The United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the foregoing Section; provided that the one-tenth of the alternate Sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the Permanent University Fund.

Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution.

Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps.

Section 55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness liability or obligation of any corporation or individual to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years.

Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

Section 61. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit: "First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Section 62. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

Section 13. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due

thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following bases: (1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total.

Section 11. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such works and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

TO THE VOTERS of Runnels County

As the period of the run-off primary campaign comes to a close, it is a source of gratification to me that from every part of Runnels county have come expressions of interest in my behalf in this second election. These expressions have come from both those who supported me in the first primary and from those who preferred some other candidate at that time. These evidences of good will and confidence are especially appreciated in view of my inability to make an active campaign, as I have been closely held to the County Judge's office by routine duties, among such duties being the preparation and handling of the proposed budget of county operations, as required by law.

The proposed county budget has been analyzed and is being handled as a news item by the papers of the county, for which reason I shall not burden you with a lengthy discussion of it here, but your attention is respectfully called to such news item on the budget published in this same issue of the paper. The copy of the proposed budget is on file in the office of the County Clerk. Where any item is necessarily condensed in the copy on file, the county record supporting such items are open to the inspection of every citizen and can easily be had by anyone caring for such details. I have always been glad to discuss the county's business with any interested citizen.

As reflected by the budget, it has always been my constant endeavor to keep the financial affairs of the county on a sound basis. It is with some degree of pride that I point to the results. While I have not sought to make political capital out of the fact, I feel that evidence of my sincerity in this effort is found in the fact that in January, 1931, I voluntarily asked for a substantial reduction in my salary for that year, which was made, and in January, 1932, I again voluntarily asked a further substantial reduction of my salary along with a reduction made in salary allowances for certain other county employees. In this connection, I regret that cards of my opponent have been circulated from which it would be inferred that the county has paid me \$45,000.00 during my service as County Judge. If such inference was intended, it is grossly inaccurate, as may be ascertained by anyone caring to examine the open records of the county. However, I believe that the citizenship of the county feel as I do that an honest, conscientious official works for and earns the compensation really and actually paid him.

Lacking only 46 votes of having a clear majority of all votes cast in the July primary, I trust that I may be favored with your whole hearted support this coming Saturday. My renewed pledge to you is, if so honored, that I will continue a careful, unbiased, diligent and unselfish service in behalf of the whole citizenship of the county, and assure you that your support will be sincerely appreciated.

Former Ballinger Teacher Tells of Conditions in China

(EDITOR'S NOTE-The following letters written by Miss Clark Clark from Boone Compound, Wuchang, China, will be of particular interest to Ballingerites. Miss Clark is well known in Ballinger, having taught science in the local high school and having a host of personal friends here.)

Boone Compound, Wuchang, China
May 1, 1932.—This week on Thursday after being out of school for three weeks with a tiny pneumonia spot on my lung, I managed to crawl back and it certainly was good to be back again.

May 15.—When I opened my eyes this morning and saw the beautiful blue sky and brilliant sunshine I felt like giving a war-whoop for joy as it has been raining for weeks nearly every day.

Yesterday I had to go downtown to get a few little things and I saw, as always, things that amused and interested me.

In front of one house stood an ancient automobile all draped with red so I guessed before I got very close that a wedding was to take place.

The small children in the summer often wear no clothes but the better class people put on them a tiny apron that conceals little at best and when the kiddy has grown faster than the supply of aprons the apron degenerates into a wide belt.
