Abilene Farmer Killed In Highway Accident

Sidney Smith, 40, was struck by an automobile and killed on the highway 10 miles south of Abilene late Sunday afternoon.

W. D. Scales, who was returning with his family to Ballinger from Abilene, arrived at the scene about thirty minutes after the accident and assisted in taking the injured man to an Abilene hospital. The victim died in Mr. Scales' arms while en route to the hospital.

According to information given Mr. Scales, Smith was a tenant farmer who had previously lived about five miles north of Abilene. This fall he took his family in a truck to Corpus Christi to pick cotton. Sunday he was returning with his family from that section of Texas and had stopped along the highway, leaving his truck parked at the right-hand side of the road, he crossed the highway to the left. As he was returning to the truck he was struck by a Ford coupe going south and knocked to the pavement. The impact crushed the victims head and shattered a leg.

When Mr. Scales and family arrived at the scene half an hour after the accident the injured man was still lying on the pavement in a pool of blood, and nothing had been done for his relief. The family and others present were excited and had done nothing to relieve the victim's suffering. The Ballinger man at once urged someone to take Smith to Abilene to a hospital and the young man who was driving the automobile which struck him asked for someone to accompany him. When no one volunteered Mr. Scales said he would go, and held the wounded man in his arms in the coupe all the way back to Abilene. At a filling station on the outskirts of Abilene, Mr. Scales telephoned for a motor cop to escort the car through town so that no time would be lost. The policeman met the car on Butternut Street and a fast run was made to the hospital on the north side of the city but the injured man was pronounced dead when doctors examined him. Mr. Scales said he could not tell when the man died but that it was between the time they left the scene of the accident and arrival at the hospital.

After arriving at the hospital Mr. Scales and his family left for Ballinger. The owner of the coupe was being held by the police. Mr. Scales did not ascertain any of the particulars of the accident and did not know whether it was avoidable or not. He stated that the victim had a large family and appeared to be in destitute circumstances.

Arthur Heywood who has been with the Day Gin for the past three years has accepted a position as manager of a gin at Paint Rock and went to that city Monday morning to assume his duties. Mr. Heywood is an experienced gin man, well qualified to fill his new position.

Produce New Drought Grain
OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 15.—(AP)—A new feed grain produced by Fred Groff, Britton, Oklahoma farmer, has attracted the attention of the department of agriculture, and an official study of the plant is to be made. The grain, called "Grohoma," was produced by crossing kaffir corn and ribbon cane. It remained green during the severe drought this summer.

Founding of First Sunday School Celebrated by Religious Groups

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Founding of the world's first Sunday school, among the dirty, rowdy ragamuffins of an English factory town by Robert Raikes, British editor, in 1780, is being celebrated this year by religious organizations everywhere.

In 150 years the Sunday school idea has grown from the handful of rebellious street gamins gathered in a kitchen in Sooty Alley, Gloucester, England, until it embraces a world enrollment of 37,000,000.

The United States alone has 21,038,526 people in its Sunday schools, of whom 2,167,848 are teachers and officers. Nearly half the American population under 19 years of age, or 44.1 per cent, attends Sunday school. Kansas leads with 66.4 per cent, while Arizona and Montana are tied for last place with 22.3.

Sunday schools have improved in technique as they have grown in size.

Morrow to Ignore The Liquor Issue

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 15.—United States Ambassador to Mexico Dwight W. Morrow will ignore the liquor issue in the senatorial campaign, E. B. Mott, chairman of the state Republican executive committee, said today, explaining that both parties in New Jersey have declared for repeal of the eighteenth amendment.

The Republican platform will include foreign relations and domestic questions, one plank taking up the unemployment problem.

Morrow was nominated by the Republicans on a dripping wet ticket.

American Yacht is Leading Shamrock

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 15.—The American defender yacht Enterprise and Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger Shamrock V started today's race at 10:40 o'clock this morning.

The Enterprise was steadily drawing away from the Shamrock. Rounding the ten-mile marker the defender had a six-minute margin over its competitor.

At the 20-mile marker the Enterprise was leading by nine minutes and ten seconds. The Shamrock's only chance of winning seemed to be a breakdown by the Enterprise, which appeared unlikely. The challenger was over two miles behind with ten miles to go.

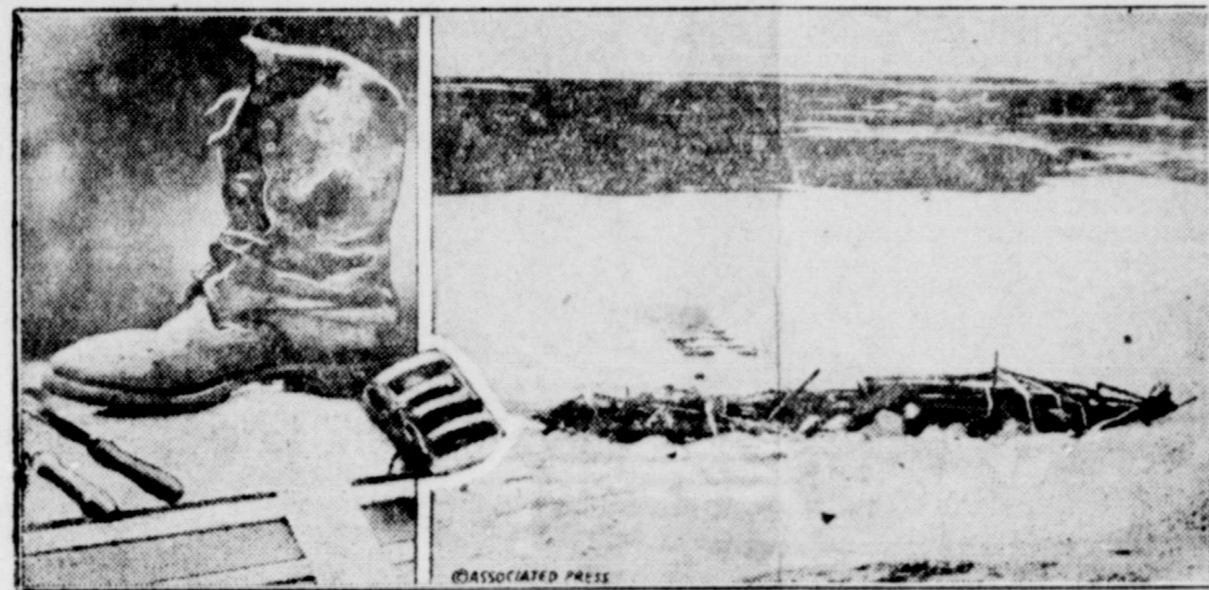
COUNTRIES TO EXHIBIT AT HOUSTON EXPOSITION

Inoculations to Start Next Week

The health committee of the Parent-Teacher Association is preparing for a drive this week to start their inoculation of children against diphtheria. All room mothers have been called to assist in the educational part of the campaign and plan this week to call on parents who have children who have never been inoculated and secure their consent. Before a child is given a dose of serum they must present a slip from their parents authorizing their child to receive the treatment.

The P.-T. A. will buy and furnish the serum to give all children in the local schools and arrangements have been made for the administering by physicians to children who are not able to pay for such services.

Those fostering the movement here are anxious to get the work started so that it will be completed as soon as possible and protect children this year as soon as cold weather starts. It is planned to get the educational part of the campaign with parents over this week so that children can receive their first dose next week.

The county health nurse has prepared cards so that an accurate check can be made of each dose given the children and also the Schick test when the doses are completed. The Schick test will be given merely to ascertain if children are immune.

Room mothers this week in making their round visiting with parents will try to make each parent realize the importance of giving the inoculations at this season of the year. Diphtheria thrives with the beginning of winter and with every child in the local school immune it would give mothers a feeling of safety. The greatest loss of time in the school is not from the actual cases but because many keep their children out when diphtheria is raging in the city. Parents are afraid of exposure and this handicaps school work.

J. D. Motley, C. W. Lehmburg and Paul Trimmer left Monday morning for Haskell to attend the diphtheria relief session called to meet there.

AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—The Texas railroad commission today announced it would give "the fullest consideration" to the proposed extension of the Texas & Pacific Railroad from Big Spring to Vega, answering requests from representatives of that territory who had besought the commission's active aid.

The attorney general's department also pledged its support, announcing the appointment of a member of the attorney general's staff to aid West Texas citizens in gathering necessary information in furtherance of the project.

The man driving on the highway has the legal right to drive 45 miles an hour and when the car will make that much, usually drives that fast and in many times exceeds the limit. Use every precaution along highways as they are dangerous with the utmost care being taken.

HOW'S your HEALTH

ACCIDENTAL POISONING

In case of accidents due to poisoning, while waiting for a doctor first aid should be administered as quickly as possible.

Try to discover the nature of the poison used. Knowing this, give an antidote, if you know what it is and have it available.

If you do not know the nature of the poison, or have not the specific antidote at hand, give the sufferer white of eggs beaten up in water, milk or strong tea.

These substances can do no harm, and do counteract a number of common poisons.

Except where poisoning is due to strong acids, or alkalies, try, after having given the antidote, to empty the stomach of its contents by vomiting or an emetic.

An emetic may be made by mixing a heaping teaspoonful of mustard with a cupful of lukewarm water. If mustard is not available, use a heaping teaspoonful of salt instead. Give it to the patient to drink.

If there is no vomiting within 10 minutes, repeat the dose. The syrup of Ipecac, two teaspoonful in a cup of lukewarm water, will also induce vomiting.

To make sure that the stomach

is completely emptied of the poisonous material, it is best to induce vomiting several times. Subsequently, the patient may have plenty of lukewarm water to drink.

In case of poisoning by acids, give baking sodas, chalk mixture, or the white of eggs beaten up with water or milk.

Unless you know exactly what and why you are doing something to the poisoned individual, especially in the case of poisoning by acids, don't do it. You may further injure the patient.

Aggies Working Hard in Practice

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—When the legislature begins its session in January it will be faced with the task of going over the biennial budgets of the various state institutions. It will be asked to appropriate \$45,000,000 to defray the cost of operating institutions for the two-year period starting Sept. 1, 1931.

This is a considerable increase over the appropriations submitted to the legislature last year and is due to enlargements and increased operating expenses. Deficiencies for the current biennium also are included in the next appropriation.

In recommending to the legislature the passage of the \$45,000,000 in appropriations, the board of control reduced the amounts asked by \$20,000,000, requests having been made for \$65,000,000.

The appropriation bill provides for the building, equipping and operation of four new agricultural experiment stations, one to be located at Waco, another in the Winter Garden district, another at Tyler, and a fourth at Abilene.

The bill also takes care of the Dickson Colored Orphanage, enlargements in the state auditor's office and the state psychopathic hospital now being erected at Galveston. An increase also was noted in the amount asked for the state prison system.

Several new buildings are recommended for the various educational institutions to be used as class room buildings and new structures have been recommended for some of the eleemosynary institutions. The board of control favored institutions which failed to receive new buildings two years ago in its recommendations to the legislature.

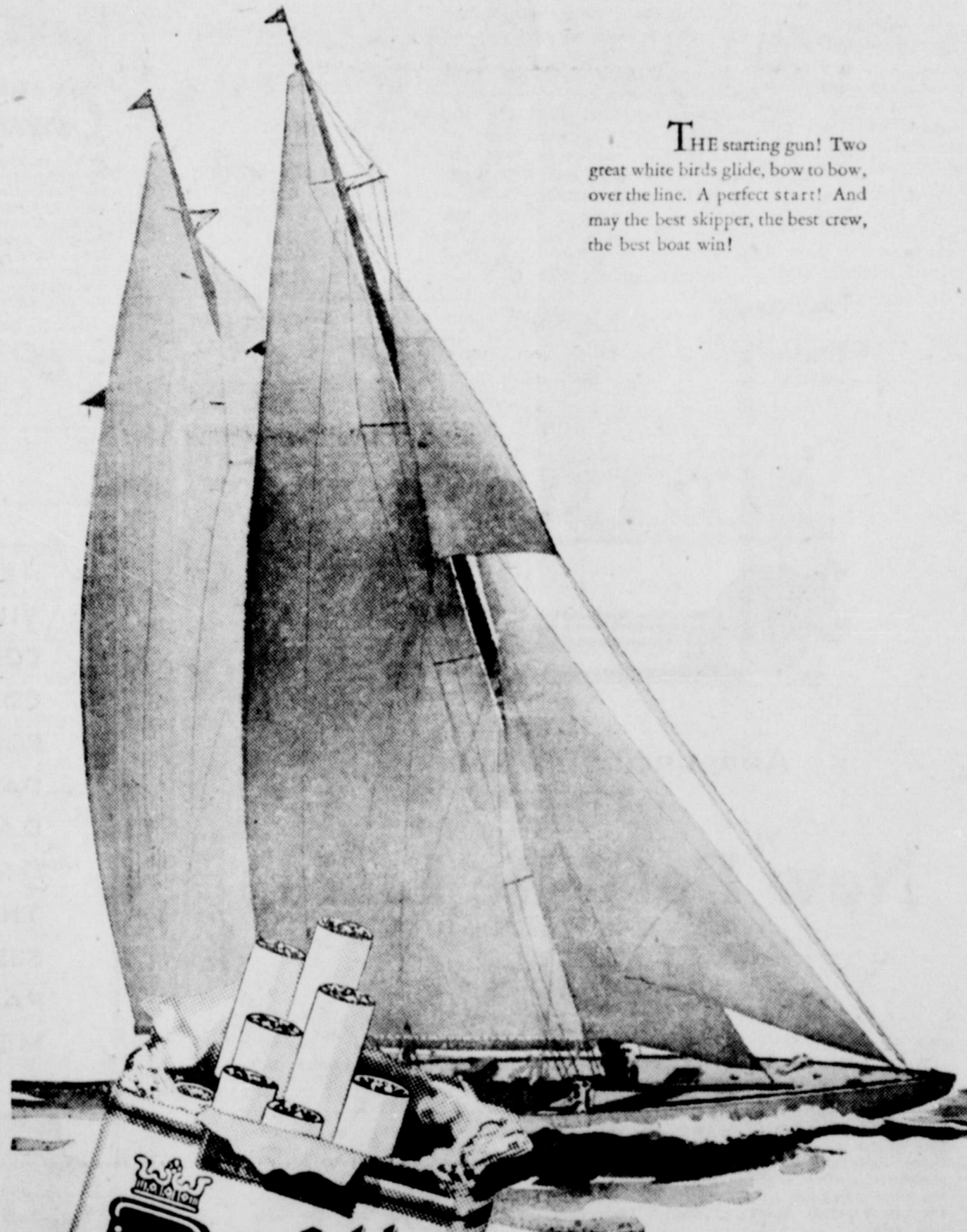

Her bill for tea for three in the tree shaded court of the most famous hotel in Paris totaled 46 francs, of \$1.90.

The service had been adequate but not unusual, nor had the tea been particularly good.

The girl from Washington laid ten francs on the plate, and the waiter took it like he had expected twice the amount.

The Parisienne was disgusted.

Her comment was that American tips had spoiled French waiters.

Rules Of Tipping

So the girl asked for precisions about tipping in the land that invented the pourboire, and this is what she learned.

"Waiters in ordinary restaurants serving ordinary food in the ordinary way—10 percent.

"Extraordinary waiters in ordinary restaurants and ordinary waiters in extraordinary restaurants—12 percent.

"Extraordinary waiters in extraordinary restaurants, 15 percent up to 100 francs, and after that you make your own rules."

Wine waiters, the Parisian woman explained, should be tipped apart.

Small Coins Scorned

Doormen, alias chasseurs, hat-check boys, otherwise vestiaires, attendants who hold red umbrellas over you when it is raining, dressing room attendants and such like rate one franc, she said.

Ushers in theatres, two movies and the Follies Bergere excepted, expect a franc for showing you to your seat.

Taxi drivers will not refrain from making remarks for less than a ten per cent pourboire. They frown upon sums of less than one franc and scorn coppers and the small coins with holes in the middle which represent a fraction of a cent.

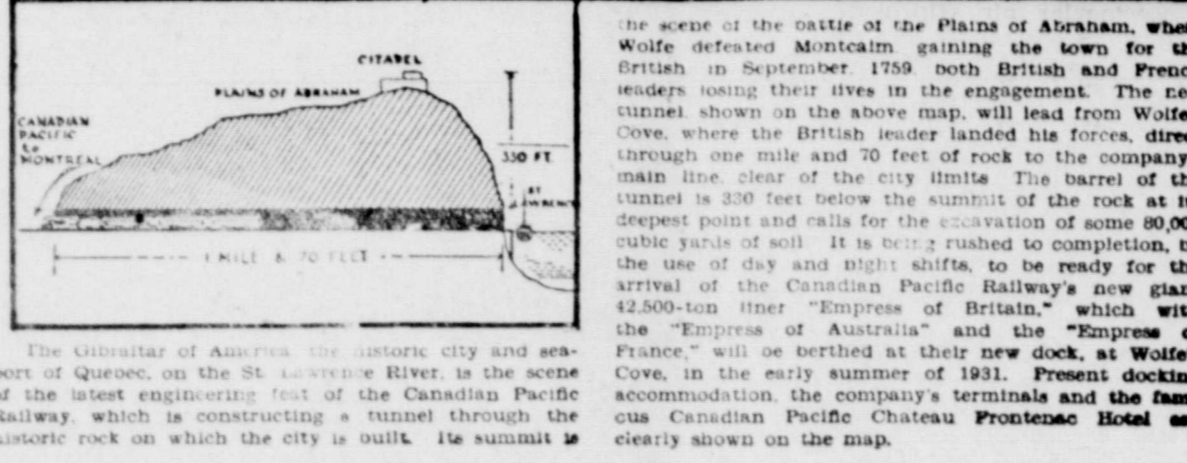
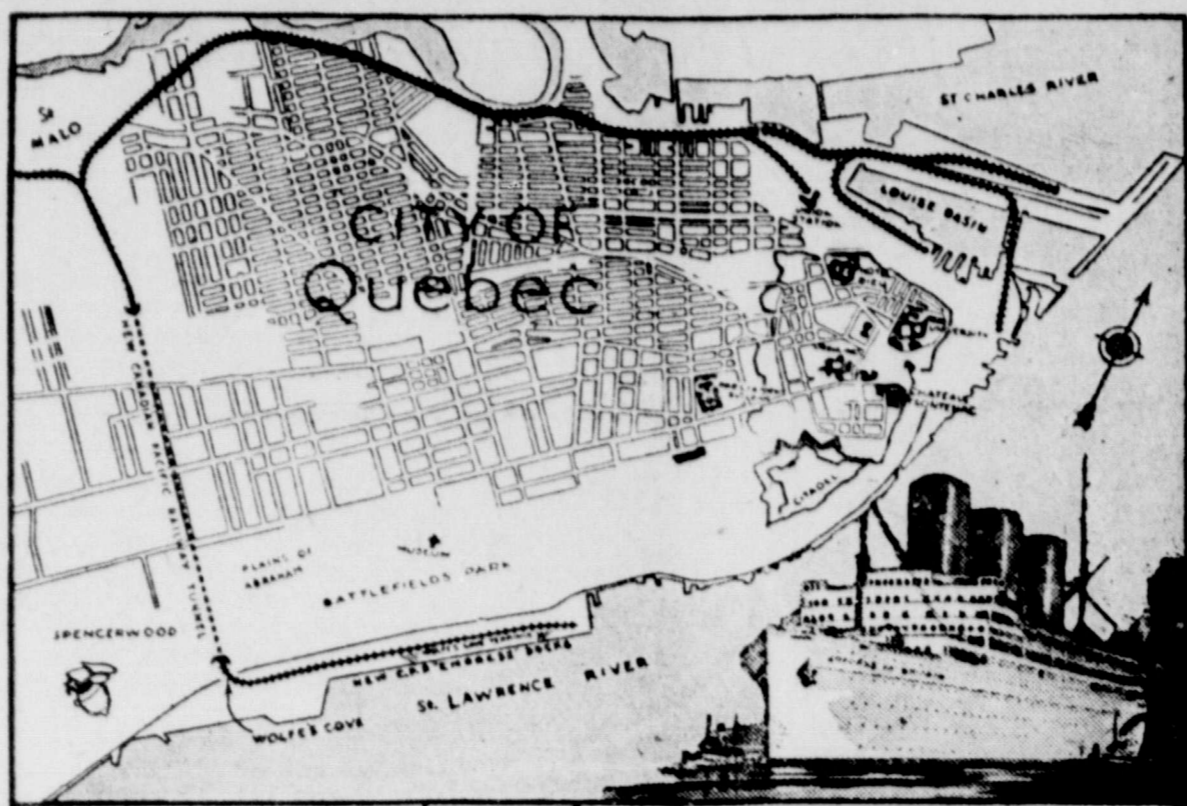

Building Tunnel Through Historic Rock



The Gibraltar of America, the historic city and seaport of Quebec, on the St. Lawrence River, is the scene of the latest engineering feat of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which is constructing a tunnel through the historic rock on which the city is built. Its summit is

the scene of the battle of the Plains of Abraham, where Wolfe defeated Montcalm gaining the town for the British in September 1759 both British and French soldiers losing their lives in the engagement. The new tunnel shown on the above map, will lead from Wolfe's Cove, where the British leader landed his forces, direct through one mile and 70 feet of rock to the company's main line, clear of the city limits. The barrel of the tunnel is 330 feet below the summit of the rock at its deepest point and calls for the excavation of some 80,000 cubic yards of soil. It is being rushed to completion, by the use of day and night shifts, to be ready for the arrival of the Canadian Pacific Railway's new giant 42,500-ton liner "Empress of Britain," which, with the "Empress of Australia" and the "Empress of France," will be berthed at their new dock, at Wolfe's Cove, in the early summer of 1931. Present docking accommodation the company's terminals and the famous Canadian Pacific Chateau Frontenac Hotel are clearly shown on the map.

Ballinger Duchess is Named for Exposition

The number of local students attending Sul Ross will make the game particularly interesting to Ballinger people and already a large crowd from here is planning to attend that game.

Runnels county will enter an exhibit in the agricultural display and C. W. Lehmborg, county agent, has a large part of the material already for the exhibit.

He will take this material to San Angelo before the opening date and have it decorated and on display when the gates are opened on September 22. Someone will stay with the booth during the fair to answer any question regarding Runnels county from visitors who are interested in this section.

A band contest will be run in connection with the big event and it is probable that the Ballinger band will enter that event to compete for prizes.

Matches, Smoking Lead in Fire Loss

(By Associated Press.)
AUSTIN, Sept. 15.—So many fires started by matches are due to the carelessness of smokers that the Texas fire insurance department has combined the hazards under the twin designation, "Matches-Smoking," and today it leads all other causes in its responsibility for fire destruction with an annual total charge against it approximating the huge sum of \$30,000,000 in the United States, according to J. W. DeWeese, state fire insurance commissioner.

"Needless to say," Mr. DeWeese said, "no match is safe from the standpoint of the fire hazard. Besides the possibility of staying lighted after it is discarded, the head may fly off when struck or ignition may occur by some means other than its normal use."

"The prominent place held by these modern firesticks among the originating causes of loss is understandable when the tremendous production of matches is contemplated. Each year about three hundred billion are consumed in the United States alone, or eight hundred thousand daily. Each of these matches hold the possibility of causing a disastrous fire, therefore, every time you strike one be careful what becomes of the burning stick. It may result in the destruction of your home and perhaps end the lives of those in it. Never cast away a match stick if it is still flaming or glowing because it is only too likely to ignite any inflammable material at hand.

"Every day children are losing their lives while playing with matches as shown from news reports from over the country. Matches should be kept in metal or earthenware containers well out of the reach of children. Obviously, they should never be allowed to amuse themselves with these small but dangerous fire makers.

"The total fire loss in Texas caused by matches and smoking

from 1925 to 1929, inclusively, approximates \$4,064,826. A total of 2,200 fires originated from this cause during that time. This means an average annual fire loss of \$612,967 from matches and smoking and a total of 444 fires from this particular cause each year.

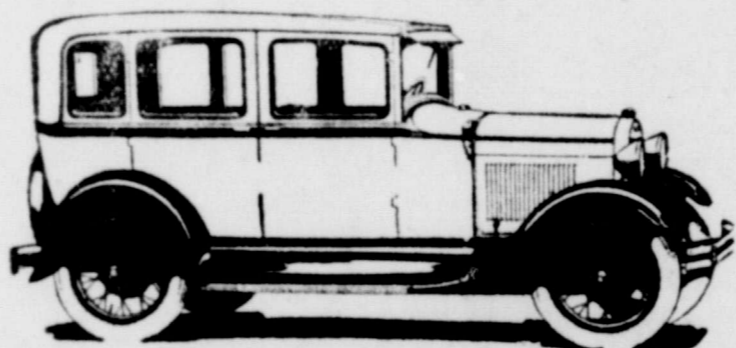
"There has been an increase in this particular hazard in the past few years, brought about by an increase in population and by a small per cent of women indulging in the smoking habit. However, it is to be observed that thus far women are more careful in disposing of their matches and cigarettes than men.

"The people, generally pay the cost brought about by the careless smokers and users of matches and this cost is prorated among our population through our system of taxation. This is one of the many reasons why the people of Texas should practice care with matches and with their smoking habit."
