Haircut sparks lawsuit

Shelley Osborne had a bad hair day when she walked out of a salon six years ago, but she won't be getting any compensation for her suffering.

A Johnson City (Tenn.) City Law Court last week dismissed Osborne's \$10.5 million lawsuit against stylist Ginny Barbee, the salon and its owner, JC Penney.

Osborne, 37, claimed she was "ruined" after Barbee trimmed her waistlength hair and left her with locks just above the shoulders.

Wrong checkbook stolen

Topeka, Kan., Police Officer Jason Cooper thought he was lucky to be nearby as a man tried to cash a stolen check.

Then the officer got more good news. After arresting the man on forgery charges, Cooper learned that the checks the suspect was trying to cash were his own

The officer's checkbook had been stolen when his car was burglarized more than a month ago.

"It was some pretty sweet justice," Cooper said.

No more boring flights

Snigapore Airlines passengers can challenge each other to digital chess or mahjong and the whole plane can compete in a digital quiz show.

Beef having bright spots, cloudy spots

COLLEGE STATION

— High consumption and prices are the best of times for beef producers, and a foreign animal disease such as foot-and-mouth would certainly be the worst of times.

Last week's 47th annual Beef Cattle Short Course at Texas A&M University showed ranchers how to take advantage of the good times and how to prevent some of those bad times, according to course coordinator Dr. Larry Boleman.

According to Boleman, every segment of the beef industry has been profitable in 2001, and the future looks good. While retail beef prices have gone up, consumption has increased as well.

"All of these are almost rare — that's the best of times," he said.

The worst of times has been an increase in diseases such as bovine spongiform encephalopathy and footand-mouth in some countries, especially across Europe, and that has worried producers, Boleman said.

But the attitude of producers is still positive, he said.

Income-tax extension ends Aug. 15

Taxpayers who requested an extension for filing their tax return need to be aware that the Aug. 15 deadline for filing is this week. Forms should be postmarked by that date.

"While it is possible to get an additional two-month extension, taxpayers should know that they will not receive their advance payment check, commonly called a tax rebate check, until their 2000 return is filed," said Kay Wiseman, owner of H&R Block in Muleshoe.

"It is also important to remember that the extensions apply only to the filing of forms — all taxes were due April 16," she added.

Any taxes due that have not

been paid are accumulating interest — and possibly penalties if the amount due is more than 10 percent of the total tax liability.

Taxpayers who have not yet filed a 2000 return should remember that they will not receive the advance payment check authorized by the new tax law until their return is filed and processed by the IRS, Wiseman said, and advance payment checks will not be sent out after December.

If a taxpayer's return is not filed in time to be processed by the end of the year, that taxpayer will not receive the check, she said. They still may claim a credit, to the extent that they qualify for it, on their 2001 tax return.

No changes should be made to a 2000 return in anticipation of an expected advance payment for 2001.

Taxpayers who have no balance due from a prior year and who cannot pay the full amount due on their current-year return may file a Form 9465, Installment Request Agreement.

Those taxpayers who cannot pay the amount due because of undue hardship may use Form 1127, Application for Extension of Time To Pay Taxes.

If that application is accepted, the taxpayer is given up to six months to pay the tax, free from penalty.

Interest accrues, however, from the time the tax was due.

Dress for the event is casual. There will be good food, entertainment by Kenny Maines and friends, and a short program about the dream to establish this museum and what it will take to make it a reality.


RC&D grant applications due Aug. 15

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

LUBBOCK — Nothing beats a slice of fresh watermelon on a hot summer's day. That's what is on tap Aug. 14, along with a watermelon variety field day, at Texas A&M's Agricultural Research and Extension Center here.

The field tour will run from 10 a.m. to noon, said Dr. David Bender, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station vegetable researcher.

Bender and others will explain how the melon variety trial was planted, cared for and watered during the growing season, and also discuss the results of this year's trial.

statewide watermelon trials. The trials are funded by the watermelon-seed industry. Cultivars include industry standards, and the latest releases from commercial breeding programs," Bender said.

"This is an excellent way to evaluate and compare differences in quality, internal texture, color and taste. We also will discuss the developments in commercial watermelon production,"he added.

"All South Plains grow-

ers, gardeners, breeders, agribusiness representatives, Extension and research professionals interested in watermelon production are invited to attend," Bender said.

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

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

Christians Know the End of the Story

Detting up housekeeping is no easy task. But the opposite task on the other end of the journey is infinitely harder. Ask anyone who has buried their last parent or whose parents have had to move into a care facility. That person will tell you that sifting through three-quarters worth of a century's accumulated mounds of paper, pictures, trinkets, and family treasures is, well, a daunting task.

But it can be interesting. It can bring laughter. And tears.

And it certainly can make you think.

Probably such an undertaking takes much of its character and color from the character and lives of the folks who've gone on. That, at least, was my experience with my own parents.

Mom passed away first, and we cleaned and culled. But the real job came when Dad passed away some years later.

I was surprised at some of what they kept and some of the treasures and the trinkets we ran across.

We found tons of birthday and anniversary cards that Mom and Dad gave to each other, cards of both sorts lovingly inscribed in their completely unique handwriting. (Mom's was the most beautiful and perfect penmanship I have ever seen; Dad's, perhaps the most unique.) I don't think they ever threw away a single card.

My siblings and I even found the little pencil-written penny

post card that Dad had mailed to his own folks as he and my mother had just left their wedding for their honeymoon. He described them as "supremely happy," and signed the card proudly, "Mr. & Mrs. G. B. Shelburne, Jr." I found the letter one of the

men I'm named for had penned to me and my family when I had just been born. I found a kindergarten graduation diploma, a notebook with pasted pictures used to help me learn the letters of the alphabet in 1st grade, and crayon-colored pictures that I had drawn in 3rd grade.

I found a letter I'd written home from scout camp, dripping with homesickness.

I found a number of pictures of myself in various embarrassing stages of adolescent uglyduckling-hood.

And I think I found every letter I'd ever written Mom and Dad once I'd left home. I read some of the college letters we'd written, and I was reminded reading between the lines (I'd blissfully almost forgotten) that Juana and I thought we might starve before we got me through school.

We didn't starve.

We made it. And that may be one very valuable lesson that comes from taking this sort of mandatory trip down memory lane. What we were so worried about then either never happened or we

got through it. Mom and Dad made a successful trip through this life. If our eyes stay focused on the same Lord who led them through, so will we. We may not know what may transpire in our life's story tomorrow or Thursday or next week. But Christians know the Author. He's told us the end of the story. And it's great!
