Runnels county prohibitionists are planning a big mass meeting at the Ballinger Baptist Church next Sunday morning. The occasion is the visit of Dr. F. Scott Mc-Bride, nationally known leader, who comes to Texas from Washington, D. C., for an eight-day speaking tour. He will be heard at 11 o'clock at the local church Sunday morning and every church in the city has been invited to cooperate in the service. A number have already announced that their morning service would be called off so members would have an opportunity to hear the speaker.

Dr. McBride will also speak at the Miles Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 and will go to San Angelo for an evening engagement.

The speaker is brought to Texas by the Texas League Against Whisky and is being furnished towns without cost other than travel expenses which are taken care of with free will offerings.

The address here Sunday morning will deal with the election on August 24 at which time the repeal amendment will be submilled. For many years Dr. Mc-Bride has given time to this work and is recognized as one of the strongest national speakers in behalf of prohibition.
