



Slowly for Bees

WASHINGTON, July 3. Why no bee farmer ever has been able to tame a bee is explained by opinions of experts of the United States government, quoted by the American Nature Asociation. It is because no bee with whom human keepers come in contact can pass on anything to the future genera-

Bee life is so organized that the workers who have human contacts leave no offspring, while the reproducing and evolving members of the bee community never have the slightest contact with human friends and masters.

Most evolutionists believe that the willingness and ability of ordinary domestic animals to live comfortably with mankind has increased gradually from century to century as a result of evolution of the animal species. The same thing might have happened among bees had any of the bees who work outside the hive been able to pass on even a tiny fraction of their experience. These bees have no descendants, since all worker bees are sterile females.

All young bees in a hive are offspring of a single queen and a single king bee, or drone, neither of whom has any outside contacts at all. Both are hidden away by the peculiar instinct of the bee deep within the hive and entirely away from contact with man or any other creature of the outside world. Presumably this complete isolation of the only bees able to continue the race resulted from some hard condition of life in past ages of evolution, so that it became desirable not to let the outside environment have the slightest influence on what future insects would be like.






