"Light is measured in terms of footcandles. One footcandle is the illumination on a surface, perpen dicular to a light source of one ordinary candle, one foot away. Outdoors on a bright day there i 10,000 footcandles of light. Under the shade of a tree is 1,000 footcandles. But indoors the highest is 100 footcandles and that next to a window. When we move away from the window the light goes lower and lower. At night the homes and offices that are considered well lighted measure from three to ten footcandles.

"Is it a wonder so many of us are wearing eyeglasses? If the people on the street wearing glasses were forced to use crutches to get around, something would immediately be done to correct the cause. Glasses are crutches to man's most valuable asset. There is a remedy

"Of course more light costs more money, but not one person in a million would take money for his eyesight. If some person were to come to you and ask you what you would take for your eyes, what would you tell him? If you use too little light or the improper light to perform your visual tasks, you are taking money for your vision voluntarily."
