City Commission Sells 2 Bond Issues Saturday

A large number of municipal bond buyers assembled here Saturday to bid on the bonds advertised for sale on that date by the city of Ballinger. The two issues for sale at this time were sold to H. C. Burt & Co., of Houston for par and accrued interest. When expenses are paid this contract will bring a price of 97.75 which the highest any municipal bonds have sold in the past twelve months. The city commission was extremely well pleased with the sale. The bonds dated April 1st, will be sent to Austin for registration. This will return the money about the 5th of April.

The two issues sold represent \$110,000 worth of bonds voted for improvement of the water department and \$35,000 for the erection of a city hall and fire station.

Mayor McCarver stated that the commission would advertise for bids on the water project at an early date and soon would be ready to let a contract. A few minor pieces of business must be negotiated before the time, however.

The Mayor said work could be let all in one or in three separate contracts. The improvements call for the building of a new dam, the erection of a steel tower and tank, and the laying of a string of new mains. It was further stressed that when actual work started that local laborers would be given every preference. "We like to give people to move to our town, but we want every local citizen at work before others move here to get jobs on this project," the mayor said.

The commission will commence preparations for the erection of the city hall and fire station at an early date. Plans have been drawn by Paul Silvas, architect, of San Antonio, but some alterations will have to be made to suit the local requirements. The location of the new city hall has not been decided by the commission and will be another problem to work out. The city owns a lot that was bought many years ago for that purpose and can secure the adjoining lot at a reasonable price.

In the meantime the preparatory work is being completed. The boundaries of the city are being surveyed. The survey is being made by E. W. Makaksky and wife to Runnels county, in March 1921 as shown by deed recorded in book 114, at page 230 of the deep records of Runnels county, Texas, and said point being about 111 feet east of where the center line of the right-of-way of the Abilene & Southern Railway intersects the south line of said Almond Cottle survey; thence north 9 Deg. and 40' east, and parallel with the 60.5 feet from the east line of the right of way of said

No Refund Made On Farm Trailers

Interest in the new bill proposed in the legislature asking for tax exemption on farm trailers has caused considerable discussion here due to the fact that many have already paid the required license on their trailers. County Tax Collector W. L. Brown a few days ago wired Senator Walter Woodward asking that a rider be placed on the bill so that in case of its passage farmers who have already paid could be refunded. Mr. Brown received the following telegram from Senator Woodward Monday:

Lions Sponsor San Angelo Trip

At a meeting of the Lions Club Friday at noon, the local club voted to sponsor Ballinger Day at the race meet in San Angelo next week. The Ballinger Band will accompany the delegation to that city next Saturday, March 22, which is the final day of the racing program and which is to be called all West Texas Day.

The feature race on the closing day will have a horse named "Ballinger," which will get the full support of the local delegation. Other horses have been accepted for the Heart of Texas, the Oil Belt, Brady, Goleman, San Angelo, and Abilene; and several other towns are expected to accept horses and send large delegations for the races on that day.

Tommy Hall, chairman of the program committee of the Lions Club, and J. D. Motley are arranging a novelty program to carry to San Angelo. The delegation will leave here early in the morning and all citizens are invited to join the caravan. The Ballingerites will parade on the streets of San Angelo as soon as they arrive, before going to the fair grounds, where the main racing events will be staged.

The Camp Fire Girls and Boy Scouts of local troops will go to San Angelo the evening before this event to attend a meeting of Scouts and Girls from all parts of West Texas. They will remain over night and come home Saturday after the celebration is concluded.

City Water Supply is Replenished by Rain

There is no shortage of water in Ballinger. A rise came down Elm Creek Saturday night and by Sunday morning both dams were full and running over.

There was no rain to speak of near Ballinger but the watershed of Elm Creek is extensive and any considerable shower falling in the area finds its way to this stream. While nothing had been said regarding the shortage of water here, there was little reserve in the lower reservoir. Several weeks ago department employees drained all water from the upper to the lower dam and by Friday this supply was low. The rise Saturday night came from a rain which fell west and northwest of Winters and came down the creek slowly. A city official declared Monday that the water received here was good, not stirred up and muddy. The rise was so gradual that clear water was forced out of the holes above here and the two reservoirs were

filled very slowly. When both dams are filled there is estimated to be at least a 90-day supply. With both upper and lower lakes now filled it is felt that with rain which will fall during the succeeding ninety days no shortage will occur before the new dam is built and the lower lake increased in size at least five times.

Rains in the county Friday night and Saturday covered several narrow strips but few sections received what could be termed a beneficial rain. From two to three inches fell in these strips and precipitation was sufficient to put rises on several streams, tributaries to the Colorado and Concho rivers.

Two New Bills Hold Up Prison Legislation

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Mar. 17.—Although an apparent agreement was reached Saturday on the prison reformation and rehabilitation bill, the Senate and House free conference committee on prisons encountered further delay today with the presentation of two other proposals, one by the House minority and the other by Senator Small, of Wellington.

The conference committee's agreement Saturday called for the expenditure of \$650,000, \$150,000 of which was to be spent at Huntsville and the remainder on the prison farms. Small's proposal calls for the expenditure of \$100,000 for improvements at Huntsville, and \$350,000 for construction of a central unit on either of the farms. The House minority proposed a bill to spend \$150,000 at Huntsville, \$50,000 for a portable prison camp, and \$200,000 for improvement of the prison farms.

Hundred Million For Farm Board

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 17.—The \$100,000,000 appropriation for use by the federal farm board was approved by the Senate today in accepting a partial report from the free conference committee on the deficiency supply bill which carries in addition \$73,000,000 for other projects.

Boundary Suit is Won by Texas

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 17.—Texas gained approximately 23,500 acres or 44.6 square miles of land from Oklahoma when the United States Supreme Court today approved the location of the boundary between the two states running north from Red River, as surveyed and marked by Samuel Gannett.

The eastern boundary of the Texas Panhandle, which the supreme court decided should be along the 100th meridian, was found by Commissioner Gannett to be erroneously located, 4,940 feet over in Texas territory at its southern end on Red River, and 880 feet over the line at its northern end at the northeastern corner of the Panhandle.

Pro Enforcement Best of All Laws

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 17.—Chairman Wickersham of the Hoover law enforcement commission said today that the report from an investigator of his corps showed that prohibition law enforcement was better than that of any other law. Asked directly if the dry law was being enforced he said it was not "a hundred per cent," then mentioned the report of the investigator. Another year will be required by the commission to conclude its work, Wickersham said.

Naval Conference Takes New Life

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Mar. 17.—Reimbued with life as a consequence of the visit over the week-end of Premier Andre Tardieu of France, the five-power naval conference showed renewed activity and optimism today.

There was a widespread gratification that Ramsay MacDonald, British prime minister, and Tardieu had a talk yesterday, faced the problems of Franco-British relationship, and found it unnecessary for either to withdraw from further negotiations as a hopeless.

FIFTY YEARS' PROGRESS

It has been often said that more medical progress has been witnessed during the last hundred years than in all the ages before.

The warrant for this statement is easy to appreciate when we review medical progress during the past 50 years.

Thus in the period between 1880 and 1885 we find Pasteur demonstrating for the first time the common pus-producing germs. The germ causing typhoid was discovered during this period by Eberth.

Malaria was shown by Laveran to be caused by a minute parasite.

In 1882 tuberculosis, the white plague, was shown by Robert Koch to be caused by a minute, rod-like bacillus. This discovery gave mankind the foundation for the scientific study and the control of one of its greatest afflictions.

In quick succession thereafter Loeffler discovered the germ causing glanders; Klebs, the germ of diphtheria; Koch, the bacillus causing cholera, and Nicolaier the tetanus (lock-jaw) bacillus.

Crede saved an untold number of children from permanent blindness by teaching us to put silver nitrate in the eyes of the new born, one of the great boons which medical science has given

to mankind.
The toxin of the diphtheria bacillus was discovered by Roux and Yersin in 1888. A year later Behring discovered diphtheria antitoxin to combat diphtheria.
The germ causing plague was discovered in 1894. In the following year Roentgen discovered X-ray.
All of these items of outstanding significance in mankind's war on disease belong to the last half century, and yet they represent but a small portion of the total accomplishments that history records for this period.

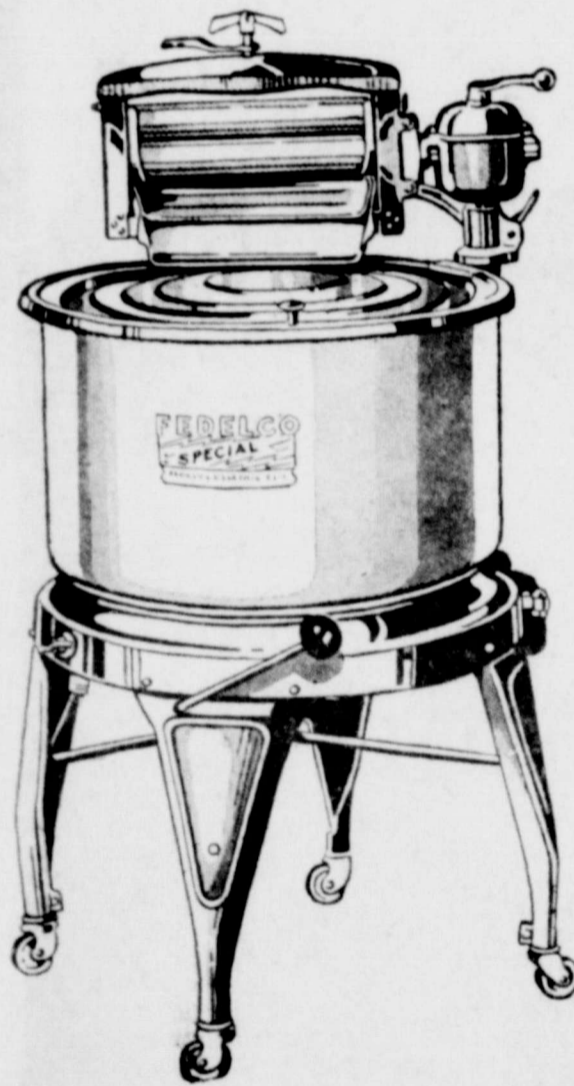

1000 Legionnaires Attend Convention

Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. Dickey, Mrs. R. P. Kirk, Miss Ima McKown and Mrs. F. H. Cameron were among those attending the fifth division American Legion convention at San Angelo Sunday. The Legion will request the legislature to exempt all veterans from paying poll taxes who have been confined to a veteran hospital for a period of 90 days before the date of payment. The resolution endorsed El Paso as the site for the state convention in 1931.

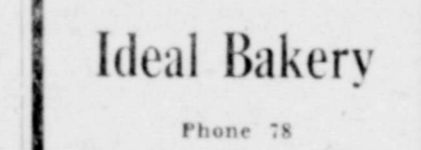

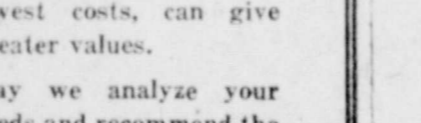
