

An attempt of several prisoners to escape recently, frustrated by gun fire of sentries, has led authorities to consider demolishing the adobe bullding, more than' 100 years old.

The favorite indoor sport of prisoners, especially long termers, is to attempt an escape," said Abraham Arriola, chief jailer.

SPOTTED FEVER'S SPREAD IS TRACED TO BITE OF TICK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.-Country people seem more likely Rocky Mountain spotted fever, a dangerous disease which has been discovered in the eastern United

The fever apparently is spread by ticks, which live on dogs, cattle and some small rodents.

There is no specific cure known for Rocky Mountain spotted fever, health service physicians say. Its presence in the east was discovered by Dr. R. E. Dyer, Dr. L. F. Badger and Dr. A. S. Rumreich of the National Institute of Health.

They were studying cases of ty Yius fever, a disease spread by fleas that live on rats. They noticed that patients who lived in the country were more severely ill than those in the city.


This led to the discovery that nearly half of the rural patients were known to have been recently bitten by ticks.


