Creasy Rotary Filer Co. R. B. Creasy patented the Creasy Rotary Filer in 1913. Prior to this he had spent practically two years working on the invention. A company known as the Creasy Rotary Filer Company was organized shortly after the patent was granted and the first machines manufactured.

The first machine was sold to the Pioneer Gin Company, of Rowena, and is still in use today. in excellent running condition. A large number of rotary filers were produced in 1914 soon after the company was formed.

Numerous improvements have been made in the machine since the first one built, and each improvement has reduced the number of working parts, and made it more lasting and efficient.
