

The sanitary program recently approved by the county superintendent and the county nursing service has been adopted by the Blanton committee and the school graded, scoring 200 points out of a possible 280.

The health nurse has launched clean-up campaign for the schools of this county and is asking each community to devote a week to this before the opening of their terms in September and October. Practically every district where a health committee has been formed has agreed to follow this plan and will hold sanitary surveys in connection.
