Armistice Day May Be Observed Here On November 10

Ballinger business firms will be asked to decide this week-end what day they will observe for Armistice. November 11 falls on Saturday this year and it is hardly probable that a holiday will be taken that day.

Ballinger high school officials want the holiday selected as soon as possible so that the date for the Ballinger-Brady football game scheduled for November 11 can be set. This game is an annual affair on Armistice Day but it will be changed this year in case either Friday or Monday is declared a holiday here.

Four holidays are observed annually in Ballinger-the Fourth of July, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas, A number of business heads have been interviewed and so far all favor closing on Friday, November 10. A petition will be circulated to learn the desires of the business leaders. When November 11 falls on any day other than Saturday no list is circulated, merely an announcement being made.

If the day is observed on any date besides Saturday, a number of Brady citizens intend to spend the day in Ballinger. They will play golf and visit friends in the morning and attend the football game in the afternoon.





Engineering work on plans for a municipal sewerage system in Ballinger has about been completed and formal application for a government loan through the federal public works administration will be made within a short

Field work has been finished and blueprints being prepared will accompany the application for the loan. The engineering firm of Montgomery & Ward, Wichita Falls, is in charge of the work preliminary to securing the loan.

The city will apply for a loan of \$80,000 to \$100,000. Should the loan be granted, 30 per cent will be a gift to the city and 70 per cent will be self-liquidating through revenue from service on

If approved by the government he project will furnish much employment in ditching the entire corporate limits, laying pipes, and construction of a disposal plant. Practically every section of the city would be served by the lines which would be considerably more extensive than the present system operated by the Southwestern Sewerage Company.

Representatives of Montgomery & Ward will be here the latter part of this week to make out the application and prepare data for presentation to the public works adiministration.

A total of 12,229 containers of food were put into cans in six weeks in the RFC canning kitchen in Childress this summer, half of which went to charity as toll the home demonstration agent reports.

Sodium Chlorate proved such a destroyer of Johnson grass in a demonstration by Dallas Miller in Newton county last year that six of his neighbors are pooling orders for the poison to use small patches on their blackland farms.

There are now 93 farm boys in Wheeler county who have registered sows or gilts for their 4-H club work. For some time business firms or individuals have furnished gilts which have been loaned to the boys in return for one gilt from the first litter. The additional gilts are distributed to more boys on the same plan.

An average of 90 tons of feed will go into the six trench silos constructed in Gregg county last summer. The growing interest in silos is the result of one such feed saver built with the help of the county agent last year.

By crop rotation and plowing under two crops of peas Bill Humberg, of Frio county, increased his corn crop this year from 13 bushels per acre to 40 bushels per acre.




