NEW AVIATION CORPS PLANNED IN BRITAIN

LONDON, Dec. 2.-To increase the present reserve of fully trained pilots for the royal air force, a special category of reserve pilots will be established.

When they have finished civil school training, these reserve pilots will be appointed acting pilot officers and will be eligible for full service after twelve months of service, receiving pay appropriate to their rank. They will pass through the same course of train ing required of pilots of the regular air force, lasting approxi mately twelve months.

When they have been trained they will revert to civil life to complete their reserve service. In this respect the plan differs from that for the R. A. F. volunteer service, which is primarily to provide less intensive training under with civil occupations.

Santa Fe Announces To Spend \$20,000,000 On New Equipment

Convincing evidence of the Santa Fe's confidence in the continued upturn of business was December 1 by M. J. Collins, general purchasing agent, of orders in excess of \$20,000,000, for new freight cars, locomotives, rails and rail fastenings. That company's order for rails, tie plates, angle bars, bolts and spikes was for 155,000 tons at an approxi mate cost of \$6,135,000, the largest order placed for steel rails and fastenings since 1929 by any railroad. The bulk of the order went to the Colorado Fuel & Iron Com pany, Carnegie Illinois Steel Company, Inland Steel Company and Bethlehem Steel Company, with a number of other steel companies participating. The equipmen order included 3,025 new freight train cars costing \$10,183,925 and 27 locomotives costing \$3,985,000, a total of \$14,168,928 for ears and locomotives, making a grand total of the combined order for rail and equipment of \$20,303,925. The equipment order includes 1,500 100,000-pound capacity box cars which will be constructed by the Pullman Standard Car Manufac capacity box cars which will be capacity refrigerator cars; 500 80,000-pound capacity refrigerator cars, and 325 140,000-pound capawhich was awarded to the General American Transportation Co. Of the 27 locomotives, 17 will be streamlined, high-speed passenger engines primarily for service between Chicago and the Pacific Coast. Eleven will be of the 4-8-4 type with 80-inch driving wheels and six of the 4-6-4 type with 84inch driving wheels. The boilers will be of nickel steel construction. 


