Press Meeting to Bring Many Editors to City

According to indications from letters received this week end there will be a record breaking attendance here next Saturday of editors to attend the Heart of Texas Press Association Convention. Return cards were mailed out from Ballinger last week to all the members and they are pouring in here on every mail and practically everyone is making reservation for the big day.

The general program has all been arranged and the session will be held at the American Legion Auditorium in the forenoon and afternoon. The session will be presided over by R. L. Scott, of De Leon, president of the association.

The Ballinger entertainment committee is arranging the program for the noon hour and for the afternoon session and the newspaper men will be kept on the jump while they are here. Most of the visitors will arrive in Ballinger Saturday morning and will leave late in the afternoon.

In addition to the regular members of the association coming here will be several notables from large dailies. Harry Schwenker, president of the Texas Press Association, will be among the distinguished guests and will bring greetings from the state to the Heart of Texas body. J. C. Watson and a number of West Texas Fair officials will be present to urge the editors to attend Press Day at the Abilene Fair on Sept. 27. For this day newspaper men are to be guests of the West Texas Fair Association and they will be given a banquet at noon, and the remainder of the day and night given access to everything on the fair grounds.

The final program for the entertainment numbers here in Saturday and the place for the noon luncheon will be announced at once.

Utilities Adding To Office Building

The West Texas Utilities Company has commenced work on enlarging the district office of this company in Ballinger, and the contract calls for 30 days working time. This announcement was made Monday by District Superintendent Earl Morley.

The Utilities district business has grown to such an extent that office room is badly needed. The building will be extended to the alley, and the south side which has been open, will be built in. The same Spanish architecture will be carried out in completing the building, a small patio or open court to be left in the center of the building. The court will contain a fountain and other decorations.

Several changes in the office personnel were announced with the contracting of the improvements on the building. Officials of the company who will have space in the building will be Earl Morley superintendent of district G; Chester Cherry, who will be made electrical superintendent; Garland Thomas, chief clerk; and Paul Rothermel, storekeeper; and G. A. Swann, local manager. Mr. Cherry will devote most of his time here working out details in the office. For the past two years he has been on the road most of the time, superintending construction work. There are no changes in the offices held by Mr. Thomas and Mrs. Rothermel. Mr. Swann, new local manager, who has been manager of the ice department for several years, will move his headquarters to the up-town office building.

The front of the building will remain very much the same, with the storeroom in the center of the building. The accounting department will be moved to the rear of the building in the office formerly occupied by Mr. Morley. The electrical superintendent's office will be on the right of the court at the rear. This space in the present building will be completely remodeled and modernized.

The addition to the building will gain much more room for the officials and enable them to carry on their work more efficiently.

Clues Point Early Arrest at Borger

BORGER, Sept. 15.—An arrest is expected today in the murder of District Attorney Johnnie A. Doimes, of Borger, three days after he was shot to death in his own back yard as he was storing his family car for the night.

Texas rangers investigating the murder said they would act on a clue given by the district attorney's widow, who said she believed she knew who shot her husband.

Meanwhile other authorities continued the campaign against law-breakers in an attempt to gather up loose ends in the case, working under the threat of martial law voiced by Governor Moody.

Austrian Republic Scene of Conflict

VIENNA, Sept. 15.—A large section of the Austrian republic is an armed camp today as the result of hostility between the political factions in the government and the rural provinces, the latter group jealously fighting the return of many to their pre-war prerogatives.

The federal chancellor is taking vigorous steps to maintain peace and prevent further fighting. The police and detachments of the regular army are being used to localize the clashes between the opposing factions and prevent fighting.

Defense Rests In Rogers Case

NEW BRAUNFELS, Sept. 16.—The defense counsel for Rebecca Bradley Rogers, on trial for robbery of a Buda bank, expected to rest its case late today after a week spent in introducing testimony tending to prove the insanity plea of the former University of Texas co-ed.

C. A. Doose underwent a major operation Monday morning at Milford, Kansas, and reports here at noon Monday said that the operation was successful and that he was resting well.

Winters Youth Killed by Motor

Alvin Roberts, Winters youth, was fatally injured while riding on his motorcycle on the highway between San Antonio and Corpus Christi Saturday afternoon. Young Roberts' machine is reported to have hit a dip in the concrete highway when the accident occurred.

The boy was rushed to a hospital in San Antonio, where he died. His parents reside at Winters.

An ambulance left Winters at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon to return the body to his home.

MAYOR OF FRENCH TOWN FINDS GERMAN CONSCIENCE

PARIS, Sept. 16.—The mayor of Cateau, in the territory once occupied by the German army is willing to testify "to whom it may concern" that Germans have a conscience.

During the war, M. Preux, the mayor, had two valuable art shades "lifted" from his home by some member of the German army of occupation.

The shades were returned to him the other day. The sender preferred to keep his anonymity, but he prepaid the parcel and attached a letter explaining that he was "conscience-stricken."

Runnels Booth at San Angelo Fair

Runnels county will be well represented at the All West Texas Exposition in San Angelo. C. W. Lehmburg, Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, J. D. Motley, J. E. Gressett, C. R. Stone and J. B. Pace spent Sunday and Sunday night at the exposition grounds decorating and arranging the Runnels county display in the agricultural building.

C. W. Lehmburg left San Angelo at midnight Sunday and up to that time the Runnels booth was the only one entered in the county division. Mr. Lehmburg stated that the exhibit had some good stuff in it and in his opinion was one of the best displays ever shown by this county.

Six communities had already entered exhibits at San Angelo, all with good displays, according to Mr. Lehmburg. Three individuals were exhibiting in that department with truck entries.

The agricultural committee at San Angelo were expecting several other counties to enter exhibits, and they had until 12 o'clock Monday to place their entries. Runnels county will receive the first prize money regardless of whether any others enter or not but the Runnels county representatives are anxious to have some competition. J. D. Motley will remain with the booth until Monday afternoon, and if judging is not completed by that time Mrs. Hollingsworth will remain with the booth Tuesday. The display will be taken up next Saturday and after new perishables are added it will be carried to Abilene and entered in the West Texas Fair, September 23 to 28. There are always from ten to twenty counties to exhibit in this division at Abilene and some real competition is developed.

All Ballinger people who attend the San Angelo fair on Wednesday are requested to visit the agricultural building and see the Runnels exhibit.

Everything is rapidly being put in order for the San Angelo fair and record breaking crowds were expected when the gates were swung open Monday at noon.

DIPLOMATS IN JAPAN NEED AUTO LICENSES

TOKYO, Sept. 16.—Foreign diplomats and their families in Tokyo will be deprived of the privilege of running motor cars with out chauffeurs' licenses if, and when, the Foreign Office here accepts the request of the Metropolitan Police Board that diplomatic immunity as applied to automobiles shall be abolished.

There are a total of 70 automobiles in Tokyo owned by foreign embassies and legations, the police say, including 15 at the British Embassy, 14 at the American Embassy, 5 each for the French and German Embassies, and 3 for the Russian Embassy, and these cars are often run by diplomats and their families without licenses.

This is not desirable, the police claim, for traffic control, as traffic policemen often suffer inconveniences on this account. As a result, the police now intend to hand licenses to the diplomats who are qualified drivers.

Two Killed in Auto Accidents

McALLEN, Sept. 16.—Murder charges were filed against J. C. Baldwin, 18, today, in connection with the stabbing of George Morris, 21, who was fatally wounded when the youths argued at the home of W. J. Drake here.

The argument between the life-long friends followed a party staged across the border in Mexico after returning to the American side of the line Sunday.

Trouble Arises in Troop Occupation

LONDON, Sept. 16.—Complications loomed today in the pan-European efforts to liquidate the problems hanging over from the World War with the revelation that the exodus of British occupational troops from the Rhineland was followed by the entry of French troops into the German territory. On the heels of the departure of the first British soldiers from Wiesbaden, the most important of the occupied towns, comes the official intimation that French soldiers will be stationed there to take their place. The entire Rhineland population is incensed over the new occupation.

Sixteen Moslems Killed by British

JERUSALEM, Sept. 16.—Sixteen Moslem tribesmen were reported to have been killed and others wounded in a running battle with British troops northeast of Nazareth, according to word received here today.

Forest Fires Threaten Cities

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 16.—William Roe, a rancher of the Vannorsburg-Hawkinson section, was burned to death today when the forest fire which swept off the mountainside ignited his home. Roe is reported to have lost his life trying to save the house.

Roe's son was painfully burned trying to rescue his father. The dead man's mother was also severely burned.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 16.—With a dense pall of smoke hanging over this city and ashes showering the streets, all available men were rushed to the fire lanes near Portland to combat the forest fires today.

A high wind is again whipping the blaze out of control, reports of the foresters stated. Three thousand acres of virgin timber on the slopes of Mount Hood were reduced to a desolate, smoldering waste during the week-end.

At a meeting of the city commission early in the month it was decided to raise the tax rate. The reason of this advance was given as lack of funds in the city treasury and the necessity of issuing scrip by the city. The expenses of maintaining the city were exceeding the income and after studying the situation the commission decided to raise the rate from \$1.24 to \$1.50.

The first meeting was recessed until the later part of last week when the official action was completed and the amount changed. At the present rate the expenses for each month are exceeding the income by several hundred dollars, and the city treasury is desperately in need of funds. The only way of getting the deficit funds was through assessment of tax and the resetting of the rate.

The commission met in conjunction with the citizens committee who heard the reasons of the need of change, and this committee approved the action of the commission before any steps were taken in the official change. The committee advised the entire citizenship of the city and does what it thinks necessary to aid in the welfare of the community.

HEALTH EXAMINATIONS START AT LOCAL SCHOOLS

The examination of each student in the Ballinger schools started Monday morning with each teacher, the county nurse, room mother, a dentist and a doctor in attendance. The work will be continued through the rooms until each room has been examined and a complete record made of each child.

Local doctors and dentists are assisting in the examinations, and Miss Addie Alexander, county health nurse, is making records which will show the defects of each child. As soon as the defects are known the parents of the children will be notified and many of these can be corrected.
