### Think Infernal Machine

AMARILLO, June 27.—Mrs. A. D. Payne, wife of a recently withdrawn candidate for district judge, was blown to pieces and her fourteen-year-old son probably was fatally injured today when the Payne automobile was destroyed by what police believed to be an infernal machine.

Remains of wire and a dry cell battery were picked up near the wreckage of the automobile.

### County Agent Urges Pure Planting Seed

County Agent C. W. Lehmburg conducted a very successful demonstration Wednesday on the Walter Lange farm near Oifen of a method to secure pure seed of grain sorghums for planting. The proven procedure for securing pure seed is to clean the maize, feterita or other grain sorghum heads in a paper bag just before it emerges from the "boot."

Other farmers in the county who are demonstrating this system on their farms are Frank Gully, Rowena; Buster Caulde, Hatchel; Harvey Paschal, Dry Ridge; D. A. Dobbins, Drasco; P. R. Dietz, Crews; R. L. Bates, Novice; Bert Fletcher, Maverick and other farmers at Norton, Benoit and Wingate. Approximately eighteen farmers in the Wilmoth community are cooperating with Mr. Lehmburg in demonstrating a plan to keep pure seed stock for cotton planting.

Mr. Lehmburg stated that the plan becomes much easier to advance as more farmers realize the advantages of planting pure seed.

### Executive To Meet

The Runnels county Democratic executive committee will meet at the district court room of court house Monday after June 30. This announcement was made Friday by County Clerk A. O. Strother, of Wichita Falls, in a letter mailed to newspaper editors and members of the committee.

One of the first items to be attended to will be to decide if county officers will be elected by a plurality or a plurality vote. At the first meeting of the committee it failed to act upon the question of holding a second primary for county officers. Judge Strother declared at the time that he felt sure it was the intention of each committeeman to hold a second primary and elect county officers by a majority vote, however, the matter was overlooked and the law prescribed that affirmative action must be taken by the committee in an election held for county and precinct officers.

It is mandatory to hold a second primary in every county for all state and district officers, hence the expense of election county and precinct officers on the same ballot by a majority vote creates no additional expense and trouble.

At the meeting Monday afternoon the July primary ticket will be arranged by a committee and as soon as this detail is completed bids for the printing of same will be asked and the ticket rushed out so that they will be ready in the hands of all election judges for absentee voting. Absentee voting in some instances can begin twenty days prior to the date of election. Other votes may be cast ten days prior where citizens expect to leave town before date of the election.

All precincts have elected chairmen who are members of the county executive committee and who will look after the holding of election on July 26.

Candidates have been notified of the assessments for the expense of holding the elections and all these will have to pay by the date of the meeting Monday when the ticket is finally prepared and a contract let for the printing.

Only five races in the county will be affected by requiring a majority vote. Two commissioners precincts have more than two candidates in the race and probably will require a run-off. The tax collector's race has three candidates and a run-off is probable. The remaining two are the justice of the peace race in the Ballinger precinct, and for constable of precinct No. 1. All other county and precinct offices have either one or two candidates seeking tenure and will be nominated in the first primary on July 26.

The Daily Ledger is making a strong appeal to election judges this year to phone reports to this office as soon as the complete vote is counted, regardless of the time of night. The newspaper will gather returns in Runnels county for the Texas Election Bureau and will also receive a bulletin service from this source all night. A large bulletin board will be erected in the front of the office where county returns will be tabulated and posted for the benefit of the public. The street will be roped off and lighted and all those interested in the election will be invited to hear the returns.

# SHIELD DEATH PENALTY

## led Wife of Candidate for District Judge

### Declare Rev. Frigon, Former Priest Here, Was Drowned in Bay

(By Associated Press)  
BROWNSVILLE, Tex., June 27.—A coroner's verdict of death by drowning was returned today after an investigation of the finding of the body of Father Jean B. Frigon at Point Isabel yesterday.

Rev. Frigon was rector of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church of this city.

A crucifix was tightly clasped in the priest's lips when the body was discovered.

Rev. Frigon had gone to Point Isabel for a few days rest.

Rev. Father Jean B. Frigon was a citizen of Ballinger for a number of years and was priest in charge of St. Mary's Church. During his stay here he made many friends who still remember him and who will be grieved to hear of his death. He was known here as being very active in all civic work of the town and was an outstanding character in Ballinger.

Following is the account from Brownsville telling of the finding of the body:

"The body of Rev. Jean B. Frigon, 59, of Brownsville, well known Catholic priest, was found on the beach at Point Isabel late today. It was clothed in a bathing suit and found after a search instituted by coast guards when it was learned he did not stay at home last night.

Father Frigon, pastor of Sacred Heart Church here, departed today for a few days' recuperation at Point Isabel. He was a known figure in South Texas for the past 10 years and was active in the World War. There were no marks of violence on his body and it was believed a verdict of death from drowning would be returned by a coroner."

### Davis Given 5 Year Suspended Sentence

EASTLAND, Tex., June 27.—Thomas Davis today was convicted and given a five-year suspended sentence on the charge of having murdered Lucien Shook near here in September, 1928. Davis was given the death penalty in his first trial, the Court of Criminal Appeals reversing and remanding the case.

Davis is also under indictment for the killing of Leon Shook at the same time.

Clyde Thompson already is under the death penalty in the slayings.

Woodrow Davis, Thomas Davis' brother, testified they were hunting with Thompson when they met the Shook boys, and that Thompson killed the Shooks, explaining, "I wanted to see them kick."

### Crop Report Shows Cotton Decrease

The following statement based on conditions in Texas on June 15th was issued by the commissioner of agriculture of Texas in his third crop report of the year. The report shows a decrease in cotton acreage of approximately 6 per cent and an increase in feedstuff acreage of about 5 per cent.

Rainfall during the past month of from four to eight inches provides an excellent season in most sections.

The report follows:

**Cotton**

Eastern district, 49 counties—acreage 93 per cent, condition 82 per cent

Northern district, 22 counties—acreage 94 per cent, condition 81 per cent

Western district, 44 counties—acreage 94 per cent, condition 79

Central district, 44 counties—acreage 93 per cent, condition 83 per cent

Southwestern district, 37 counties—acreage 94 per cent, condition 85 per cent

Northwestern district, 58 counties—acreage 96 per cent, condition 82 per cent.

The cotton crop is practically all planted, and 90 per cent of the crop is reported clean, and 10 per cent foul.

A large per cent of the crop is late, and much of it not chopped out.

Some boll weevils, fleas, worms and hoppers are showing up, but it is too early to show much damage. If insects continue to increase with so much late cotton the production will be greatly decreased.

**Feedstuff, Etc.**

Wheat and oats have been slightly decreased, and the condition 70 per cent, which indicates a lower yield than last year. This is caused by the excessive drouth in early spring.

Peanuts and sweet potatoes have been slightly decreased and the condition is below normal.

Rainfall has averaged about 4 inches in the past month, with 6 to 8 inches in some sections.

Stock ranges are in excellent condition because of recent rains, grass is fine and the livestock

**Time Now to File Election Expense**

Miss Ima McKown, county clerk, stated Friday that the time is at hand for candidates for county offices to file the first report of campaign expense accounts. Three reports are required by law, the first not more than 30 nor less than 25 days before the first primary election, the second not more than twelve nor less than eight days, and the third not more than ten days after the election. Candidates in the second primary will follow the same procedure for that election. Candidates for state and district offices must file records of campaign expenditures with the secretary of state; county and precinct candidates with the county clerk.

A complete record of contributions, money borrowed or other source of revenue must be given in the report and the names of anyone to whom the candidate has made expenditure of more than \$10 must be included. Any candidate who knowingly and willfully fails to comply with the regulation will be barred from the ticket.
