Spain Finds Navy Weak in Defense For North Coast

MADRID, Oct. 16.—More submarines and more airplanes are needed by the Spanish navy to insure an adequate defense of its long coast line, says Salvadore Carvia, minister of marine.

He reached this belief after making preliminary studies of the annual September maneuvers of the Spanish fleet, which this year were held along the Cantabrian coast. The "enemy" fleet gained control of this coast with surprising ease.

Persons close to the government assert that the four-year-old building program will be continued, but with probably considerable supplements in air and undersea craft.

The September maneuvers, according to naval experts, showed decided weakness in the defense of the whole rich north coast region, one of the most important sections of Spain. It includes such ports as Bilbao, Gijon, San Sebastian and Santander and contains iron and coal. It is highly valued also as a manufacturing district.

Spain has in recent years been launching light cruisers, submarines and destroyers, believing that smaller craft are considerably more valuable to her than the heavier battleship and the naval building program is going forward unhampered despite cuts

in other expenses. Twelve submarines, twelve destroyers and two 10,000 ton cruisers remain to be launched, together with a considerable number of light auxiliary craft. It is believed the submarine portion of this program will be completed first and possibly augmented shortly, while more navy airplanes will be ordered.

CITRUS EXPERIMENTS MAY PROVE AID TO VALLEY

(By Associated Press)
 BROWNSVILLE, Oct. 16.—Development of one or more varieties of citrus fruit, which may prove of great value to the Lower Rio Grande Valley, either in earlier maturity, or in some other respect was indicated in a report made recently by William Friend, manager of the Valley experiment station at Weslaco, a branch of the Texas A. & M. College station.

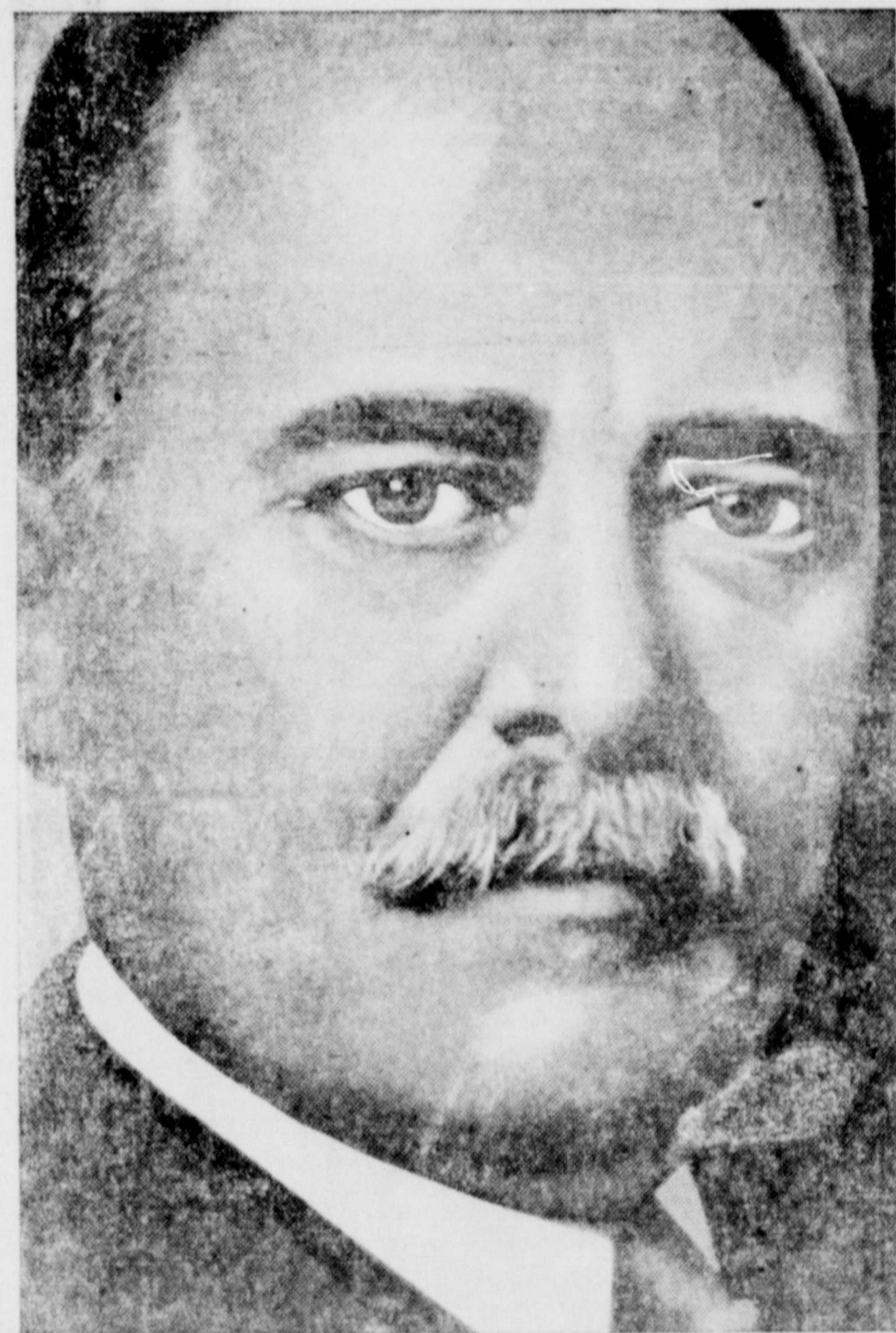
Friend reported that the station had been experimenting with three new kinds of citrus fruit. One of these, he said, appears to mature earlier and attain a larger size than the Marsh Seedless, the fruit which is now produced in largest quantities in the Valley. The Marsh is a late maturing fruit, usually being preceded on the market by the Duncan, which is a seeded variety.

Development of such a new variety would help to spread out the Valley season, growers said.
