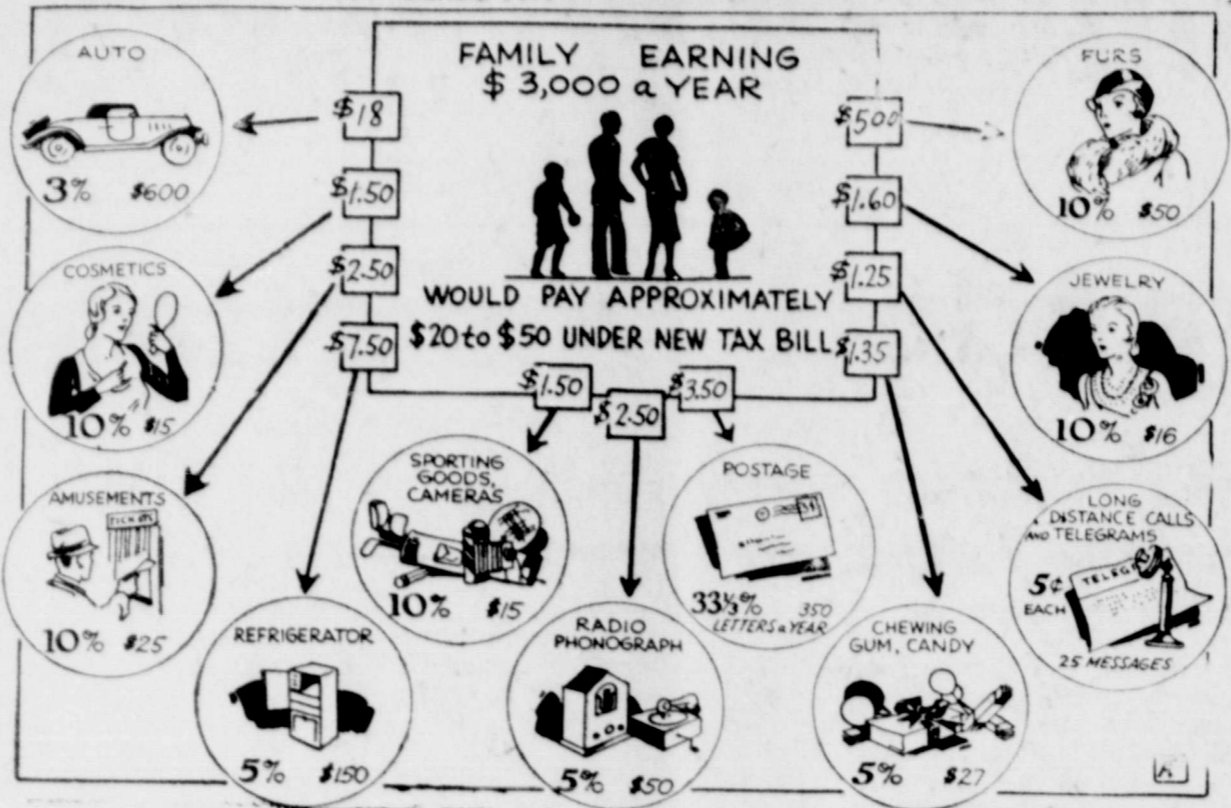
THE NERVOUS HEART—II. That emotional states may affect the heart was recognized definitely in 1836 by Dr. John Calthrop Williams of London when he said: "With the advance of civilization, the physical and moral system of man becomes more sensitive, and then the passions necessarily acquire a greater influence over the animal organization; the more, also, the passions are curbed, after being strongly excited and exercised, the more baneful is their influence on the nervous system until they are completely subdued."

"When we reflect, therefore, on the powerful influence that mental emotions exercise over the action of the heart; on the changes affected, in this respect, by anger, hatred and revenge—by love, joy or sorrow—by avarice and ambition; when we credit our former assertion, that functional derangement will terminate in organic disease, and that this functional derangement is daily and hourly produced by the activity of these feelings; then we are bound to believe that disorders of the circulation and the heart have increased of late years, and will still increase in proportion as the nervous system is affected by the more frequent and ardent operation of the passions."

Time and added experience have confirmed Dr. Williams' observations. Experimentally it has been shown both on animals and men that intense emotions exercise a far-reaching influence upon the work performed by body organs. Digestion can be arrested by anger, fear or other intense emotions. Now by virtue of the work done by psychologists and psychiatrists we know, as Dr. Halsey has said, that "an unhappy status of mind due to unfulfilled desires and conflicts may set the stage for the development of a heart disturbance, as one way of escape from unhappy situations, or as an offensive in the accomplishment of a much desired objective."

How Tax Bill Affects Mr. and Mrs. American Family



The chart above shows the semi-luxuries from which Uncle Sam hopes to get about \$275,000,000 to help balance the next federal budget. The amounts spent represent, in general, what the average family with an income around \$3,000 uses for these items. The family, of course, does not need to buy an auto, a refrigerator or a radio, but the remaining items ordinarily take about the amounts listed. Depending on the purchases, the family earning \$3,000 would pay from \$20 to \$50 in new taxes in a year.

MERCHANT MARINE PLANNED BY SPAIN TO AID SHIPYARD

MADRID, April 7.—The republic's decision to build no more fighting craft has caused a shipyard crisis at each of the half dozen naval concentration points of the peninsula. As an offset Doctor Jose Giral, minister of marine, has a program of construction of passenger and freight liners, under supervision of a "Civil Marine Bureau." Finishing touches are being put on the "Balearas" and "Canarias," 10,000 ton cruisers being built at the port of Ferrol. Several destroyers will be launched soon at Cartagena, as will two 5,000 ton cruisers at Cadiz. When these ships slide down the ways the old regime's naval program will have been terminated. Scrapping of the veteran battleship "España" will aid one naval shipyard to piece out a temporary existence. The minister said other nations might be invited to take advantage of the skilled Spanish naval construction industry.

That wisecracking, irrepressible pair of gloom chasers, Bert Wheeler and Robert Woolsey, poke the merry finger of satire at Reno and the wholesale divorce industry in their newest starring comedy which will be shown at the Palace Theatre next Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

The film is RKO-Radio Pictures' "Peach o' Reno" which rolls along with the gayest and merriest abandon and builds up to a crescendo of funny situations.
