## Uncle Sam Provides Alaskan Haven for Stranded Midwestern Farmers

A NEW "rush" to Alaska is under way.

This time, however, the ture is not gold, but a living earned from the soil. And the 1935 'prospectors" are not an unwieldy horde of people from every walk of life, but an orderly group of 200 brawny young American farmers and their fam-

Shutting behind them memories of months and years spent on relief, after vain efforts to make headway on drouth-stricken sub-marginal land, these mod-ern ploneers gaze into the future with high hopes.

Financed by the government, they are making a fresh start, each with a 40-acre farm, in Alaska's fertile Matanuska valley, 3500 miles away. Here, though winter's bliz-zards sometimes drive the mer-

cury down to 40 degrees below, and summer's mosquitoes nearly reach plague proportions, the outlook is promising.

Warm breezes from the Japanese current in the Pacific, the

daily 20 hours of sunshine during the three-month summer season, and rich soil of silt, saud, and loam, underlaid with gravel-all combine to provide excellent growing conditions. Sheltered by nearby mountains, the valley abounds in spruce and birch trees, and
