

AUSTIN, Jan. 17 .- Representatives of the various counties in Texas will meet in Austin February 8, 9 and 10 in the second state conference on child health and protection, according to Miss Jeanie M. Pinckney, chief of the University of Texas bureau of health and nutrition. Repetition of the conference is due to the requests of delegates who attended the first session, Miss Pinckney said. Some four hundred delegates representing seventy-five counties and thirty-seven agencies were in attendance last February.


What Will **Congress Do?**







Six Adult Classes Makes Mirth for Conoco **To Start General** Education Move you? County Superintendent R. White, with the assistance of

superintendents, principals and teachers, will begin next week to organize adult classes in this county for work authorized by the Texas emergency program of relief education.

Six such projects have been authorized for Runnels county and five teachers have been assigned to instruct these classes. Any adult not employed or any other who desires to further his education is eligible for membership in the classes which will study subjects listed in the general curriculum of Texas schools. The state has appropriated \$432

for the work in this county and teachers will receive 60 cents an hour. They will be required to teach three one-hour periods on each subject and work 20 hours a week

Those who have made application to teach adult classes and who have been approved include: Miss Loretta Wallace, Winters; John Clayton Watts, Drasco; Miss Myrtle Helen Killam, Ballinger; Miss Edna Fern Killam, Ballinger; and A. L. Baggett, Blanton. All of the above but one hold college degrees and have had teaching experience. Mr. Baggett, a vocational agriculture teacher, is a graduate of A. & M. College.
