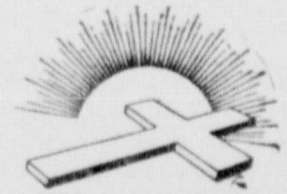

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What church will you attend? Eleven churches in Ballinger today extend a cordial invitation to worship to every citizen—man, woman, child—in the city. At each church the resurrection of the Saviour will be celebrated with fitting service, both by word and song, and at those conducting Sunday schools attendants will study the Bible lesson of the resurrection. The average church attendance in Ballinger is less than one-fourth of the population. It is the hope of each pastor and each loyal church member that this will be increased on Easter Sunday to several thousand and that all the people will worship in some way during the day. Attend at least two services during the day.

Fair weather is promised for Easter in Ballinger. The weather man predicts frost for early Sunday morning but fair weather and rising temperature for the remainder of the day. Ballinger was thronged with shoppers Saturday and it is evident that people expect to wear their new spring apparel for Easter. Local dry goods houses were crowded during the afternoon and especially those who have used advertising mediums to create additional Easter shopping. Parking spaces were at a premium during the afternoon and the crowd remained on the street until a late hour before starting for their homes.

Are you going to be one of the wheel-horses to pull ahead with the work of Clean-Up Week? Some are ready to do their full share while others will probably let their unkempt premises mar the appearance of their neighbors. Clean-up campaigns can only be successful when 100 per cent cooperation is received. HOW'S your HEALTH?



COMFORTING THE SICK There is more to the treatment of the sick than making a diagnosis and prescribing a remedy. The comfort of the patient is to be considered—and sometimes this is more important than either diagnosis or drugs. For nature may heal of its own accord, but—as an example—bed sheets which wrinkle do not automatically stretch smooth again. The comfort of the patient is most often neglected in the minor illnesses. In the more serious illnesses, nursing help usually tends to his wants and his comforts too. Children are particularly liable to suffer from want of care, for the older person will complain while the child will suffer in silence or whimper unimportantly. In all illnesses, particularly those associated with fever, care should be taken to keep the mouth scrupulously clean and wholesome. This implies more than brushing the teeth. The tongue should be cleaned by scraping. A whalebone or celluloid scraper can be secured in any drug store. To remove the debris that accumulates on the soft tissues a gargle should be used. This may be used by dissolving a teaspoonful of salt in a glass of water. The citrus foods, that is, oranges, lemons and grapefruit, have a decidedly pleasant effect on the mouth. The nose and throat too need careful attention. When discharges accumulate, dry in the nose and form scabby gelatinous masses, breathing is obstructed. The patient then breathes through his mouth, and this in turn aggravates the condition. The nose and throat then should be kept clean and clear by means of cotton-covered probes dipped in a simple mineral oil. They may also be cleaned by the aid of sprays, using a salt solution similar to the one advised for gargling.

ROAD BUILDERS IN IOWA FIND TRACES OF ICE AGE

Milk for Health Week---April 5th to 12th

Milk is Considered Best Food for Good Health

Milk and cream together, either by themselves or in combination with other foods, make up about one-sixth by weight of all the food eaten by the average American family. Milk supplies in particular convenient and usable form, materials that children need if they are to develop strong, normal bodies; and it is a valuable food for adults, especially when combined with such foods as cereals and green vegetables. Almost all the milk and dairy products in this country and most civilized countries where the climate is favorable, come from the cow.

In parts of the world where cows do not thrive, other animals' milk has proved satisfactory. Goat's milk, for example, is common in the rough, hilly districts of Europe, in Central America, and even in some parts of the United States. Buffalo's milk is much used in India and llama's milk in South America. Camel's milk is well liked in the desert countries. Sheep's milk is used in Europe and elsewhere for making certain kinds of cheese, while the milk of the reindeer serves as food in the Arctic regions.

The composition of cow's milk varies, but on the average, however, it contains about 87 per cent water and 13 per cent solids, consisting of proteins, fats, sugar and a variety of mineral substances. Milk proteins, or casein, help to build muscle and tissue. Fats are the most concentrated fuel foods in the diet, and from the commercial standpoint fat is the most profitable substance in the milk, since it is the source of butter and is an important constituent of many kinds of cheese. The fat of milk, known as butter fat, is in the form of small globules, varying in size in the different kinds of milk and being lighter than water, these globules tend to rise to the top of the milk as it stands, thus forming cream. Milk sugar, or lactose, belongs to the group of nutrients called carbohydrates, and it supplies energy to the body. Mineral constituents of milk are especially important to the body, as they contain phosphorus, iron and lime.

Phosphorus is fairly abundant in milk; not much iron, what little there is can be easily used by the body. Milk is much richer in lime, the chief constituent of bone and teeth, than are most other foods and this is one of the reasons why it is an excellent food for children.

During the last decade milk has been found to be an important food for man, the discovery of this fact placed milk in a class by itself as a food for children and has furnished important grounds for an increased direct consumption of milk in the home, and for general use of pure dairy products.

Consumption of unsafe milk is detrimental to the health of the public and the dairy industry.

The consuming public should use discrimination in selecting safe milk. In order for the milk to be clean it must first of all be from healthy cows. After milk has been produced it should be kept clean, covered and in a cool place; these three points consumer as well as producer should never disregard.

No matter how well milk has been handled up to the time it is delivered to the consumer it cannot be expected to keep well if it is carelessly handled. Sometimes milk is delivered early and remains out-of-doors in a place exposed to sunlight and perhaps accessible to cats and dogs until 9 or 10 o'clock which is unsafe.

As soon as possible after delivery milk should be put in a cool, clean place and kept there until used. The best temperature for keeping milk is fifty degrees Fahrenheit, or less. Bottled milk should be kept covered to exclude not only dirt and bacteria, but also flavors and odors, which it readily absorbs from such foods as onions, cabbage, fish, etc.

The United States Department of Public Health has standardized an ordinance which known as the standard milk ordinance. The State Department of Health, Austin, in a bulletin shows that ninety-five progressive cities in Texas have adopted this ordinance, Ballinger being one. This ordinance is a system of classifying fluid milk into four grades, "A," "B," "C" and "D" and provides for its sale under grade label. Grade "A" is the highest quality that can be sold under this label. The grades of milk are based on the extent of protective and sanitary precautions which are observed in its production and subsequent handling designed to prevent disease infection, and to produce a clean and good quality of milk. The producer is given credit for these efforts through the grade label which tells the consumer what he has done to make the milk safer and to produce a higher quality product; in this manner also the public is officially informed of the milk offered for sale.

Grade "A" raw milk has twenty-five items which begin with the health of the cow and end with the health of the milk. The milk is tested in the city laboratory for confirmation of grades, the bacterial count as indicated by the laboratory check-up must come within the bacterial limits as specified for the grade received under the control items. Grading of pasteurized milk is controlled by surrounding the pasteurization process of graded raw milk with twenty-four additional protective and sanitary items.

The "Grade A Pasteurized Milk" label means to the consumer, first, that the plant has complied with the twenty-four standard requirements for plants; second, that it has used only grade "A" or "B" raw milk in the pasteurization process, and that the bacterial count of the output is within the standard limits. Statistics show that about seven-tenths of a pint of milk per capita is consumed daily by Ballingerites. There is an abundance of good, wholesome milk produced here, and parents should encourage their children to drink more of it, for it gives the best return for money expended on account of its high food value and its low price.

RECORD WEIGHT ACHIEVED BY YEAR-OLD BULL CALF

(By Associated Press) SHOALS Ind., Apr. 4.—Equity Idolmere, sleek-coated and aristocratic-looking, is the world's champion baby weight-gainer.

This year-old Angus bull calf weighs 1,249, an unprecedented addition of avoirdupois for that class of cattle. Purdue University recorded after checking the data of Rolfe Hendrix, his owner. The Hendrix farm is made up of 405 acres of Martin county hills, only 105 of which are tillable. This young bull, however, was not permitted to roam the 300 acres of pasture and woodland. When two and one-half months old he was put in a box stall and there he remained while other calves were permitted to explore the hills and valleys.

FIVE TO GET SCHOLARSHIPS AS FARM JUDGING PRIZES

(By Associated Press) LUBBOCK, Tex., Apr. 4.—Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological College, has announced that scholarships to Texas Tech will be awarded five boys won first places in recent farm judging contests sponsored by the school.

Boys who will receive the scholarships are: M. Jones, Dublin, first place in dairy cattle judging; M. Windon, McLean, first in farm shop judging; F. C. Schillingbury, Dublin, first in livestock judging; L. Smith, Post, first in plant production judging; and W. Smith of Hale Center, first in poultry judging.

ANCIENT MOUNDS PICTURE RACE OF INDIAN TRADERS

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Apr. 4.—Prof. A. B. Kelly of the University of Illinois, after a month's laboratory study of relics removed when an Indian mound near here was razed for truck garden acreage, concludes that the prehistoric mound builders stripped the flesh from their honored dead before burial.

Beads and shells, discovered in large quantities, lead him further to suppose that the aborigines were active in trade, probably trafficking with tribes far distant from their now extinct metropolises.

The Cahokia mounds, one of the largest groups in the United States, center about Mank's mound, the largest in North America. Its builders lived in a city stretching over at least six miles.

"The construction of such large mounds," says Dr. Kelly, "required vast reservoirs of labor and the strongest of motivations, such as

Pine Tree Beat Man on Use of I-Beam Design

(By Associated Press) SEATTLE, Wash., Apr. 4.—The I-beam—form of greatest strength in steel—was invented by tree roots.

The trees use it for the same purpose that man applies the shape in his building materials, for greater strength.

The latest example of I-beam shaped roots is found in bogs near Seattle by George B. Riggs, professor of botany, and E. S. Harter, of the college of forestry, at the University of Washington.

Their curiosity was aroused by tall pines in bogs which stood uncut while similar pines in nearby solid ground were uprooted in strong winds.

They found first of all, they report to the American Association for the Advancement of Science, that these bog pine roots were all near the surface, barely two feet deep, spreading in a top layer of peat. But the roots had enormous spread being twice as long as young trees, and running out 47 feet for a 60-foot tall tree.

This spread accounted only partly for the pine's tight hold on the ground. Virtually none of the old roots were round. They had assumed the familiar shapes of structural steel, some of them

PESTILENCE THREAT SEEN IN AUSTRALIA'S BIG GRAIN SURPLUS

(By Associated Press) SYDNEY, Australia, Apr. 4.—With about 200,000,000 bushels of unsold wheat in storage fears for a plague of vermin, followed by a national pestilence, are growing in Australia.

In 1915-16 when great quantities of grain were held over, there was a plague of mice and rats. Caught in huge traps, the vermin were carted away in trucks by the ton.

If something cannot be done to shift the present harvest it is feared that a greater plague, of which signs are not wanting, will be created. Silos and grain sheds are full to overflowing with wheat, the terminal ports and railways are congested, and in the country wheat is stacked and stored everywhere.

CAPITOL News

AUSTIN, April 5—There have been more secret meetings of committees of the House of Representatives this year than any time in recent years.

For a time the house committee on state affairs had a rule that it should go into executive session every time a vote was taken. On several occasions, however, the rule was suspended, members stating they did not mind anyone knowing how they voted.

Committees on appropriations, revenue and taxation, and agriculture are other groups which have resorted to the executive session practices on one or more occasions.

Some committeemen favoring executive sessions feel that publicity while legislation is in its formative stages is harmful. Others feel that outsiders interfere with the committee deliberations and it is hardly fair to admit newspapermen and exclude other representatives of the public.

Capitol correspondents have become somewhat perturbed by the frequency of the executive sessions and their protests in some instances have brought results.

Senate committees with one exception have not had any executive sessions. The exception is the committee on governor's Sterling nominations. It is an established custom that governor's appointments shall be considered in executive session, both in committee, and in the Senate.

Certain Senators because of "leaks" from their executive sessions and gave vent to their resentment. However, these "leaks" have existed for some time and probably will continue.

Governor Sterling was getting along beautifully with the legislature as long as he did not give them any suggestions. When he sent it his message his troubles began. Both the message endorsing the Petach public utilities bill and that recommending the creation of an oil and gas conservation commission were criticized.

But perhaps Governor Sterling feels like Dan Moody, former governor, that it is better to present a program and lose than not to present one and make no enemies among the legislators.

B. J. Forbes of Weatherford, minister-member of the House of Representatives, this year, asked for two committee assignments, the committee on criminal jurisprudence and that on liquor traf-

But Reverend Forbes' resents being called radical. He let that be known when he replied to an Austin sports writer for criticizing his opposition to the boxing bill. Representative Forbes believes he expresses the views of thousands and thousands of good men and women in Texas.

The Weatherford minister is a tireless worker for prohibition. Part of the credit for the Senate committee on criminal jurisprudence voting an unfavorable report on the House bill to give the suspended sentence benefits to liquor law violators over 25 years old should go to him. The bill by Representative Weinert of Seguin, had passed the House over Reverend Forbes' strenuous objections.

One of Forbes' latest proposals was to make it illegal to possess liquor except for medicinal, scientific or religious purposes. Now, it must be proved that the liquor was for the purpose of sale. That is a difficult matter sometimes, Representative Forbes explained.

The Parker county representative said he doubted the wisdom of Senator Morris Sheppard's proposal to make the buyer of liquor equally guilty with the seller. "We must have somebody to testify in order to convict the bootlegger," Reverend Forbes stated.

Representative Forbes never goes on the junketing trips which the legislature sometimes takes on week ends. However, he keeps a record of all the Saturdays his fellow-members are not working. Then, if near the end of the session the legislators find themselves hopelessly piled up with work and ask for Sunday meetings, Reverend Forbes can point to the Saturdays they could have worked and did not.

STEALS PALM LEAVES FOR SALE TO CHURCH
SAN ANTONIO, Apr. 5—A new racket has been bared in San Antonio.

A San Antonio resident was awakened early in the morning by a rustling in his yard. He saw a man cutting the huge palm fronds from trees in the yard. He obtained a shot-gun, surprised the intruder, and held him until police arrived.

The culprit admitted he was stealing the palm leaves to sell to churches for use in the religious celebration of Palm Sunday.

May 1 Deadline To Pay Dog Tax

Chief of Police J. L. Moreland announced Saturday morning that new dog license tags have been received. They may be obtained at the city secretary's office in the city hall at \$1 each.

All dogs kept within the city limits are subject to this tax. A dog is considered a resident of the city regardless of whether it is confined to the owner's premises or roaming at large in the city.

The tax entitles the animal to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness until March 31, 1932. Payment of the tax, however, does not in any way prevent authorities from disposing of it should it become mad, vicious, or dangerous in any way. Officers also reserve the right to use their own judgment in this regard.

After May 1, immediate action will be taken on all stray or unlicensed dogs. City authorities feel the measure necessary in maintenance of public safety.

AIR DEFENSE GUNS TRAIN ON PLANES AUTOMATICALLY

ANNISON, Ala., Apr. 5—Field pieces that train on enemy aircraft automatically through aid of electric sound detectors are the latest development of the United States army.

The weapons are described by Major Gerald B. Robison, executive officer, 69th Coast Artillery, at Fort McClellan, as the last word in anti-aircraft defense. The guns are aimed with the use of range finders and are fired with greater rapidity than the old guns.

Complete School Census, 97 Short

A. F. Brock, secretary of the board of trustees of the Ballinger independent school district, has completed the scholastic census for the district, same showing a decrease of approximately 100 scholastics. The total number tabulated this year is 1085, against 1182 for last year.

Mr. Brock said he had covered the district very thoroughly and so far as he knew every family had been seen. He authorized the statement, however, that the records were still open and that in case anyone had been overlooked a phone call to any school official would bring a census enumerator to record the children. Children from six years of age up are taken in the census.

The decrease here this year is not surprising and was anticipated by the board prior to the enumeration. Mr. Brock said more than 100 vacant dwellings were found in the district, and this alone would account for the 7 decrease in the records.

Any family moving to Ballinger by April 1 is entitled to enumeration of the children here. Those arriving since that date will not be taken on this year's report but will be recorded next year.

The attendance for the Ballinger schools is remaining up to standard due to a large number of transfers here from other districts for benefits of high school training. Students from rural schools come here for graduation and a majority of the senior class in Ballinger is made up of pupils from other communities. Their tuition is paid here by the state when the proper transfer is made prior to the opening of school.

The census report will remain open at the school board office for several days and anyone residing here prior to April 1 who has been overlooked is requested to notify Secretary Brock.

FIREPROOF SAFES TESTED IN HEAT OF 1,700 DEGREES

WASHINGTON, April 5—Conditions of a real fire are simulated in testing steel safes, to see how they protect their contents, at the bureau of standards. The locked safe and contents are enclosed in a brick furnace and heated to a temperature of 1,700 degrees Fahrenheit for one hour.

Then the safe is hoisted and allowed to drop 30 feet. Replaced upside down in the furnace. The safe again undergoes the trial by fire.
