Drilling Resumed On Concho Test

A fishing job was completed in the Joe Simmons No. 1 T. A. Shultz in Concho county, Monday in short order. Drilling had been halted for the past ten days while 10-inch casing was run to a depth of 960 feet. The contract for this well is 1,500 feet. It was feared Monday that the fishing job would cause a long delay but the crew experienced good luck in removing the obstruction quickly.

Excellent progress has been made so far and with casing set to 960 feet there is a fine hole in which to continue drilling.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers upset the dope here Friday to defeat the Winters Blizzards by a score of 7 to 0.

The Blizzards opened the game minus their four best men but three of these were soon sent into the fray. Robinson, captain; Pierce, assistant captain; Dunn and Adams were on the side line when the game began but Coach Pratt soon rushed them to the aid of their comrades.

The Winters team looked good at the first of the game and fans along the side line thought it was certain to win. As soon as the ball was in Winters' possession Townsend ripped through tackle for a nine-yard gain, Clay failed, and Caskey stepped around right end for 14 yards and a first down.

During the second half of the game Santa Anna resorted to a passing attack which was worked successfully. In the third quarter with line plays and passes the oval was carried to Winters' 1-yard line where four line plunges failed to gain and the ball went over. Winters kicked out to safety and it looked like the game would be a tie and decided on penetration of the 20-yard line. In this respect Santa Anna had the best of the argument having been within the Winters 20-yard line five times.

In the fourth quarter the Mountaineers started a powerful offensive attack with a mixture of passes that took the pigskin to the Blizzards' 20-yard line and a pass, Ward to Fletcher, on the goal line sent a touchdown across for the only score of the game. 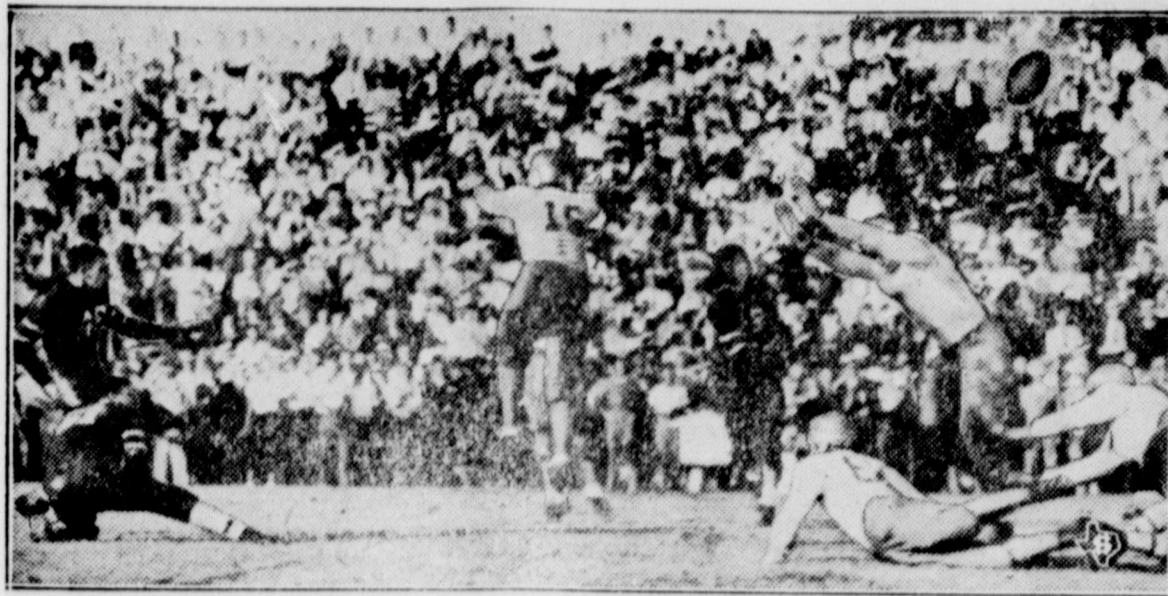

The Coleman Bluecats threw a big scare into teams of the western division of district 13 Saturday when they whipped the Brady Bulldogs 33 to 0.

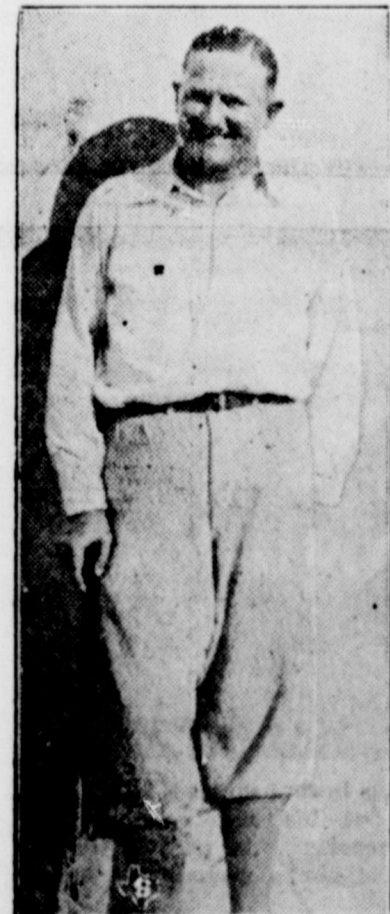
The Bearcats have a fair football machine this season but at this time of the year is nothing to brag about. They are big enough and have enough experience but some parts of their game have been ragged indeed.
