



LONDON, June 12.-Television will not invade the privacy of the home, and one cannot use it surreptitiously to witness what is going on inside the house. That was the assurance given recently by the British postmaster general in a recent speech.

"I would like to reassure any nervous listeners that, wonderful as television may be, it cannot, fortunately, be used in this way," he declared. "The television service will be transmitted on ultra-short wave lengths, but the normal sound service, which is operated on medium and long wave lengths, will continue as at present. Speakers, actors and artists can be televised, and, apart from studio scenes, films will be transmitted. There seems every likelihood, also, that it will be found possible to televise certain outdoor scenes which can be brought within a compass."



Genius of Ancient Times Said to Have Divided the Year

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 .- Traces the unknown genius of ancien times who first divided the year into sixths and passed on to modern mankind the rule of sixty seconds in a minute were described by Prof. James H. Breasted, of the University of Chicago, in his recent James Arthur lecture on "Time and Its Mysteries," delivered at New York University

In the earliest days of civiliza tion in Babylonia some of the priest-scientists who kept watch of the sun and stars evidently notices either that the season repeat them selves after about 360 days or that many of the heavenly bodies come back to similar positions in the sky after about this same time.

That was the origin of the ancient year of 360 days, later discovered to be really 365 days. At about this same time the Babylonian scientists began using counting unit of 60, the basis o the so-called sexigesimal system of numbers which was used in the first system of arithmetic known and which mathematicians often praise as even better than the modern decimal system believed to have originated because men have

ten fingers. How the ancient Babylonians ever happened to think of this number unit of 60 always has been a mystery. Dr. Breasted suggests that it may have begun at first as one-sixth of a year, there being some evidence that the ancient Babylonian name for sixty, which was "shusshu," originally meant "one-sixth." On this theory, the next step would have been to divide the 360 days of the ancient year into sixths, thus giving groups of 60 days each, which soor developed into the 60 unit and which still survive after many historical vicissitudes in the modern







Genius of Ancient Times Said to Have Divided the Year

That was the origin of th ancient year of 360 days, later dis covered to be really 365 days. A about this same time the Baby lonian scientists began using counting unit of 60, the basis of the so-called sexigesimal system of numbers which was used in th first system of arithmetic knows and which mathematicians ofte praise as even better than the modern decimal system believed to have originated because men have ten fingers.

How the ancient Babylonian ever happened to think of this number unit of 60 always has been a mystery. Dr. Breasted suggests that it may have begun at first as one-sixth of a year, there being some evidence that the ancien Babylonian name for sixty, which was "shusshu," originally mean "one-sixth." On this theory, the next step would have been t divide the 360 days of the ancien year into sixths, thus giving group of 60 days each, which soo developed into the 60 unit and which still survive after many historical vicissitudes in the moder clock face.
