sas and Colorado. Forty years after the Spanish-American Treaty had been signed in 1819, the Jones-Brown-Clark survey was begun to determine the true location of the 100th mdridian. The task was concluded in 1860, but Texas never had been convinced that it was done correctly.

Texas apparently won its point since Commissioner Gannett found that the boundary as surveyed was 4,040 feet too far west at the southern terminus on Red river and that the northern end should be 800 feet farther east. Gannett marked the new line with monuments and also resurveyed part of the Panhandle's northern border to determine the region's northeast corner. He found that numerous monuments which John H. Clark had put along the parallel of 36 degrees 30 minutes had disappeared and he replaced same

Redefining the boundary will add to the area of Childress, Collingsw th, Wheeler, Hemphill and Lipscomb counties. All were created in 1876, but the last named was the only one organized before the '80s:

In the '80s Texas claimed a considerable area of Indian territory asserting that the stream called North Fork of Red River was the main channel. The Federal government contended that the western boundary of Indian territory should begin on the Prairie Dog Town Fork, and the supreme court found against Texas in 1896. Texas had called the area Greer county and the name has been preserved in Oklahoma. Some of it may come back to Texas through survey of the 100th meridian.




