

ROME, May 1.-Astronomical calculations which change the dates now generally accepted for the birth and death of Christ have been published by the Italian astronomer. Prof. Domenico Argentieri.

For the mysterious Star of Bethlehem about the nature of which so many astronomers have puzzled, Professor Argentieri believes it necessary to seek a cornet. A transient meteor could not have guided the Wise Men from the East of Bethlehem. Only some bright comet, being both a rare object and one which remained visible for weeks or nonths, would have satisfied the requirements of the Bible story. It happens that in 12 and 11 B. Prohibition Vote Set for Aug. 24; 2 Plans Submitted

The first state-wide election on prohibition in 16 years will be held August 24, this year. The submission will be on the wet-dry issue first with the legislature to regulate the liquor traffic in case of a wet majority.

Included in the bill passed by overwhelming majorities in both House and Senate Wednesday is the question of a state monopoly which would be submitted at the general election in November 1936. If approved by the voters sale of liquor for private profit or in broken packages for consumption on the premises would be prohibited, except for medicinal, mechanical or scientific purposes.

A favorable vote by the people on either repeal plan would wipe out constitutional prohibition but prohibition could not be returned by a dry majority against the monopoly plan in the second election in 1936.

Road Construction In This District Moves on Steadily

Work on highway No. 109, Ballinger-to-Bronte, a relief project, is moving along steadily, about 5 miles of the grading having been opened. A crew on this route near the city limits has begun opening the new portion of the right-ofway which will connect with the north end of Broadway in Ballinger. The grade is open to the other side of the Dee Oliver farm near Valley Creek

The relief job in Concho county on highway No. 4 had been delayed for the past two weeks but this work was resumed May 1. The first base course from six miles south of Paint Rock to Eden and about three miles of the second course have been finished.

The contracted job in Concho county on highway No. 9 from Eden to the McCulloch county line is moving ahead rapidly, approximately 70 per cent of the project being completed. This contract calls for grading and drainage structures but when the grading is finished it will be an allweather road. Selected materials are being used for topping the

All drainage structures on this section of highway 9 are of the culvert type but one is more than 100 feet long. The construction is of concrete and steel and will take care of flood water without interference to traffic.
