 and 10 o'clock Pacific coast time. The flyers, throughout the night, kept in touch with the world through numerous radio messages.
