### Farm Relief Issue Flung Open Again With Crash of New Deal's AAA



Agricultural history was written when William Morris, upper left, Nueces county, Texas, cotton planter, received the first AAA benefit check from President Roosevelt, July 28, 1933. Like thousands of his neighboring planters, Morris was paid for plowing under every third row of his crop. For generations the mules of Dixie were taught to walk carefully between the cotton rows, but under the AAA they were steered down the middle to destroy the precious crop, up per right. Above, one of the vast western wheat fields that lay partially idle under AAA control.

plied up over the farmsteads of America, in the wake of the thunderclap that crashed the AAA to earth.

The momentous decision of the United States Supreme Court outlawing in principle and operation the entire fabric of the Agricultural Adjustment Act puts the farm problem back in the political arena for another battering. Observers agree this means only one thing - another period of uncertainty and stress for the farmer. How long it will continue, the political barometer does not yet indicate.

Only one thing can be forecast -the decision and how the New Deal and the opposition meet the situation likely will have farreaching effects on the coming presidential campaign. To a large loc of voters-the farmers-the AAA was popular. It spoke in terms of cold cash.

. . . In the meantime, while forces align, either to invoke a conattitutional amendment to revive the AAA principle, or substitute en entirely new farm program, here are some fundamental angles

of the issue: Mrs. Smith likely won't notice any difference in retail prices immediately, because taxes have al ready been paid on goods now in

THICK clouds of doubt have the grocery stores. Very soon, however, prices for food should drop to the extent of the tax which previously had been paid on them. Wholesale prices, how ever, immediately should fall to

the extent of the processing taxes. Can farmers now show a profit without benefit of the AAA? Experts disagree, but most of them believe a good many farmers could show profit if present prices were maintained.

AAA officials have always insisted that with government control removed, farm surpluses would quickly increase to a point where prices again would decline. . . .

DEMOCRATS see the possibility of a tremendous reaction in favor of President Roosevelt and the AAA, should farm prices slump and clamor for farm relief once more begin to fill the air. without adequate response from Washington

Prices of virtually all crops in creased under the AAA programs. But how much of this was due to the AAA? That also is a question of disagreement.

For example, the farmer sold his cotton at 6.1 cents a pound in 1933, before the AAA, and in 1935 it sold at 11.4 cents a pound. Hogs doubled as another example. The AAA claimed the credit. The opposition said drouth short-

farmers had received \$1,153, 053,376 in benefit payments.

Upward of \$200,000,000 in processing taxes is now tied up by the courts and in addition the government is obligated to pay \$602,000,000 which it has con tracted to give farmers under the AAA scheme.

MEANWHILE, these farmers are at liberty to disregard their contracts. If the govern-ment tried to enforce these acts, appeal to any federal court would halt such enforcement.

Finally, what of the future? Tentatively, there are three possibilities in sight as both New new farm program.

One considers organization of 48 state AAA's, financed by fed-A second considers payment of subsidies to farmers for "proper

A third plan involves adoption of some temporary form of relief, such as a domestic allotutent

Above all these is the threat of a constitutional amendment taking the entire New Deal force back to the people for a final de cision that might overside the nine high justices.


