Southern Cross Mail Last Leg of Journey

(By Associated Press)
BOSTON, June 26.—The Southern Cross, airplane conqueror of the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, is speeding toward New York, its goal, today. The hop-off was made at 3:05 this morning from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, where it landed early yesterday after its westerly crossing of the Atlantic.

Capt. Charles Kingsford-Smith, commander, and his comrades, Evert Van Dyk, Patrick Saul and John W. Stannage expect to reach New York at four or five o'clock this afternoon, Eastern standard time.

The course planned would cross Nova Scotia straight down the Atlantic coast in a direct line to Cod and over Long Island Sound.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., June 26.—The coast guard radio station here picked up a signal from a plane reported to be passing over a county harbor in Nova Scotia at 10:00 o'clock Eastern time this morning.

HALIFAX, Nova Scotia, June 26.—The Southern Cross passed over here at 11:00 a. m., Eastern standard time.

Court at Laredo Deals Out Justice

LAREDO, June 26.—Trial of criminal cases with a record of 100 percent convictions was completed by District Attorney John A. Valls in the 49th session of the Laredo Municipal District Court here during the May-June criminal docket. These convictions resulted in men getting terms in the state penitentiary and two boys getting terms in the state training school for juveniles. Seven sentences were suspended and \$6,000 in fines and costs collected, 100 fines going into the Webb county road and bridge fund.

It is nothing unusual for District Attorney Valls to hang up a record of 100 percent in convictions, as he did that several years in succession up to about a year ago. The 125 cases in which the 100 percent convictions were obtained consisted of the following: Driving automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquors, 80; (netting \$4,000 in fines for the county road and bridge fund); unlawfully transporting intoxicating liquors, 3; burglar, 7; forgery, 3; theft over the value of \$50, 10; theft under the value of \$50, 7; robbery by assault, 3; statutory crime, 1; aggravated assault, 4; delinquent children, 2; speeding, 1; (netting \$50 to the county road and bridge fund); fraudulent disposition of mortgage property, 1; selling marijuana, 1; embezzlement, 2; failure to stop and render aid, 2.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—President Hoover today vetoed the Johnson-Rankin World War veterans' relief bill and the House quickly upheld the veto.

Chairman Snell of the House rules committee introduced a resolution giving the substitute right of way which adopted the president's veto and emphatically repeated his protests on the bill as unjust, saying it gave disabled and wounded veterans little aid.

No Competition in Wheat Says Legge

Fire Loses for May Show Decrease

Fire losses in Texas amounted to \$577,704 for the month of May. This was less than half that of the preceding month. Below are given the number of fires for May, their causes, and the amount of money involved in the property destroyed:

Incendiarism, 20, \$44,268; electricity, 32, \$37,000; vacant house fires, 21, \$35,565; stoves, furnaces, boilers and pipes, 32, \$32,530; exposure, 25, \$24,000; explosions, 15, \$16,350; matches and smoking, 23, \$11,304; electric irons, 9, 10,211; sparks from machinery, 1, \$9,500; spontaneous combustion, 5, \$7,550; petroleum and its products, 8, \$4,939; motion picture films (theatre), 1, \$4,300; lightning, 6, \$4,235; rubbish and trash, 10, \$2,660; ignition of hot grease, tar, oil, wax, etc., 2, \$2,000; defective chimneys and flues, 12, \$2,064; miscellaneous known causes, 9, \$1,756; gas, natural and artificial, 3, \$235; sparks on roof, 5, \$177; unknown causes, 132, \$327,060.

The fire loss in Texas for the month of May has been cut almost one half of the previous month of April, the fire loss for April being \$1,137,663, making a reduction for May of \$560,959, according to State Fire Insurance Commissioner J. W. Dewees, who is the author of the accompanying statement.

The Texas fire insurance department attributes this reduction to the fact that a relentless war is being waged in most every city and town in Texas against careless fires, vacant house fires and incendiary fires. City officials, local fire marshals and fire departments, and the citizens of Texas cities and towns have come to realize what a tremendous waste has been taking place in Texas for the past number of years on account of our enormous annual fire loss. It seems that there has been a general awakening on the part of all the people of Texas to the tremendous cost that they are paying due to our heavy fire loss, and that there is concerted action and cooperation taking place in the

Legion is Urging People to Vote

The American Legion, through its different departments, is conducting a campaign which it chooses to term: Americanization; the object of which is to call to the attention of every citizen his obligation to his government; the measure of which obligation is determined by the blessings and privileges guaranteed to him by his government. One of the channels through which this obligation can be discharged is through the proper use of the ballot, at once a principal factor in, and a product of, public opinion. Careful, considerate and courageous voting is as truly an obligation of a private citizen to preserve the purity of his government as careful, considerate and courageous fighting is the obligation of a soldier to preserve the security of his government. Voting is a responsibility in time of peace as much so as fighting is a responsibility in time of war. It is the nation's pledge of safety and freedom and good government given by the individual members of that government.

The right of franchise is a blood-bought heritage and its slipshod exercise is a breach of good citizenship. Good government is dependent upon its intelligent exercise. If intelligently exercised, it will express the will of the people in popular government. In no way can the will of the people be expressed and good government guaranteed, except through an expression of that will in the form of intelligent voting. The success of Democracy is dependent upon the willing active and intelligent expression of its people at the polls.

It is criminal negligence, from a political standpoint, for an intellectual, honorable, patriotic citizen to remain away from the polls. It is his failure to render an accounting for the blood-bought privileges and high social standards which he enjoys, which places his government, which is rightfully his, in unfriendly hands, which makes the high offices of government mere pawns to be moved about by shrewd and sinister hands and made a part of a scheme to ultimately become a part of a minority design; which said design is, and should be, a foreign element in true Democracy.

Rarely, if ever, do professional politicians appeal to the good sense of the people; rarely, if ever, do they call down the judgment of the intelligent upon their qualifications; but, on the other hand, they organize the illiterate and the radical into groups and blocs and, with the force of these groups and these blocs, they flaunt the will of the great majority of the people. If the patriotic, intelligent citizens of this great nation would rally round the standard of good government and demand as a prerequisite to the holding of public office, strict proof of honesty, of integrity and of qualification, true democracy would instantly take in hand the reins of government and an era of good will and prosperity would rise of its own accord. The element of profit and personal aggrandisement would lose out of the privilege of holding high offices, isms, blocs, personal hatreds and prejudices would soon become mere bickerings and unpleasant memories, and the adage: "of the people, by the people, for people," would cease to be an ideal and become a reality.
