MUCOUS COLITIS

The diseases to which mankind is subject are many, but the specific treatments known to medical science are few.

No two cases of a disease are alike, and very rarely do we find a standard treatment that can be effectively administered without being first modified by the peculiar needs and circumstances of the patient.

For example, neither in origin, cause, or behavior, does one case of mucous colitis resemble another. There are but few general rules of treatment applicable.

The rest must be determined by a careful study of the individual patient.

A number of cases of mucous colitis are due to catarrh of the intestines. Others are caused by irritation of the colon and rectum.

Disease of the ovaries and of the tubes may reflexly cause the passage of mucus and slime.

Evidently then, each case of mucous colitis must be studied to determine its possible cause or causes.

The nervous factor is usually large in this disease. Hence the basic neurasthenic state must be dealt with to achieve a cure.

The effect of intense emotional states upon the functions of the colon and rectum are proverbial.

Drugs and diet are at a disadvantage in the treatment while the "secretion neurosis" of the colon persists.

Some relief may be gained by avoiding the coarser sorts of foods which leave a large residue after digestion.

Such foods include raw and cooked vegetables, fruits, bran breads, and the like.

The injection of a few ounces of olive oil at bedtime is sometimes helpful, but irrigations should not be taken except on instruction.

Stars Teamed With Famous Stunt Fliers in "The Lost Squadron"

Dipping and side-slipping thru the air in daring wing-to-wing formations and crashing their planes head on into the earth for the mere sake of thrills, Hollywood's intrepid stunt fliers may be seen in action at the Palace Theatre next Sunday, Monday and Tuesday when RKO Radio Pictures' "The Lost Squadron" is shown, with Richard Dix as the star.

states R. R. Reppert, extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College. In that year record was obtained of 21,215 farmers who controlled crops on a million and a half acres at total savings of more than seven million dollars.

"Grasshoppers are popularly supposed to come in seven year cycles," says Mr. Reppert, "but many factors may interfere with the regularity of appearance of these destructive pests. Indications from last year's scattered infestations did not point to a wholesale invasion this season, but early spring appearances have changed matters. The situation is already the worst since 1924 and may possibly develop to very serious proportions, especially if dry weather continues, in practically all parts of Texas.

"County agents are watching the situation closely and where necessary re-issuing and re-demonstrating the use of poison bran mash which has become the standard control measure. This is made by mixing 25 pounds bran mash, one pound Paris green or white arsenic, and one pound common salt together; diluting one ounce high grade amylic acetate and two quarts cane or sorghum molasses in about two gallons of water; and pouring this liquid over the poisoned bran until every particle is moist. Further additions of water are made and the whole mass mixed thoroughly until mash is obtained that is quite moist yet will fall apart after being tightly squeezed. This quantity should be enough to broadcast over about five acres, which should be done in early morning before nine o'clock.

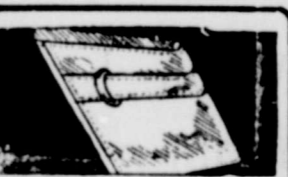

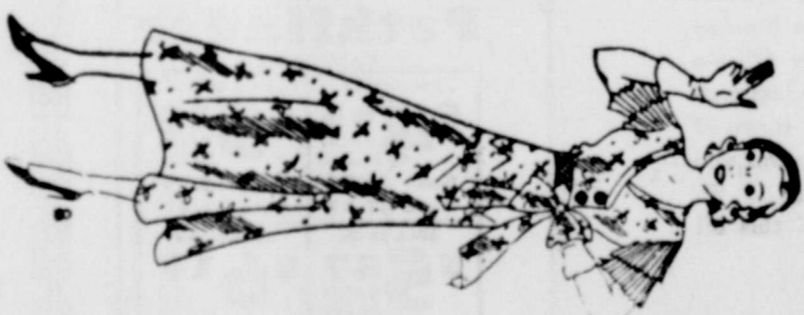
