### Moving Distressed Cattle in County Big Undertaking

In the government cattle buying program being conducted through the county relief administration offices and the county agent more than 1,600 cattle had been shipped from Runnels county to August 7. More animals are being shipped daily and 1,032 cattle were loaded in stock cars in a single day last

Much work is involved in appraising the animals, driving them to the pens at concentration points in the county, and in feeding and loading them. About 15 or 20 men are employed who do nothing but care for the feeding of the cattle after they are brought to the pens. In Ballinger there are three pens; one at the Santa Fe yards, one at the Abilene & Southern yards, and the other It Fair Park. In these three pens more than 400 cattle are now being cared for until shipped.

The officers claim oil is diverted by use of these connections and an average of 20 barrels may be flowed into each truck within a few minutes time, the connections being of simple construction and easily connected to a pipeline. 

Dr. Stefansson, Explorer,

Lived Year With Eskimos Dr. Vilhjalmer Stefansson, the ex plocer, made his first trip into the Far North to iceland in 1904, followed by an archeological expedition in 1905 under the auspices of the Peabody Mu seum of Harvard university, notes a writer in the Indianapolis News. 1906 he conducted an ethnological expedition to Mackenzie delta under the auspices of Harvard and Toronto universities. This expedition tasted

eighteen months. The second, which began in 1908, lasted fifty-three months, and was conducted under auspices of the American Museum of Natural History, New York, and the government of Canada. During this expedition he added to the map of Canada many new features, including Horton river, over 500 miles tong. He discovered Dolphia and Union straits, and fived a year with the Eskimos, who had never seen a white man and whose ancestors never had. He found that some of these had certain European characteristics. He returned in 1912, and set forth again in 1913, commanding a Canadian Arctic expedition which lasted until 1918. In the spring of 1914, with two companions, he made a 600-mile journey ever-broken and moving ice from Martip polot. Alaska, to the northwest of Bank's Island; in 1915 he explored by stedge the sea northwest of Prince Patrick island and discovered new land north of Prince Patrick Island in 1916 he explored lalands airendy discovered, and found new ones west of Heiberg laland and elsewhere, and in 1917 he can a line of soundings northwest of Cape Isachsen, showing the polar ocean shallow to this re-

Pork Barrol Logislation The first fill for harbor improvements was passed by congress March 3, 1823. Enemies of the bill alleged that its advocates roted for it purely for political reasons, to make them seives popular among their constitu outs by getting something for their districts. This so-called rush upon the federal treasury was compared to the gush made by the slaves on the southern plantations when the pork barrel was opened. River and harbor improvement bills were ever after facetiously called pork barral bills. Later the term was extended to any tegislation supposedly passed for purposes of petitical patronage. The total contributions to a campaign fund are some times called the pork barrel.

First Woman Ductor Minabeth Blackwell, M. D., born in Bristol, England, in 1821, was the first woman admitted to practice medicine in the United States.
