WHY WE DO NOT NUMBER

We have been asked a number of times within the last few weeks why we do not number our pages and to those who have inquired we have explained. Knowing, however, that there are others who wonder why we do not and who would like for them to be numbered so that stories continued from one page to another could be found easier, we offer this explanation:

It is impossible to know how many pages we will be able to int until some time Thursday morning. This is because merchants are often late with their advertising copy and a large amount of news is gathered at the last minute in order to be up to date before publication. We cannot wait until this time to start printing the paper, however, and a part of the paper is already run. We print four pages at a time and this requires that page one and the last page in the section be made up at the same time.

We realize that in some cases it is inconvenient when the pages are not numbered because often several members of the family arrives, dividing it into sections and when a division is made it is difficult to find where a story is continued to. 





METEXAS HISTORY IN THE MAKING*

No. 4-The Story of the Texas Navy



-Think-Talk-Write-Texas Centennial in MM The Texas Navy played an important part in the state's history, Early in 1836, before independence was declared the Texas governor and council authorized privateers to harass the Mexican coast in the name of Texas, and these prevented the landing of Mexican soldiers and supplies on the Texas coast. By the end of 1836 the Texas Republic had a navy of four vessels—the Invincible, Brutus, Liberty and Independence—but in 1838 one had been sold, two wrecked and one captured by Mexico. In June 1840, five new Texas shows and 71 men. captured by Mexico. In June, 1840, five new Texas ships and 71 men, in alliance with Mexican Revolutionists, captured Tobasco on the Mexican coast, levied a \$25,000 tribute and with the money were able to remain at sea another 10 months. The above picture is from an old painting of the good ship San Antonio one of the three ships with which Texas blockaded the Mexican coast in 1843 as a punitive measure after Mexico had made raids along the Rio Grande.
