

Pecan trees in this section are being damaged by leat worms and every person who has trees in his yard or grove is advised to keep a close watch for these worms which struck here last week and gained considerable headway.

Runnels County Pecan Growers' Association officers are assisting in the fight on these parasites. Saturday and the first part of the week an expert was here from San Angelo with a commercial spray to kill the first of this invading "army." Many local citizens listed their trees for treatment and as soon as the first spraying is finished another treatment will be given to kill the eggs and prevent future damage.
