



### Runnels Teachers Name New Officers At Meeting Here

The first meeting of the year of the Runnels County Teachers' Association was held in Ballinger Saturday morning. Practically every teacher was present when the meeting was called to order by President H. C. Lyon at 9 o'clock. More than 200 Runnels county teachers besides a number of out-of-county visitors and those appearing on the program were present.

The program for the general session was carried out without a change or substitution. Dr. C. Q. Smith, president of McMurry College, Abilene, spoke at the opening session on the work of teachers in the development of character. S. G. Boynton, deputy state superintendent, discussed school affairs, classification, and other matters of interest. E. C. Grindstaff was introduced and brought greetings as the newly elected county superintendent, and R. E. White delivered his farewell message to the teachers with whom he has worked for the past ten years.

In the intermediate sectional meeting Mr. Grindstaff spoke on play group organization and Miss Marie Hill, of Winters, spoke on "Needs of Music and Art to Future Generations."

In the primary section Mrs. Leslie Greenwood spoke on "Social Studies for the First Three Grades." The high school section heard C. C. Minatra, of the San Angelo junior college, on teaching advanced students.

In the general session the election of officers for the ensuing year required considerable time. E. D. Stringer, of Winters, was elected president; Gordon Griggs, Norton, first vice-president; W. B. Williams, Content, second vice-president; C. W. Kopecky, Rowena, third vice-president; E. C. Grindstaff, Ballinger, fourth vice-president; Miss Marie Hill, Winters, secretary-treasurer. The following sectional chairmen were named: high school division, Charles Dameron, Winters; intermediate division, George E. Stowe, Ballinger; primary division, Miss Homa Bee Childress, Miles.

The next meeting of the association will be held on the third Saturday in January.

### County School Inspections Will Start November 6

County Superintendent R. E. White has received word that rural school inspections in Runnels county by State Deputy Superintendent S. G. Boynton will begin Tuesday, November 6, and continue until every rural school which receives state aid has been visited.

Supt. White is arranging a schedule for the visits and each principal will be notified of the date and hour the inspector will be present and what information to have ready. The boards of trustees are being urged to attend and interested patrons are invited.

The schedule will be arranged to each school and from three to four will be visited each day. Mr. White and Mr. Boynton will leave Ballinger each morning and return here at night. Arrangements will be made for lunch near where the inspector is to be at that time.

All rural schools of the county have been operating since the first Monday in October, and classes are well organized and functioning smoothly. Attendance will be up to normal for the year before the inspections commence, school officials declare.

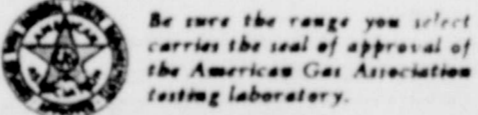

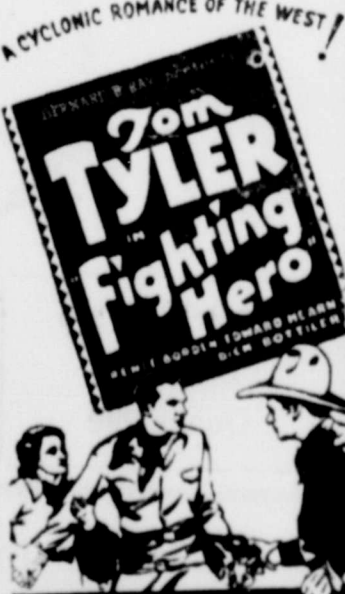

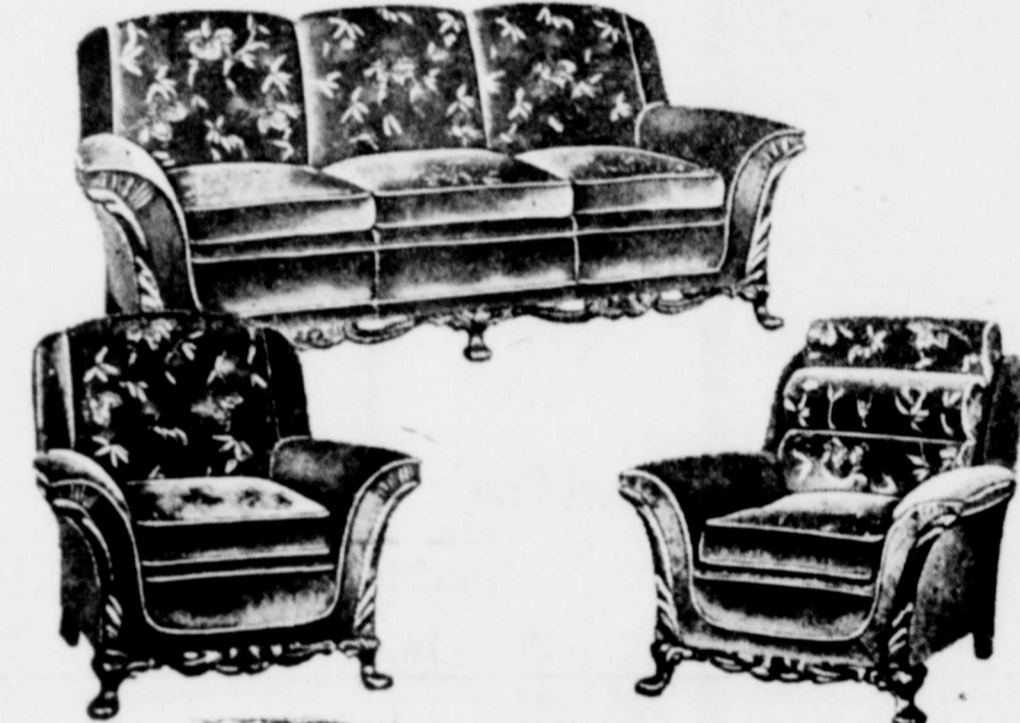

MASON COUNTY MAY HAVE PROFITABLE GOLD MINE

Mason county may come in for recognition as a gold mining section, according to Wm. Werner von Falkenstein, chemist, who has been seeking deposits of the precious shiny metal in Mason county for more than a year. According to a statement to the News by Mr. Falkenstein on Wednesday of this week, he has found gold in sufficient quantities to make the mining of same very profitable. The ore from which the gold has been extracted has been taken from two different locations on lands five or six miles south of Mason, says the chemist. Most of the gold has been found in sedimentary quartz and the average yield of the shiny metal from the 12 different locations is \$23.20 worth of gold and \$1.12 worth of silver, or a total of \$24.32 per ton of ore.

Some of the ore was taken from the surface of the earth and some from a depth of several feet, and it is claimed that the mineral is found over a large area which would make the supply of ore wherein the gold is found, unlimited for development, said Mr. Falkenstein.

Twelve different assays were made and some showed much richer deposits than others, but the \$24.32 yield per ton is the average yield.

"The present find," the discoverer said, "will pay well and should enough people be interested in further development, I will be glad to furnish the data I have already compiled."

Frank Simon has been assisting Mr. Falkenstein for the past several months in securing some of the ore that has yielded the precious metal and no doubt Mr. Simon and Mr. Falkenstein will be glad to give further information and details to parties interested in further development.—Mason County News.

DUCK SEASON WILL OPEN FRIDAY MORNING

The duck season in this zone will open Friday morning at dawn and many local hunters will be ready to visit their favorite spots and try their luck. For the past three weeks most of the lakes and surface tanks in this section have been roosting places for ducks and hunters plan to get the bag limit the first day.

Practically all local hunters are aware of the federal provision which makes it necessary to obtain a license stamp from the post-office.

There are few large ducks in this vicinity yet but a number of teal, pin-tails, butter-balls and other small birds of this species are to be seen on nearly all isolated water holes.

Federal law requires that ducks be shot only between sunrise and sunset and it is unlawful to kill them before or after these hours.

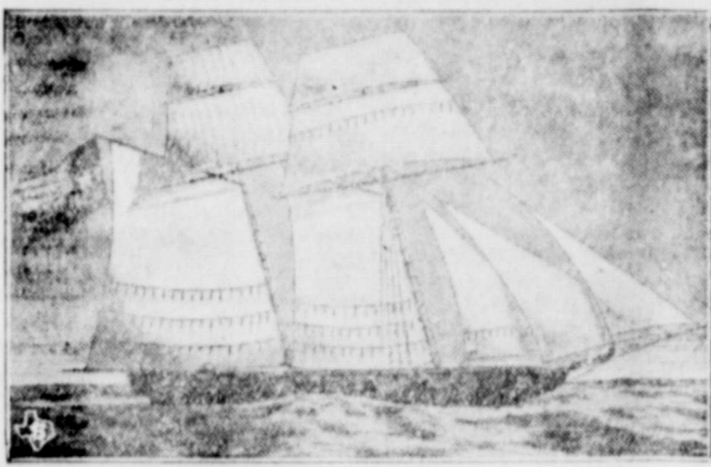

### TEXAS HISTORY IN THE MAKING No. 4—The Story of the Texas Navy



—Think—Talk—Write—Texas Centennial in 1936—  
The Texas Navy played an important part in the state's history. Early in 1836, before independence was declared, the Texas governor and council authorized privateers to harass the Mexican coast in the name of Texas, and these prevented the landing of Mexican soldiers and supplies on the Texas coast. By the end of 1836 the Texas Republic had a navy of four vessels—the Invincible, Brutus, Liberty and Independence—but in 1838 one had been sold, two wrecked and one captured by Mexico. In June, 1840, five Texas ships and 71 men, in alliance with Mexican revolutionists captured Tobasco on the Mexican coast, levied a \$25,000 tribute and with the money were able to remain at sea another 10 months. The above picture is from an old painting of the good ship San Antonio one of the three ships with which Texas blockaded the Mexican coast in 1841 as a punitive measure after Mexico had made raids along the Rio Grande. An act of 1844 ordered all Texas vessels put out of commission and in 1846 they became a part of the U. S. Navy. (Texas News Photos.)

## Funeral Directors Of This District Hold Code Meeting

A meeting of funeral directors of Runnels and Concho counties was held at the Central Hotel here Tuesday evening. D. T. Laughter, of Abilene, chairman of the 17th district, which is now known as the Heard of Texas District of the Funeral Directors and Embalmers Association of Texas, presided.

The purpose of the meeting was to bring together the members of the association in this district and explain and discuss the high points of the recently signed code of fair competition for undertakers and embalmers. Mr. Laughter spoke at length on the code and explained many points of which some of the members were not certain. He stated in part as follows:

"The code positively prohibits the offering of free service of any kind by funeral homes. Commissions cannot be given to anyone—doctors, nurses, hospitals or anyone else. Soliciting of business on the part of funeral homes is also expressly prohibited by the code."

After discussion it was decided by the association that a minimum price of \$3 should be set for ambulance calls in the city limits. For outside the city limits the charge will be 50 cents per mile one way for the first 20 miles and 25 cents per mile thereafter.

It was also announced that the above price schedule applies to funeral car services except that a charge of \$15 applies in the city with the additional mileage cost as above on ambulance calls. Mr. Laughter stated that the above specified code rulings and prices are being practiced and any firm or person in the undertaking business violating this part of the code or any other part not listed will be subject to federal prosecution.
