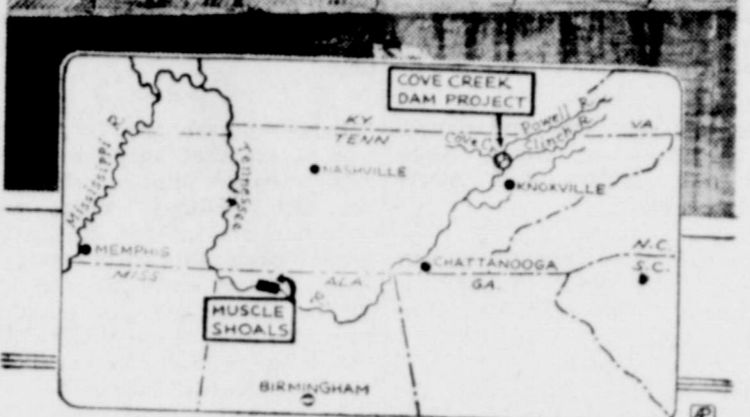
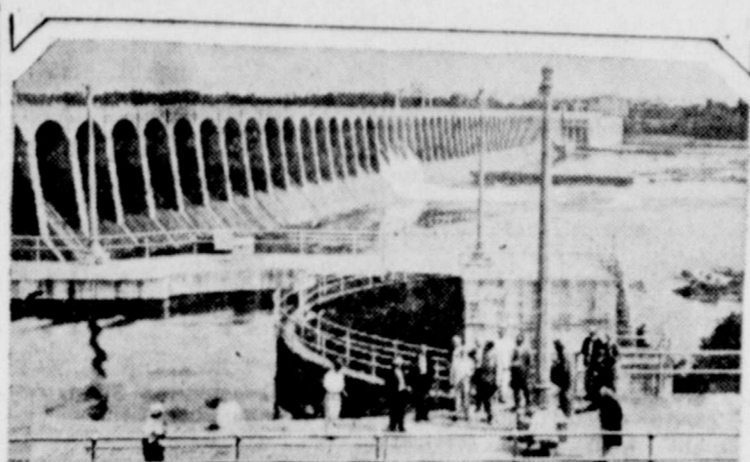
COAST FISHERMAN SMASHES SALMON FLY CASTING MARK

Waterway Project Linked With Muscle Shoals

(By Associated Press) KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 3.—Three rows of iron stakes driven by army engineers years ago divide the swiftly flowing water of Clinch River, just below the mouth of Cove Creek.

They mark the site of the proposed Cove Creek dam, 30 miles northeast of Knoxville, and near the source of the Tennessee River. The \$35,000,000 power, flood control and navigation project, lost temporarily when President Hoover and congress disagreed upon Muscle Shoals legislation, may be a prime issue in the seventy-second congress when recommendations of a joint federal-Alabama-Tennessee commission are submitted.



The Wilson dam at Muscle Shoals supplies power for the government's nitrate project. Congress soon is to discuss disposal of the \$35,000,000 wartime investment. Now there's a move to build a dam at Cove creek as a means of overcoming seasonal variations in the water supply.

The Cove Creek dam also is counted upon to reduce flood stages, particularly at Chattanooga where it is estimated the annual flood loss is \$250,000. This dam, it is anticipated, would reduce the flood stage there eight feet.

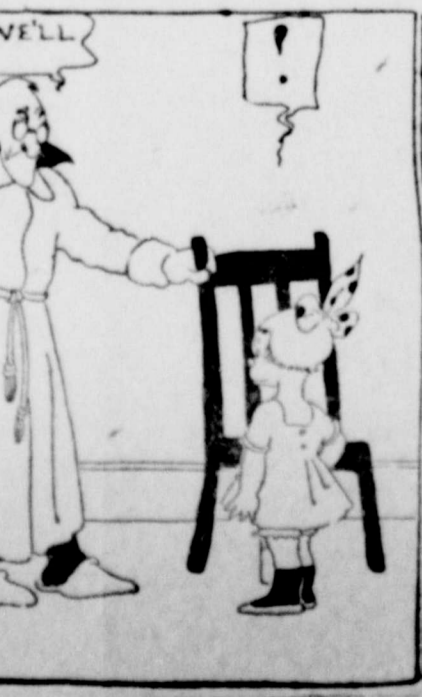
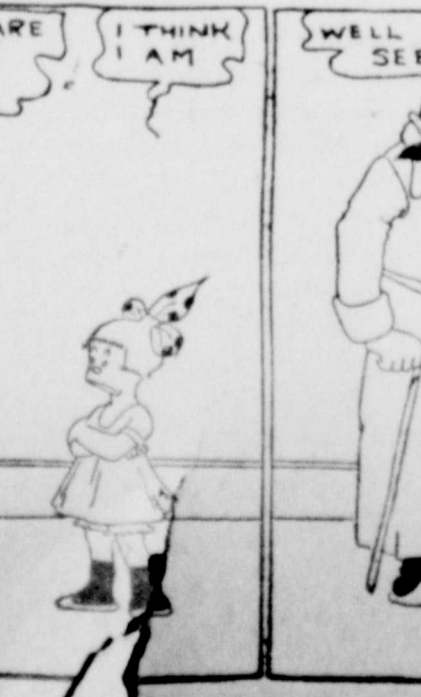
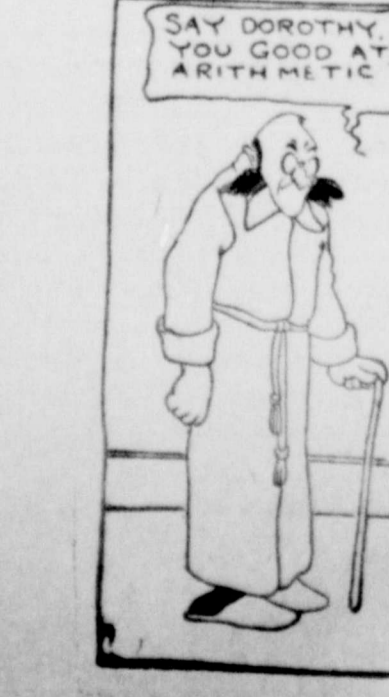

Don's Miss England II Speedier Boat Than Harmsworth Cup Defender

GAR WOOD

Gar Wood, American speedboat king, and Kaye Don, English challenger for the Harmsworth trophy, will battle it out September 5-7 on the Detroit river, opposite Detroit. Don in Miss England II recently set a world's straightaway record which Wood has been unable to equal with his newest boat, Miss America IX.

DETROIT, Sept. 3.—(AP)—If straight speed were all that counted Gar Wood's chances would appear slim to retain the Harmsworth trophy this year in the international races September 5-7 on the Detroit river here. Kaye Don, English challenger, in his Miss England II recently set a straightaway record at Lake Garda, Italy, of 110,223 miles, an hour which Wood for weeks tried unsuccessfully to better.

However, speed is not the only thing as English challengers for the past ten years have learned. There is maneuverability of craft to be considered and in the past decade no one has turned up able to handle a speedboat with the same facility with which Wood has darted his various Miss Americas about.

The boat in which Don will make his bid is the same in which Sir Henry Segrave was killed June 13, 1930, on Lake Windemere, England, when during a speed test it struck a floating tree limb.

The craft was reconditioned, and a year later, Don who since 1922 has been racing automobiles in England, took over the helm. It is the largest boat ever used in speed boat racing, being 38 feet 6 inches long and weighing approximately six tons.

As is customary in high speed events, it is predicted that the coming races—the winner of the trophy must take two out of three—will supply information useful to engineers in the building of engines for general use.

Miss England II is powered by two Rolls Royce engines of 2,000 horsepower each which turn a single screw of 15 inches in diameter at from between 19,000 and 12,000 revolutions a minute. Wood's Miss America IX, on the other hand, is driven by two propellers with larger blades and driven at a lower rate of speed. The result of the races probably will center on Miss England's attempts to pick up distance on the straightaway lost to Wood's twin-screwed boat on the turns.

Regardless of the outcome there will be no opportunity for America to pick up any of the high speed records, all of which now are in possession of England.

There'll be no straightaway runs at Detroit after Don's world's speedboat record.

Other speed records belonging to the British are Sir Malcolm Campbell's land speed mark of 245,733 miles an hour, set at Daytona Beach, Fla., February 5, 1931, and Flight Commander A. H. Orlebar's record time of 357,723 miles an hour for an airplane.

work next week and will be taken to the first location at the Combes stone county line. Already the three sites of crushed stone have been placed along the right-of-way for 3 1/4 miles. This is for use when pouring of hot asphalt begins.

The Austin Bridge Company will finish building drainage structures on highway 23 during September unless unforeseen delays occur. Two girders and two multiple box type spans to be poured will complete this job. This firm has made excellent time on its contract due partly because of good machinery and an efficient force.

White Brothers, contractors for grading on highway 23, now have two gangs operating on the Her-ring and Roberts ranches east of Fenoil. They are making good progress and will have the right-of-way in the shape within a short time. A large portion of the roadway is already completed.

Following the contracting of the Elm Creek bridge-overpass about September 20, the work is expected to get underway very shortly and will require a number of months to complete.
