. ON TEXAS FARMS * By Minnie Fisher Cunningham

Extension Service Editor If you are looking for someone who can "make a profit on the hole in the doughnut," as the old saying goes, try P. A. Hunter, dalryman and farmer of Brooks county, who is building a new home from adobe and making the hole from which the dirt comes into a trench silo.

In Archer county 134 home demonstration club girls and women have reported planting fall gardens since the rains. Swiss chard, pinto beans, kale, beets, carrots and radishes were favorite vegetables with these gardeners.

"There are ways for us to fill our pantries in spite of the drouth," Mrs. Homer Stewart told the Cottle county home demon stration agent. Some of Mrs. Stewart's ways were to exchange lard, of which she had plenty, for peaches to can; to sew and take her pay in peas; to can beef from cattle condemned for removal and use off her farm, but permitted as wholesome for home use.

A J. Hoff, who runs a small country store in Ander, Goliad county, told the farm agent, "The cotton program is bringing results. Several accounts on my books which had run up to \$150 and \$200 and gone unpaid for a long time have this year been paid in full. I am in favor of regulated production until everything is normal again.

Coryell county farmers and ranchmen have been staunch in their support of the AAA program. The county had 1,700 cotton contract signers; 2,300 Bankhead applications; 166 corn-hog contracts; 1,100 applications for the sale of cattle in the drouth relief program; and when the sheep program is under way they are ready to cooperate with that also.
