Federal Income Tax Collections are Less

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 18.—Income tax collections up to and including March 15th, as shown in the treasury department statement on that date were \$67,500,000 as compared with \$72,500,000 for the corresponding period a year ago.

The five million dollar difference could be taken only to indicate that the bulk of the payments up to last Saturday are yet to be reported. This year's unofficial total compiled by a telegraphic poll is said to be much larger than last year's but it has not yet been entered on the books of the treasury department.

No Boom Here; Labor Plentiful

False reports have gone out from Ballinger concerning the amount of work being done here in causing laborers to flock in and when they arrive they find no work. The amount of building here has been greatly exaggerated. Workmen in other cities think that work is plentiful here until they get to Ballinger when they find scarcely any construction.

A news item appearing in the Dallas News Monday of this week which stated that ten business houses were now under construction in this city. Besides, remodeling the building to be occupied by the J. C. Penney Co. there is no construction. This building is about finished and the ice station being built by O. D. Dillingham also is practically completed. No other buildings are under construction or will be soon.

Improvements contemplated by the city will start sometime in the future but the commission does not know the date the work will begin and no labor is being employed for these projects.

The article also referred to additional building by the Ballinger schools, but board members have heard nothing regarding this and do not contemplate any additions. The \$50,000 worth of paving to connect up with the highways, mentioned in the article is the hope of every citizen, but the state highways will not be finished for a year or more and this paving even though it is done is a future prospect. Road and bridge work which is being done and other work of this nature to start soon will not require many men. Labor-saving machinery will be used on nearly all this work and local laborers will be given preference over men who rush in for jobs.

City officials state that there are many local citizens unemployed at present and that no other labor is needed. Charity calls are increasing daily and the city will be unable to care for these calls if outside workmen continue to come here.

CARBON BLACK PLANTS HOLDING LARGE STOCKS

AMARILLO, Mar. 18.—The carbon black industry having been hard hit by a depression in the rubber industry that caused an overproduction of black plants in the two Texas districts, the Panhandle and Breckenridge, are reported holding huge stocks on hand.

From authoritative quarters it is reported that between 50 and 60 per cent of the daily production in the Panhandle is being stored. This means that, based on estimated production, between 70 and 85 tons per day are retained in storage.

There are 11 concerns with 20 plants in the Panhandle and 14 concerns and 27 plants in the state.

In 1928 Texas produced 100,828,000 pounds of black.

Two Highway Contracts Let for Runnels County

Road contracts were let by the State Highway Commission Monday afternoon for 10.9 miles of grading and drainage in Runnels county on highway No. 4. This stretch of road runs from Ballinger south to the Concho county line. The contract was awarded to W. S. Thompson of San Angelo at a cost of \$52,841.

The second contract also was let to W. S. Thompson for a steel and concrete bridge across the Colorado River on South Seventh Street. The cost as published for this bridge was \$50,830.

State Engineer G. M. Garrett left here Saturday afternoon for Austin carrying with him all plans and other information needed by the commission. County Judge Paul Trimmer and Kates M. Lynn left Sunday at noon for Austin to be present when the bids were opened on the work in this county.

W. S. Thompson is not a new contractor in Runnels county. He

was given the contract for the first piece of concrete built here when a stretch of road was built from Ballinger to a point north of Hatchel. His work was satisfactory and was done rapidly. He has a large amount of road machinery, has been in the business for a long time, and has always done satisfactory work.

The contract awarded on the road work was for grading and drainage only and does not include hard surfacing. This contract will be let a little later when other work is completed.

A large part of the road included in the 11-mile contract will be new right-of-way. Engineer Garrett estimates that about 25 per cent of the road is through new territory where no grade has ever been made. The right-of-way has been widened all along the route and in most places fences have already been set back and made ready for the construction crews to commence operations.

Prowler Enters Five Homes Here

SPRINGFIELD, Tenn., Mar. 18.—Two trainmen were killed and another probably injured fatally today in a wreck near here of a freight train. H. L. Russell, fireman, and Aaron Moss, brakeman, were killed.

The boiler of the locomotive is said to have exploded, the cause of which is undetermined.

The first place the intruder was located was at the home of E. E. King on Broadway. The family was awakened at 1:00 o'clock when they heard someone prowling around downstairs. Mr. King went downstairs to the front door and stood guard to keep the prowler from escaping and Chief of Police Lee Moreland was telephoned. When Chief Moreland arrived a search of the house was made but the would-be robber had already made his escape. Mr. and Mrs. King had not missed anything Tuesday morning and it is believed that the man was disturbed before he had time to take anything of value.

About 3:00 o'clock Tuesday morning Mr. and Mrs. Tom Caudle were awakened when a man walked through their room. Mrs. Caudle got a good look at the man and saw him leave the house by a side door. She called out to her husband and as Mr. Caudle got up the phone rang, and M. C. Atkins, who lives next door, called to ask if a man left their residence running Mr. Atkins and Mr. Caudle dressed quickly and made a search of that section of town for the robber but did not discover him.

A man entered the home of Lee Sykes on Sixth Street, ransacking the house without waking anyone. A pocket knife, a one-dollar bill and a watch were missed. Just what time the marauder visited this residence is not known as he did not disturb anyone and left without being seen.

An uninvited visit was also made at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Killough who live in the Hugo Vogelzang place on Broadway. Here a suit belonging to Mr. Killough was carried into the yard and after the money was removed from the pockets it was left in the back yard. The thief also took a purse belonging to Mrs. Killough which contained a small amount of money. Mr. Killough stated Tuesday morning that he was not worried about the suit and its contents further than his keys to the local J. C. Penney store, but when he found the suit the keys had not been taken. The suit had been left in the yard some time after the rain Monday night as it was perfectly dry. The knife taken from Mr. Sykes earlier in the night was left sticking in the door at the Killough's home.

The Joe Huffman home was entered and clothing carried into the yard from which a small amount of money was taken.

The only thing missing at the Caudle home was a pair of trousers taken from Bill Griffin, a roomer, and this clothing had not been found Tuesday morning.

Mr. Atkins got a good look at the man as he fled from the Caudle home and was able to furnish a description to the officers.

Showers were localized to the south of Abilene, being reported at Mason, Junction, and Ballinger, and immediate territories of those towns.

WOMAN'S RULES TO GUIDE POLICE OF LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 18.—Rules laid down by a woman, Miss Mabel Olin, soon will be the law under which the Los Angeles police department will work.

She has compiled a new police manual, which is the culmination of her 15 years "on the force" as assistant secretary to a succession of police chiefs.

Miss Olin's manual is the result of her close observation of the inner workings of the department with rules compiled a score of years ago. Her name is on the book as author.

The sixty-page manual sets the police force in motion along the lines of a military organization. The outstanding change is the centralization of power, making each officer responsible for results. Reduction of the number of lieutenants concentrates this responsibility.

House Passes Conference Approved Prison Measure

Pipe Line Bill is Filed by Moody

AUSTIN, Mar. 18.—Governor Moody today filed without his signature the bill enlarging the powers of the state railroad commission in regulating pipe lines, designating pipe line owners as public utilities and making them common carriers and common purchasers. The measure will not become effective until the end of ninety days.

"The bill may not work any good but I have not been shown where it will work any harm," the governor noted on the draft.

Two Port Arthur Stores are Robbed

PORT ARTHUR, Mar. 18.—Gunmen robbed two all-night groceries here last night, taking \$600 in cash, and beat the proprietor of one store unconscious early today.

B. B. Sonchon was clubbed with a pistol when he attempted to resist men who took \$400 from his cash register. Another grocery was robbed of \$200 a little later.

AUSTIN, Mar. 18.—The free conference report recommending the passage of the bill appropriating \$550,000 for rehabilitation of the state prison properties was adopted by the House today by a vote of eighty to twenty-one.

The bill provides for improvement of the Huntsville plant by the expenditure of \$150,000, and gives the penitentiary board wide latitude in spending the remainder. The expenditure of \$300,000 for the prison farms was made a separate appropriation, with an additional \$100,000 for improvement of the Corcoran farm for women and the Wynne farm for tubercular patients.

It was pointed out that Gov. Moody may veto the appropriation for the Corcoran and Wynne farms but cannot cut any items in the main appropriation without vetoing the bill in toto.

FOOD MAKES THE MAN

It is many a year since Captain Cook made his famous voyage and proved that by proper sanitation and the inclusion of lime juice in the diet of his crew, his sailors could be kept in good health and spared from the ravages of scurvy.

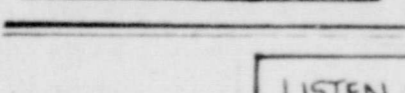

Sophomore High Jumper Eyes Third World Mark

(Associated Press Staff Writer)
INDIANAPOLIS, Mar. 18.—Bert Nelson, Butler University sophomore, is creeping closer to the seven feet which he has set as his goal in the high jump.

Nelson tied the interscholastic mark of 6 feet 3 5/8 inches when he was at Hyde Park high school, Chicago. Last year he broke the junior A. A. U. mark at Denver by soaring over the bar at 6 feet 4 7/8 inches.

This winter in a dual meet with Notre Dame, Nelson leaped 6 feet 6 3/4 inches, a quarter of an inch higher than the world's indoor record made by Harold Osborne in 1925.

Nelson honestly expects to jump 7 feet before he lays aside his spikes. He is 21. The outdoor record is 6 feet 8 1/4 inches held by Osborne.

The Butler jumper has a style somewhat of his own. He runs straight at the bar, using a scissor roll with a hitch kick. Most high jumpers now use a side jump, ending with the so-called western roll from the side. Nelson worked out his own style, and Hermon Phillips, Butler coach, helped him perfect it.

Making the United States Olympic team in 1932 is another ambition of the young jumper. His father, a distance runner, was with the Swedish team at the 1900 Olympiad.

Nelson is working his way through college, and expects to do newspaper work. He is five

Picture of Peak 250 Miles Away is Cameraman's Goal

(By Associated Press)
WRIGHT FIELD, Dayton, O., March 18.—Taking a picture of a mountain 250 miles distant is the next goal of Capt. A. W. Stevens, of the army air corps, holder of the record distance shot of 227 miles.

Captain Stevens says the attempt probably will be made in June with some towering peak of the Rockies as the camera's objective, and a seat in an airplane two or three miles aloft carrying the camera.

The peak at which he "shoots" probably will be invisible to the eye, the big camera being pointed by calculation much as a big gun is handled.

The 227-mile record was made last fall. Infra red rays, half heat and half light, penetrated to the camera's lens and outlined clearly the distant objective, which was Mt. Ranier, Wash.

The picture was taken while Captain Stevens was 17,000 feet above a point near the middle of the state of Oregon.

June and December are the best months for such pictures, says Captain Stevens. He doubts that pictures can be taken from a distance beyond 250 miles because of the earth's curvature.

The army cameraman suspects,

however, that there may be sufficient curvature of light rays through the bending powers of the atmosphere to give perhaps an "inkling" of objects a short distance beyond and below the horizon.

Special plates to be used on Stevens' next attempt are being prepared. Lieut. John Corkille, who has been pilot on previous distance-shooting expeditions, may be assigned for the flights.

FRENCH CARS ARE TESTED FOR TRAVEL IN SAHARA

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Mar. 18.—French automobiles challenge the supremacy of camels, "original ships of the desert," on the Sahara wastes.

Four stock cars completed a 9,600 mile journey over the sands from Algiers to Dakan and return in 32 days.

The feat was attempted to demonstrate the practicability of crossing the Sahara with ordinary automobiles, to study possibilities of regular motor travel between French north African and equatorial African colonies, and to investigate the terrain for airplane landing fields.
