Concho to Provide 100 Foot Road Right-of-Way

An important step was taken by the commissioners court of Concho county Monday when it issued orders for script to buy the necessary 100-foot right-of-way in that county for highways No. 4 and No. 9. Counties along these routes recently have become more interested in meeting state and federal requirements on designated highways. Most of the counties have complied with the terms and recently secretaries of chambers of commerce in this section visited in Concho, Kimble, Menard and Real counties where little or nothing had been done, conferring with the various commissioners' courts.

The right-of-way was guaranteed immediately at Menard, a move was made for the same in Kimble and a campaign was begun in Real to widen the roads to meet requirements. Concho, adjoining Runnels on the south, of course is of more interest in Ballinger. Runnels and counties to the north have right-of-way and paving already built or guaranteed.

Little trouble is anticipated in securing the right-of-way in Concho county as will be observed in the following item published by the Concho (Paint Rock) Herald:

Some months ago, the state highway commission proposed to provide drainage structures and grading on these highways provided the county furnished 100 foot right-of-way on lines surveyed by the commission's engineers. The most pressing need for right-of-way being that of No. 9 from Eden west to the county line, the court purchased that, and fences have already been moved over most of it. This was bought with local funds which are not sufficient for procuring the balance of the right-of-way on No. 9 and that of No. 4.

"Both of these highways have federal as well as state designations, and the road committees of the county, realizing the importance of immediately securing permanent designation and the opportunity of providing employment to local people, presented petitions signed by several hundred citizens asking the court to provide funds for immediate purchase of the right-of-way. The court, after hearing the arguments presented, passed an order authorizing the issuance of time warrants necessary for such right-of-way.

"Surveys have been made along these lines as required by the federal government and it is probable that the route will be selected within the next few weeks. In making selection of the route the commissioners' court and the highway commission will confer with the federal engineer.

"The final location of these two highways will mean much to the county as it will do away with uncertainties as to permanent designations and will relieve the county of the heavy cost of maintaining these highways. No. 4, reaching from the north Panhandle to Brownsville, is the longest state highway in America. It is now designated as a federal highway as far south as Junction. No. 9 already carries federal designation all the way through.

"The action of the commissioners provides right-of-way from the Runnels county line south to Junction as the commissioners' courts of Menard and Kimble counties have already taken similar action."

PARIS, Dec. 13.—The newly formed cabinet of Premier Theodore Steeg ran into its first misadventure today when one of the under-secretaries, Etienne Riche, informed Steeg he would be unable to stay in the cabinet.

This report was regarded in French political circles as the forerunner of difficulties expected when Steeg presents his new cabinet to the chamber of deputies next week.

United Club Work Started in County

A movement to unite 4-H club work and the agricultural courses taught in the public schools in this county is to be inaugurated at Crews, C. H. Grounds, principal of the Crews schools, and C. W. Lehmburg, county agent, are working out a plan whereby both the school course and club activities will be greatly furthered. Work done in each class will be credited on about a 50-50 basis.

Mr. Lehmburg plans to interest other schools of the county in this plan and if arranged club work as well as school agricultural study will be stimulated.

The following plan dividing the four principal heads of club work into divisions has been submitted and agreed upon:

Field Crops

1.—Testing of Field Seeds: (a) corn, (b) grain sorghums, (c) cotton, (d) small grains. (To be carried out in class room.)

2.—Judging of Field Crops: (a) corn, (b) grain sorghums, (c) cotton, (d) small grains, (e) bagging of heads, etc., to keep varieties pure, (f) selecting seed in field where characteristics of plant, environment of plant, etc., can be observed. (To be carried out partly in class room and partly in field.)

3.—Testing of Soils: (a) water-holding capacity, (b) acidity, (c) fertility, etc.

4.—Preparation of Seed Bed: (a) proper preparation of soil, (b) cultural methods, (c) improvement of physical condition of soil, (d) application of fertilizer, (e) rotation of crops, (f) running terrace lines.

Livestock Projects

(a) Studying dairy breeds and types, (b) studying beef breeds and types; ditto for hogs, sheep, (c) judging the different kinds of livestock, (d) testing milk and cream by the Babcock test, working out balanced rations.

(a) Studying the different breeds and types, (b) culling, (c) judging, (d) working out balanced rations, (e) keeping records, (f) classing and grading turkeys by U. S. Standard grades.

Census Announces Cotton Consumed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The census bureau today reported cotton consumed in November totaled 414,887 bales of lint and 54,777 bales of linters, as compared with 541,153 bales of lint and 63,214 bales of linters during November of last year.

Wales to Carry British Trade Hopes On Business Trip to South America

Now he has been practicing it again and at a party in his honor tangoed with the daughter of the Brazilian ambassador.

Prince George, who will accompany him, also has learned the steps and thus they are both fitted with an essential social grace—for if business and social talk pall one may always dance.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 13.—The department of interior today issued orders forbidding American and other foreign physicians from practicing in Mexico.

The step is reported to have been taken to protect Mexican doctors from competition.

Turkeys Rushed to Christmas Market

Turkeys continued to pour into Ballinger Saturday and to date the county association has received about 72,000 pounds on the Christmas market. A large number of turkeys is being bought by local poultry companies and prepared for shipment. The Christmas market will soon close and raisers are bringing in all their turkeys that they will offer for sale this year.

The highest price paid so far this year, according to C. W. Lehmburg, county agent, was 22 cents. The usual price has stuck around 20 cents which is considerably better than the price of the Thanksgiving market.

Mr. Lehmburg stated that approximately 90 per cent of the turkeys shipped from here had graded as prime and choice and very few had run below medium. Turkeys here are being shipped to eastern markets and for that reason all shipments will have to be made soon in order for them to reach their destination before the holidays are over.

MADRID, Dec. 13.—In a furious battle near Ayerbe, at dawn today, federal troops took a hundred prisoners, including eight officers, seized rebel equipment, and drove a revolting infantry regiment back upon the garrison town of Jaca.

Prime Minister Berenguer asserted that the engagement before Jaca terminated the open revolution which started in Spain yesterday, and that government troops controlled the Jaca area. A thousand rebel soldiers were trapped in a mountain pass, federals surrounding the stronghold. Loyal troops from Saragosa continued to march on Jaca after the engagement. Berenguer declared.

LONDON, Dec. 13.—A report received here today from Madrid said several leaders of the revolt in Spain would be shot tomorrow.

Pioneer Texas Woman Dies

BEAUMONT, Tex., Dec. 13.—Mrs. Pauline Coffin, 94, pioneer of this section of the state and a personal friend of General Sam Houston, who had lived in Texas under five flags, died at her home here today.

Born in Nacogdoches in 1837, Mrs. Coffin had lived in the same house for ninety-one years.

HOW'S your HEALTH

APPENDICITIS, III.

Sir William Osler stated that inflammation of the appendix is the most important of the acute intestinal disorders.

Appendicitis is a disease of the young, 50 per cent of the cases occurring in those under 20 years of age. It appears to be more common among males than among females.

There appears to be an hereditary influence predisposing the individual to inflammation of the appendix, several cases of appendicitis in one family being a fairly common occurrence.

The exciting causes of appendicitis are many. The most common appear to be chronic constipation and indigestion. Appendicitis may be brought on by injury due to a direct blow, or even more commonly by straining in heavy lifting.

Foreign bodies in the appendix were once held to be a common cause of inflammation. While it

is true that occasionally these may be found in the appendix, and may be held responsible for the disease, the authentic instances in which foreign bodies were present in the appendix are extremely rare.

In 1,000 cases carefully examined by Bell, only five foreign bodies were found in appendices removed. These were a fishbone, an apple core, two pins and a worm. Fruit seeds in particular were only subject to suspicion, but these may, for all practical purposes, be exempted from the charge of causing appendicitis.

While constipation, indigestion, injury and foreign bodies may be considered as exciting causes, in the last analysis appendicitis is due to germs. These germs may be confined to the appendix, or may affect the appendix as part of their general invasion of the body.

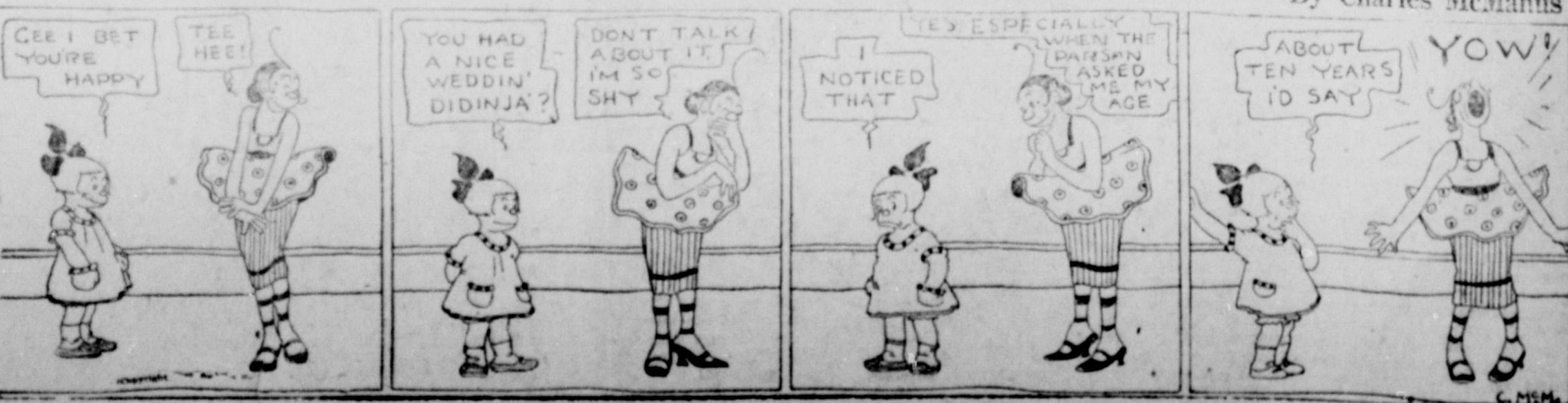

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Fame in song awaits five boys and five girls, the pick of the country. Selected in radio tests that included local, state and finally district trials, they are to participate as finalists in the National Radio Audit Sunday night, December 14.

Not only will each have an opportunity to demonstrate to a nation-wide audience his or her ability as a singer, but each will receive a scholarship. Each also

will get a cash award, a gold medal and a special gold decoration. The finals are to be broadcast by WEFW and coast to coast National Broadcasting Company chain, starting at 9:15 p. m. (EST) and lasting an hour. Each singer will be allotted an equal period before the microphone.

First place carries with it \$5,000 for each girl and boy and two years' tuition; second place, \$3,000 each and one year's tuition; third place, \$2,000 and one year's

tuition; fourth place, \$1,500 each and one year's tuition; and fifth place \$1,000 each and one year's tuition. Besides the trip to New York the finalists are to visit Washington as a part of their reward. The participating singers and the districts they represent follow:

Women Oil Promoters Strike Pay After Much Bad Luck

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, December 13.—The 10-year struggle of an oil company, owned almost entirely by two women, to find paying oil in western Hidalgo county, in the lower Rio Grande Valley to all reports has brought bright prospects again after a series of misfortunes stretching back through all the years.

The Fernandez No. 5 is being cleaned out to its total depth of 4,226 feet and looks, according to reports, that oil is coming at last. The No. 5, drilled by the Dayle L. Smith company, controlled by Mrs. Dayle Smith of McAllen, and her aunt, Mrs. A. A. Cornell, shook the countryside in January, 1920, with a mighty roar of gas for nearly four days before it was brought under control. Then came one of the "hard luck" incidents that had dogged the company so long. The driller left his charge and went away to sink a wildcat test. New ten months afterward, work has been resumed.

The first test, the Daskan No. 1, went down to 2,300 feet early in 1920 without difficulty. Just below that level a 22-foot oil and gas sand was struck. Here the driller announced that well was ruined and that an offset must be tried. It, too, showed evidence of production—at 2710 feet—but the flux became active again. The boiler was lost, it was discovered that the casing had parted at 2,600 feet and could not be straightened. Finally, the derrick was blown down.

The story of the Fernandez No. 1, drilled along the same ridge as the Daskan, furnishes another example of ill fortune. At 2,300 feet a "showing" was encountered, but one morning, after the crew had had the night off, a round chunk of iron or steel was found to have clogged the hole 250 feet down. It could not be dislodged.

The Daskan No. 2 got a showing too, but suddenly water appeared in the sand and the well was abandoned.

Thirteen wells have been tried in the 11 years, and 32 drillers have been employed. The operations have been within an area of 150 square miles. Place your order with Sam Behringer for Christmas Turkey, relieving your mind of this worry. 11-3td

NO BANK FAILURES (By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Dec. 13.—No Texas banks failed during November, according to Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the bureau of business research of the University of Texas.

Cox's report showed the number of failures in all lines increased from 45 in October to 64 in November and total liabilities of bankrupt companies more than double, increasing from \$940,000 to \$1,921,000. Assets of failing concerns totaled \$462,900.

County Ginnings 29,305 to Dec. 1

Cotton ginnings announced for Runnels county on Dec. 1 were 29,305 bales. Since that time sufficient cotton has been ginned to pass the 30,000 bale mark and fulfill the estimate of most careful cotton men which was made early in the season.

The announcement was made Saturday by W. A. Esmond from the government report of ginnings and Mr. Esmond estimated the crop would reach far past the 30,000 mark before all the cotton in the county is finally gathered.

On Dec. 1 last years ginnings in this county were 41,730 bales with a good amount of cotton yet in the field.

Most cotton this year is already gathered and farmers have sowed some cotton land in small grain and some has been plowed and turned under. A few fields still have remnants of cotton to pick and children work after school and on Saturday to gather the scattering crop.

The ginnings already announced for Runnels county will put it in the lead of all West Texas counties and in most cases with a crop two-thirds bigger than most counties.

New Stop Signs Installed Here

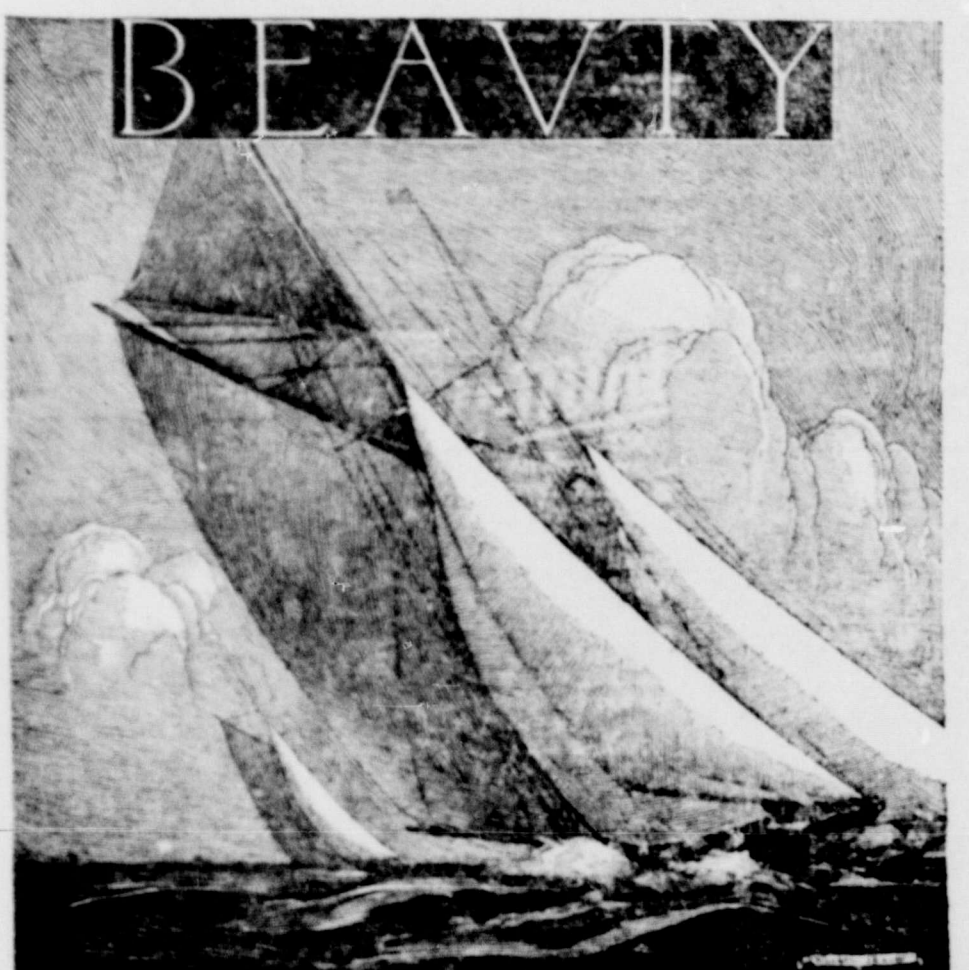

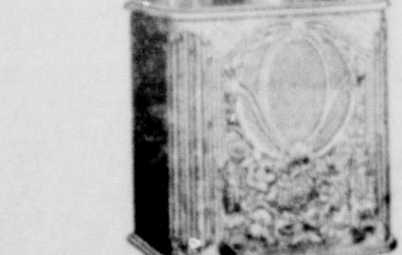
