Ballinger Water Is Okehed by State **Health Department**

.

A recent analysis of Ballinger's city water revealed it to be pure and entirely without contamination. This report will be of interest to many because of a few cases of typhoid fever in this and nearby cities, proving that the cause here is not from city water. A report on the samples submitted to the state health department, received Monday morning by City Secretary K. V. Northington showed the supply in perfect condition so far as contamination is concerned.

August was the best business month in the history of the Ballinger water department. During the 31 days local consumers used 15,500,000 gallons of water, running up the highest bills ever mailed out on the first of the month. The lake was lowered about 18 inches below the crest, but the upper reservoir is still full and if the flood gates were opened water would run over the lower dam. There is no shortage in sight here and none anticipated. Some water has been shipped to other cities for ice making and this will continue until rains






