## Corporations And Taxes Discussed

*Choosing the Right Business Entity* was the title of the program presented to the Muleshoe Rotary Club on Tuesday at noon.

P. Stephen Patterson, P.C., from Lubbock was guest speaker and provided a slide/audio presentation on *Why Would You Want to be a Corporation.*

Patterson spoke to Rotarians on 'C' Corporations as compared to 'S' Corporations, and the various advantages and disadvantages of both types of corporations.

He said an advantage of 'S' Corporations was the Limited Liability; Business Continuity; and Ease of Transfer.

The P.C. also explained why Limited Liability is so very important for any type of business and what happens when a partner dies, and the corporation needs to continue operation.

Disadvantages included Double Taxation; necessity for Formal Operation and Complex Liquidation rules.

Under 'C' Corporation rules, Double Taxation means that when a regular corporation has income and the owner decides to take something out, he must pay taxes again.

Regular corporations *must* have regular business meetings, complete with minutes. He commented, "there will be no operating 'out of pockets' with a corporation."

Another disadvantage of 'C' corporations, he continued, is that once you get ready to get out of the coproation, it is much more complex, with a lot of paperwork.

In an 'S' Corporation, you can escape Double Taxation, and pass through income and losses.

The P.C. said that tax breaks is one of the major reasons for forming an 'S' corporation.

'S' corporations also have a lot of fringe benefits, he added.

Each of the school board members and administrators thanked Williams-Jacobson for her hard work and dedication.

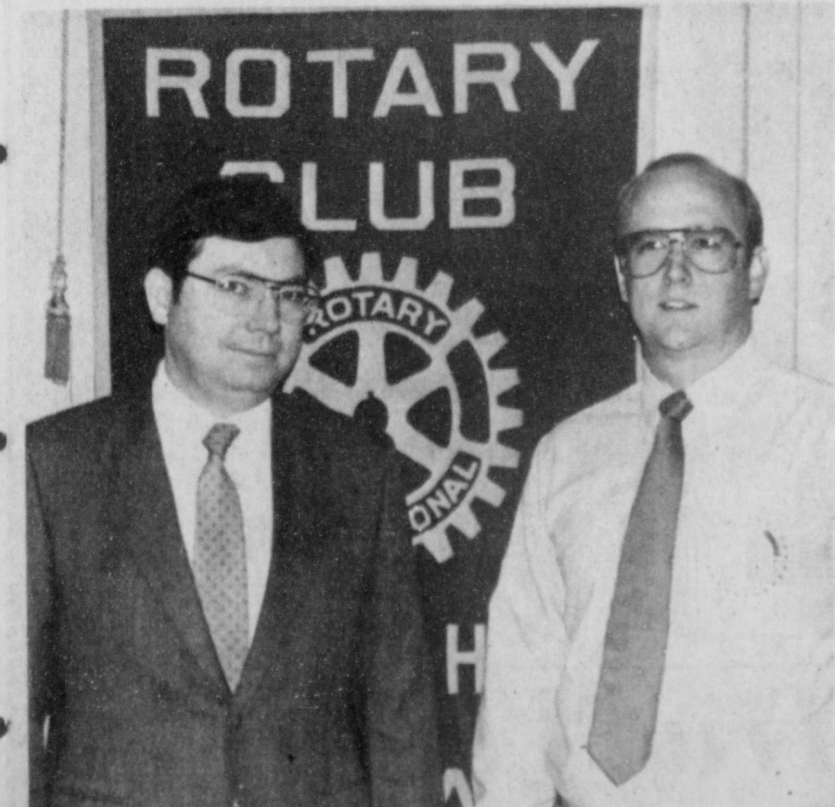
Cindy Purdy, school board president, said, "Cleta is dedicated to the schools and the children. We really appreciate her, and all that she has done for us."

## Watch Out For Knees

We don't usually think about our knees until something goes wrong with them. But when a "problem knee" causes discomfort and interferes with normal activities, we suddenly realize how important our knees are.

A problem knee can occur at any age and any time. A blow, twist or severe injury can tear or break the knee's ligaments and cartilage, especially in sports like football, basketball or skiing. The knee can be sprained when it is asked to do more than it is conditioned to do, as in the case of the "weekend warrior." More severe injuries can occur when sufficient force is applied, for example a car or motorcycle accident.

According to Debbie Thornton, director of Physical Medicine at Methodist Hospital, pain and loss of motion are the most common complaints in knee injuries. Swelling immediately following an injury can be due to bleeding inside the joint and should be examined by an orthopedic surgeon as soon as possible.

When an injury does occur, ice, elevation and immobilization of the injured leg will minimize the pain and prevent further injury until it can be examined in the Emergency Department.

After your doctor determines

the activity of your injury and puts you back on the road to recovery, Thornton suggests following these tips to avoid further injury.

•Check with your doctor for any persistent knee pain, swelling or if you have any questions.

•Use medication as directed by your doctor and ask him what activities to avoid after your injury and/or surgery.

•If you're out of shape, your muscles surrounding your knees probably are, too. Before you return to strenuous activities, such as weekend sports, protect your knees with a preconditioning and ongoing exercise program. Remember to stretch your muscles before engaging in your activities.

•Avoid activities that regularly irritate your knee, for example squats and stair climbing, and consult your orthopedic surgeon to determine the cause of pain and swelling.

With early diagnosis and treatment, your doctor can successfully treat most knee problems. Most important is your role in maintaining knee strength and stability through exercise. It takes strong leg muscles to have strong knees!

# Organ Donation Explained To Jennyslippers

"Money can't buy what you get with a gift of life" Sylva Zella, R.N., B.S.N., C.N.R.N., regional coordinator for the LifeGift Organ Donation Center of West Texas, said in speaking of organ and tissue donations, at the Jennyslipper meeting Tuesday night. "Anyone can become a donor who has made his wishes known to his family. Advanced age or history of disease does not necessarily mean that someone cannot donate organs or tissue. LifeGift

will accept organs and tissue from donors up to the age of 70.

A number of people's lives can be saved from one donor at no expense to the donor's family. There are 26 organs and tissue that can be donated including heart, lungs, liver, kidneys, and pancreas as well as corneas, bone skin and blood vessels."

LifeGift is the Medicare certified organ procurement organization for 69 counties in West Texas and has offices in Lubbock and Amarillo. LifeGift

also has regional offices in Houston and Ft. Worth. An organ procurement organization is responsible for coordinating the recovery of organs in its service area and matching those organs with people waiting for a transplant. LifeGift also educates the public and medical professionals in its service area about organ and tissue donation.

National Organ and Tissue Donor Week is April 21-27 and the slogan is "Talk About It". Ms. Zella encouraged everyone to talk to their families about organ donation. She stressed that at some time in their lives everyone is ask about organ donation. "When a member of your family dies, the hospital is required by law to ask the family about donating his/her organs even though you have signed a donor card, the permission of your next of kin must be received before a donation can take place." "The hospital has to ask, but the choice is 'Yours' and your choice is not necessarily right for everyone."

Lubbock has two transplant centers, with 28 on the waiting list for kidneys. It is hoped that heart transplants will be made in Lubbock in the near future.

Ms. Zella is a registered nurse and is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and her salary is paid by Medicare.

The following is a news release from the LifeGift Organ Donation Center:

Study reveals families who donate the Organs/Tissue of a deceased loved one find coping with the death easier.

Families who decide to donate the organs of a deceased loved one find coping with their loss somewhat easier even when the loss is their child, according to the results of a survey of donor families.

A sample of 242 donor families conducted by Jerry Protas, PhD, and Helen Levine Batten reveals that the long held perception that being able to donate the organs of a loved one does help families in their grieving process is true as 79 percent responded that it had helped. And, perhaps equally as important, 89 percent said that they would make the same decision again if faced with the situation.

The study, which was con-

ducted for the Health Care Financing Administration, paints a compelling picture of the donor family, what is important to them after they have been asked to donate the organs of their loved one, and the donation process itself. (Protas and Batten are associated with the Bigel Institute for Health Policy. The Heller School, Brandeis University and first reported their findings in the Summer of 1987, issue of Health Affairs.)

More than 70 percent of the respondents were the parents of donors, over half the donors themselves were under 21 years-of-age and nearly 75 percent died violently, by accident or suicide, the researchers found. The request for the families' consent to donate was made to 60 percent of the respondents within 24 hours, a majority made the decision to donate within one hour and virtually all within one day.

The researchers reported most of the families had comprehension difficulties because of the rapidity of the events and yet they found that 40 percent were willing to donate without fully understanding brain death.

"It is striking that the decision to donate is not limited by most difficult aspect of the process," Protas and Batten report. "Families will donate before coming to terms with their relative's death without its emotional acceptance may, in fact, be what makes the donation possible at all...that almost 40 percent of families permit donation while still finding brain death a difficult concept speaks to high level of trust in the medical system. For these family members, a firm declaration of death suffices; understanding how the physician came to that determination is not essential."

The importance of the role of the physician was also underscored. The doctor raised the question of donation with nearly half of the families and were reported to be not influential in the decision to donate in almost 30 percent of the cases.

When Protas and Batten asked about problems the families encountered with the donation process answers fell into three categories: the timing of when the approach was made, lack of feedback about what happened to the donated organs in the weeks immediately following the donation and administrative problems connected with the donation.

The researchers noted that there may well be on perfect time to make the approach and that no reform can alleviate the problem but urged coordinators to establish a regular system of feedback and to improve their

handling of administrative matters such as financial and funeral arrangements.

In conclusion Protas and Batten note: "Our findings indicate that the family frequently benefits psychologically by organ donation-in their own estimation. Those families who sought to redeem something from the tragedy were also the respondents who reported that organ donation had made coping with their loss somewhat easier. Families who want solace from organ donation can find it, and further a well-conducted organ procurement process can help them.
