Students of Texas University Keep **Order** at Dances

AUSTIN, June 6 .- A spirit of cooperation instead of dissension on the part of students pervades the crowds at the University of Texas dances C. N. Zivley, manager of the Texas Union said, and students assist the floor managers to enforce regulations against drinking and misbehavior. Only two or three students have been dropped from the university rolls during the past year for misconduct at the dances. First offenses are reported by the dance committee to the dean of student life. and second offenses are reported to the discipline committee, under the terms of "gentlemen's agreement" with the dance committee, with explusion from the university being the penalty.

The highest praise for the management of the university dances has been received from visitors who have attended them, including parents of university studenta, regents and faculty members from other schools and others. Letters have been received asking for advice on how to model other school dances on the Texas Union plan.

Attendance at the university dances this year, 33 in number, for women and girls. The largest game, when attendance was in excess of 2,000. activitity in Texas during April showed mixed tendencies, it was pointed out in the monthly report of the University of Texas bureau of business research. Consumption by Texas mills totalled 6.844 bales an increase of 34 per cent over April last year, and about 1 per cent above that of March, the bureau's report said.

Production of cloth amounted to 6,648,000 yards, an increase of 36 per cent over April last year but 4 per cent below March of the current year. Sales of cloth, however, totaling 3,266,000 yards, dropped 60 per cent from April, 1933. and 37 per cent from March of the current year while unfilled orders, amounting to 11,216,000 yards were 29 per cent below those on April 30 last year and 13 per cent less than those on March 31 of the current year.

"In past years there has generally been a decline in consump tion of cotton and in production of goods from March to April, and an increase in the quantity of goods sold and in unfilled orders exactly the reverse of the situation during the present season, the report said.

AAA CONTRACT SIGNER MAKES MORE CASH THAN NON-SIGNER

COLLEGE STATION, June 6 .--Whether the hog processing tax comes out of the farmer or out of the consumer, the farmer who signed a corn-hog contract makes considerably more money than the one who did not sign, declares E. M. Rogenbrecht, swine specialist at Texas A. & M. Colleg. He bases this statement on the contract benefits and on the current price of hogs.

+

Take two farmers each having four sows and marketing an average of 40 hogs of 200-pound weight each year. One signed the hog contract, the other did not. The one who signed will make \$84 more than the one wro did not, assuming the current Fort Worth market price of \$3.30 per hundred.

The non-signing farmer, forgetting transportation and marwould receive keting per head for his 40 hogs or \$264. The farmer who signed the contract would reduce his market hogs by 10 head and would sell 30 hogs. At \$3.30 per hundred he would receive for those 200pounders \$98. In addition he will receive through the year \$5 per head for his 30 market hogs, or a total of \$150. His total hog income would be \$348 or \$24 more than that received by the nonsigner. This would be subject, of course, to a small deduction to take care of the local cost of his






