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It soon will be time to commence planning for the Runnels County Fair here next October. These events need careful planning from a large number of people who are genuinely interested in them. It is difficult to present a different type of entertainment at each fair and yet this is necessary for the Runnels County Fair. The programs for a number of years have been more or less similar and to maintain interest a new type of program is needed for the next fair. Another matter that must be carefully guarded against in continuing the program of a bigger and better exhibition is the expense. It is easy to make the program better each succeeding year by spending more money, but as long as the Runnels County Fair operates on a small admission cost of the programs must be kept within certain bounds. When the new board is created at the annual meeting and an executive committee named from the board, the members should center a great deal of their time and thought towards making the program bigger and at the same time make the cost less. This can be done by beginning months in advance to arrange amateur attractions that could include many individuals. Pageants that use citizens from all sections of the county, amateur vaudeville night, negro spiritual singing with several hundred colored voices, a style show with good settings and lights, football games and other athletic contests for afternoons, etc. could be arranged without much cost. If an entire program could be produced for one year without hiring any outside talent, the attendance would be bigger and the association could make money on the grandstand attractions for once. With the proper leaders in charge of each feature such a program is possible. The premium list of the Runnels County Fair is as good as offered by any county fair and will bring the agricultural products here. The next big thing is to get citizens of the county to patronize the fair. Pride in this Runnels county project should stop many "pass seekers" from asking for the free pasteboards and if this could be ended receipts would climb still higher.

Attorneys all over the state are complaining that on account of court dockets being crowded to the limit with whiskey violations that many civil cases are completely crowded out. Lawyers state that important suits involving property and large sums of money are being continued because the courts cannot hear the great number of liquor violations on the dockets. These lawyers should offer some solution for this problem and work for its enactment as a law.

DALLAS, March 4.—Movement of ships on scheduled flights over the whole system of the Southern Air Transport division of the Aviation Corporation is graphically represented on new dispatching boards in the operations office at Dallas and Fort Worth. Arrival and departure of planes from Houston, Waco, Brownsville, San Antonio, Austin, Fort Worth, Dallas, Big Spring, Midland and El Paso, with information as to pilot and passengers are listed on the boards. Plaques with pilots names and ship numbers are moved about the board following movement of the ships, so that at any moment officials can give the location of any plane or pilot.

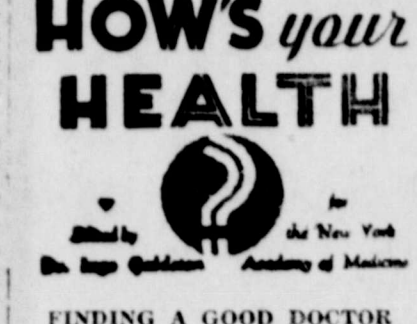


THE MOUSE'S SPEECH

FINDING A GOOD DOCTOR

When the Jones family moved into a new section they soon made contact with the local butcher, baker and candlestick maker. What of the new doctor? After all it is a simple matter to go to the corner grocer and say, "Give me a loaf of bread." One can't do the same, however, with the physician. So the Jones family waits until some emergency arises, then the nearest doctor is called in. Sometimes he suits the family; just as often he does not. What is Jones to do? The answer is simple. If Jones had a family physician in the old town or place before moving he should ask the doctor to refer him to a physician located in the newer district. But if Jones had no physician, or for some reason or other cannot be referred to one, then he should go about finding one for himself before emergencies arise. How is that to be done? Perhaps before answering that we ought to consider the meaning of a good doctor. Medicine, it is agreed, is as much of an art as a science. And most of the art element resides in the personal relation between doctor and patient, and vice versa. Now there are certain persons who are sympathetic to us, and certain others who are antipathetic. It follows that our reactions to different physicians will vary, and the more sympathetic the personality of the physician the better the relationship. But whether a physician will or will not suit our temperament can only be determined upon contact. And our problem seems to be in making the first contact. Sympathetic or otherwise, a doctor to be a good physician must know medicine.
