USDA Secretary Calls For Flexible Farm Program

Agriculture Secretary
John Block called for more
flexible farm programs to
accommodate sudden and
drastic changes as he addressed the 46th annual
meeting of the National Cotton Council

ton Council.

Other speakers outlined steps for controlling federal budget deficits, called for increased expansion of foreign markets for U. S. farm products, and upheld the industry's views on farm programs oriented to mar-

Block said the experiences of the past two years underlined his view that the government must be flexible in administering farm programs.

The Secretary also said farm policy makers should think beyond "standard practice," and avoid blind acceptance of programs simply because they have been on the books for many years.

Senator David Pryor (D-Ark.) told Council members and guests that structural changes are needed in the budgeting process if federal deficits are to be controlled. Pryor said "America can't survive" unless the present course is

changed.

Rep. Carroll A. Campbell (R-S.C.) discussed the impact of textile imports and expressed confidence that progress would be made this year on controlling federal deficits.

Rep. Tony Coelho (D-Calif.) took a partisan tack in addressing a special weekend seminar at Little Rock. He said he sees the 1984 presidential election as an extremely close contest but predicted his party's Walter Mondale will win the White House.

A farm equipment manufacturer said expansion of foreign markets for American farm products is essential to avoid economic calamity. Boyd Bartlett, executive vice President of Deere & Company's world wide operations, said overseas markets must be expanded at a pace at least equal to the growth of the American farmers productivities.

Bartlett also said the global nature of farm-commodity markets makes the American farmer more vulnerable to world exonomic, political, and weather devel-

Gerald B. Brewer, who moved up the chairman of the Council's board of directors, keynoted the convention and called for strong participation in the Council as a business investment for members of the cotton industry.

Delegates in the final session Feb. 7 approved a slate of policy recommendations to set the industry's direction for 1984. Among policy resolutions was a new thrust on consumption of cotton and cotton products in cotton and textile processin countries aborad to increase the U.S. share in world markets. A call for more credit for farm product purchases also was among the Council resolution.

Among domestic issues and 1984 policies was government funding of agricultural research. Delegates ordered establishment of a committee to review public research, assist in establishing priorities, and support adequate funding. Delegates also approved a measure proposed by the council's technical committee to support expansion of the boll weevil eradication campaign to states where cotton

growers desire it.

Continued upgrading of the appearance of baled cotton was among technical proposals passed. The delegates called for practical solutions to the problem of sample holes in bales. Also adapted were resolutions calling for accelerated research to improve fiber performance through reducing the fiber tangles referred to as "neps," and encourage-


