Stage Plays Aid English Police To Solve Crimes

LONDON Feb 27.—Stage playlets performed by experienced actors and representing burglaries, murders, riots, street accidents, altempted hold-ups and other emergencies with which police officers may have to deal are part of the curriculum planned for the new Police Academy in London.

One object is familiarize young police officers with what usually happens at street accidents, with the methods commonly used by different kinds of criminals, and so on; something which the ordinary policeman learns only after years of experience. Another idea is to train the student officers in accurate observation and correct reporting of what they see.

Psychologists have proved by similar tests that an average dozen persons, all with normal senses and all completely honest, usually will describe a crime or any other occurrence which they have seen n a dozen different ways, somees much unlike each other.
