This disease is characterized by the formation of minute little blisters or vesicles situated rather deeply in the skin, feeling to the touch like grains of sago. There is considerable itching associated with these blister formations.

### Texas Deals Justice to Bandits



sentenced to death for robbery.

The State of Texas dealt summarily with three Oklahoma bandits last week, when Irvin "Blackie" Thompson, Whitey Walker and Roy Johnson were given 99 years each in the Huntsville penitentiary for robbery of a Bryan jewelry store, and Thompson was given a sentence of death in the electric chair when convicted of robbing the First State bank of Marlin of \$44,147.70 cash and \$15,000 in securities. Walker and Johnson are also charged in connection with this robbery. Charges of bank robbery also are pending against the trio in Cameron and Palestine. They are known as the "fishing bandits."
