A legal fight between Coleman and Runnels county looms as result of the election held recently to consolidate the Talpa school district in Coleman county and the Herring district in Runnels county. The election was held at Talpa and Herring, resulting in a unanimous vote at Talpa and practically the same in the Herring district.

The plan was to send all students to the Talpa school and to place the land in the Herring district in the Talpa district. In giving reasons for the expected legal fight the Coleman-Democrat Voice says:

"Petitions were passed in each of the communities several weeks ago in which the commissioners of the two counties were asked to call the election.

"Those petitions were approved by the courts and the election in the two communities called.

"When the votes were canvassed it was learned every person voting at Talpa favored the consolidation and all but four of the voters at Herring voted favorably.
