## "Live at Home Credit Plan" Outlined by State Bankers

The Texas Bankers' Record in its November issue published details of a recent meeting held at Dallas of the executive committee of the Texas Bankers' Association. There were a number of invited guests present at the meeting, the purpose of which was to discuss the credit situation in Texas, particularly in the agricultural districts. A number of plans were discussed and the following live-at-home credit plan was adopted:

### Live-at-Home Credit Plan

Recognizing that the one crop farmer is a dangerous risk and that the only basis for a permanent agricultural policy that will improve credit and farming conditions is dependent on the farmer living at home, we make the following recommendations to the bankers of Texas with reference to those farmers who must depend upon mortgages as a basis of credit:

First, the farmer's program must include the following:

- A sufficient number of milk cows to provide a continuous supply of milk, butter and cheese for family consumption and a surplus to sell.
- A sufficient number of chickens to furnish ample home supply of eggs and meat, and a surplus for sale.
- A sufficient number of hogs, steers, muttons and lambs to provide an ample supply of meat which can be cured or canned.
- An all-year-round garden to produce an ample supply of vegetables.

Second—That no credit be extended to farmers with which to buy food that can be raised on the farm.

Third—That credit be extended on easy monthly payments or otherwise for the purchase of such livestock and poultry as the farmer needs to supply him with meat, milk, butter, eggs, etc., to meet his requirements at home and surplus sufficient to meet the monthly installments on his loans where market exists; such loans to be secured by the livestock purchase and sufficient additional collateral to make the loan good.

Fourth—Loans to be made on condition that farmer plant sufficient acreage in feed crops to take care of his livestock.

Fifth—That each farmer be required to make a statement giving in detail all the facts necessary for the banker to know in order for him to pass upon the desirability of the risk and security offered.

### Results of Plan

1. The farmer will have a continuous supply of food and income to meet payments upon his note. These payments together with increase of stock will pay the notes and leave the farmer with increased assets. Loans on mules and cotton, when paid, do not increase the farmer's assets while the mules are getting older each year.

2. The farmer needs little additional funds, if any, for crop purposes if he sells milks, butter, chickens and eggs, vegetables and other farm commodity.

3. If the farmer plants sufficient acreage in feed crops to take care of the "live-at-home" program, the cotton acreage reduction proposition will take care of itself. The planting of cotton will be secondary to the "live-at-home" program, whereas it has heretofore been primary in the credit policy of banks and primary in their losses.

### Plan of Organization

- That the bankers be organized into county or district organizations for the purpose of adopting "live-at-home credit policy" in line with these suggestions, only modified to meet local conditions.
- That the Texas Bankers' Association secure the cooperation of the following agencies in carrying into effect this program:
  - Newspapers and journals
  - A. & M. extension department
  - Commissioner of Banking, state of Texas
  - Chief bank examiner
  - All bank examiners
  - All county agents, home demonstration agents, and vocational agents
  - All chambers of commerce
- That loans extended for the purpose outlined, when properly secured, receive preferential classification by bank examiners.

## Legion Show to be Full Dress Affair

Members of the American Legion Auxiliary Thursday morning began a house to house canvass for the Legion show. Ducats which can be exchanged for reserve seat tickets were sold all over the city and the house is being filled up rapidly for the Monday night's performance, and a large number of seats are checked for the Tuesday night's presentation.

An orchestra will furnish music at intervals, specialties will be offered between the acts, and the play proper will furnish three acts of side-splitting laughter. ## 19 Killed in Storms; Property Damage High

### Santa Fe to Take Off Night Train

(By Associated Press) Tornadoes which hit Kansas, Oklahoma, and Arkansas yesterday claimed at least nineteen lives, injured scores, left hundreds homeless, and caused approximately \$1,000,000 property damage.

Fourteen persons were killed, forty-seven seriously hurt, and a hundred houses were destroyed at Bethany, a Nazarene church settlement near Oklahoma City.

Four persons were killed and eleven injured at the Camel Creek school house, four miles south of Bethany, when a twister hit the school building.

D. D. Powell, city recorder of Ola, Arkansas, was killed and his wife injured in a tornado which raze half of the business district of Ola.

Sixteen children and the teacher were injured when a twister demolished a rural school near Victoria, Kansas.

Twenty buildings were demolished and one man was injured at Neal, Kansas, during a tornado.

In Chicago they say that Vince Barton, outfielder purchased from Baltimore, probably will start the season for the Cubs in the place of the veteran Stephenson.

(By Associated Press) BURBANK, Calif., Nov. 20.—Three bodies in a pile of wreckage found in the Tehachapi foothills near here, today revealed the fate of the northbound Pacific coast airmail plane caught in a storm Tuesday.

Flavius A. Donaldson, pilot; George Rogers, mechanic; and Miss Jean Markow, passenger who was celebrating her eighteenth birthday by a flight to Portland, Ore., were dead.

There had been no fire. Searchers found ice on the wings, indicating the ship possibly had been forced down over rough territory. The theory was advanced that the plane was flying in a storm at the time of the crash, and the pilot was unable to see clearly the ground below.

BETTER X-RAY PICTURES

The X-ray does not produce pictures in the same manner as a camera. It produces what might more properly be termed shadowgraphs.

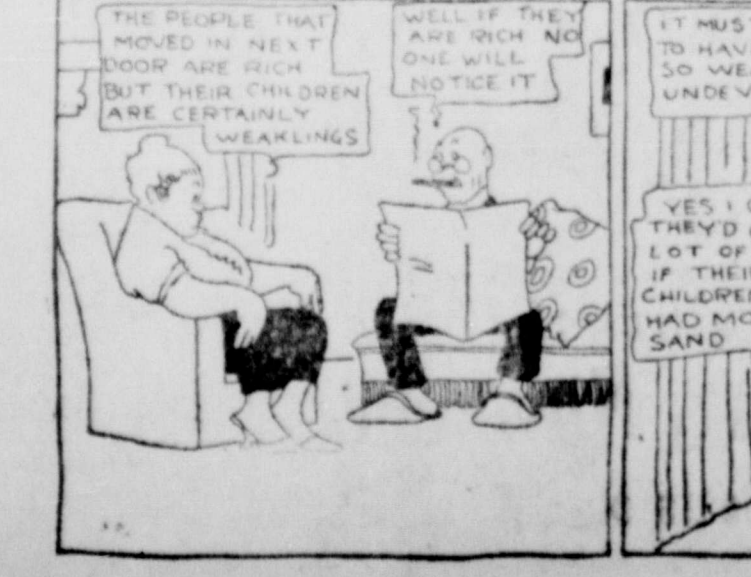

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# Hollywood Sights

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 20.—New Year's eve may be more than just another celebration in Hollywood this year—it may be the beginning of another "screen revolution."

What some screen observers have chosen to consider Charlie Chaplin's "experiment in silence"—Chaplin naturally sees nothing experimental about it.

—Will then have its premiere, and the results may go far towards eliminating excess dialog from other producers' pictures and even, some think, act toward restoring the non-dialog picture to grace.

"City Lights" is the only silent picture of any importance made in Hollywood since the town went talkie.

His Answer  
That Chaplin's picture, silent except for a synchronized musical score, will be successful is practically assured, because his name over any theater would draw crowds, and "City Lights" represents the utmost in his pantomimic art—his defiant answer to the microphone's usurpation of the screen.

The subject of interesting conjecture now is how far its success will influence other producers in their use of sound and dialog on the screen.

The Chaplin studio is unique in Hollywood, being the only lot not cluttered with vault-like sound stages. No microphones swing over the sets where Chaplin acts and directs the minutest details of his pictures.

There are no strained silences during scenes, as there are on sound stages; no hordes of mysterious electrical wizards reigning as lords of the set.

The studio is like a relic of the pre-talkie era, when pictures were made in free-and-easy fashion unmarred by electrical complications.

At Last  
Virginia Cherrill, the girl chosen by Chaplin for his leading lady,

has yet to be seen on the screen, but she has been well paid week after week for the delay in her debut.

Two years ago she had selected the evening dress she would wear to the premiere of the picture, but Chaplin's habit of working only when he chooses, of taking and retaking scenes for perfection, many of which never see the screen, has allowed fashion to outstep the little gown.

If she wore it now it no doubt would create a sensation, so unmoderated would it be and so radical have been changes in feminine styles.

# YEARY FAVORS COTTON ACREAGE REDUCTION LAW

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Nov. 20.—W. B. Yeary of Dallas, secretary-treasurer of the Farmers Marketing Association, has taken issue with the plan of Texas bankers to reduce cotton acreage. This plan would extend credit to those only who agree to cut their acreage 25 per cent.

Yeary said that such a plan discriminated against the small farmer who had to have financial help. He said the large landholder, financially independent and often the banker himself, would not be forced to cut his cotton crop.

The large landholders are the "one crop" farmers and those who produce the cotton surplus, he stated.

Yeary advocated cotton acreage by law, which he said was "equitable and fair."

### State Fire Losses Are Less this Year

Fire losses in Texas have decreased \$1,000,000 in the first ten months of 1930 according to a statement issued this month to all fire marshals and fire chiefs by J. W. DeWeese, state fire insurance commissioner.  
 Ballinger's fire loss to date is about \$14,000 greater than at this time last year due to some rather destructive fires but the department is making a special effort to hold losses to a minimum during the remainder of the year and feels that with the cooperation of citizens this can be accomplished.

Chief M. C. Atkins today urged that every resident have gas connections inspected, and that all flues be carefully examined before they are put to hard use this winter. Another hazard found during this season and one that the chief of police is observing closely is the burning of dead weeds about premises.

Many miscellaneous fire hazards are found in the average home and citizens are requested to inspect their premises and if any hazards are observed to remove them immediately.

The following letter was received here this week from the state commissioner:

To the Fire Marshals and Fire Chiefs of all Texas towns and cities:

Gentlemen:  
 "You will be pleased to learn that the fire losses in Texas for the first ten months of 1930 are approximately one million dollars less than the first ten months of 1929. This department feels that each of you have had a part in bringing about this reduction by reason of the hard work that you have done in your respective communities in keeping down fire hazards.

"The purpose of this letter is to make a direct appeal to each of you to give even closer attention to our inspection work during November and December, and we suggest that you make inspections more often during these two months of this year. Also, that you continue to remind the business and women and all your citizens of the importance of their being careful with fire, and that they be especially careful not to permit fire hazards in and about their premises and homes.

"Our records show that the greatest number of fires this year have occurred in the home, and with the beginning of winter there are numerous fire hazards that are likely to arise therein; therefore, you will realize the importance of our people keeping their homes clean and free from the many hazards that are so

likely to cause fires.  
 "According to the records of the National Board of Fire Underwriters of New York, it appears that the fire losses in the United States increased approximately 8 per cent during the first nine months of 1930 over the same period of 1929. However, we believe that Texas is one state that can show a decrease, but it is vitally important that our losses be low during the remainder of the year if this be our final showing.

"The people pay the cost of all fires that occur, and it is important that they be reminded the smaller annual fire loss that Texas has the less they will pay in insurance premiums for fire insurance.

"Are you ready and willing to do your part to keep the fire losses at a low figure during the remainder of 1930? We believe that you are."

### RED CROSS AIDS BRADY IN FLOOD RELIEF WORK

(By Associated Press)  
**BRADY**, Nov. 20.—Relief and rehabilitation work as a result of the disastrous flood which swept through Brady on October 6, has been completed by representatives of the National Red Cross in cooperation with the Brady Red Cross chapter.

While much of the reconstruction work remains yet to be done, all allotments have been made by Red Cross officials.

The final report showed that 65 families were given emergency and rehabilitation aid, two-thirds of whom were whites and one-third Mexicans. About 30 other families in the flood area, who sustained a heavy loss, were able to rebuild with out Red Cross assistance.

The total number of persons given emergency relief was 250.

While none of the eighty merchants whose business houses were inundated by the flood waters received any aid, practically all repairs in the business district have been completed, and most vestiges of the disaster have been erased.

The disaster of October 6 occurred as a result of a 27-foot rise of Brady Creek, which covered the low-lying residence and about eighty per cent of the business district and swept away many of the smaller homes.

In addition to conferring with the post officials Mr. Goode desires to meet those who have claims pending and who for one reason or another have never received action or final settlement on them.

Post Commander Frank C. Dickey urges that any disabled World War veteran who has a claim that has not been handled satisfactorily to be here on Dec. 1 so that the matter may be taken up with the state official in person. Following is a letter received by Commander Dickey from Mr. Goode:

"Dear Mr. Dickey:  
 "On Monday morning, December 1st, I am leaving Waco on my way to El Paso and will make stops in all towns on the way that have American Legion posts. At these stops I would like to meet the post officers, particularly the post service officers or whoever is doing the service work and all claimants in the territory who need assistance with claims for compensation or who wish to know anything about the benefits available for them or their dependents.

"I expect to be in your town about 8:00 p. m. Monday, December 1st, and can spend about half an hour with you. Will you please let me know whether or

not you can have the post officers and any disabled ex-service men present and what place I could meet you.

The convention proper decided not to hold a meeting in 1931, instead holding a series of regional campaign conferences.  
 Today's meeting, held behind closed doors, discussed steps to be taken to counteract "wet propaganda" claimed to be designed to injure the president. The details were not revealed.
