

TEXAS COTTON MILLS USE MUCH LINT IN DECEMBER

AUSTIN, Feb. 3 .- Consumption of cotton in ten Texas mills during December totaled 5,326 bales, an increase of 16.8 per cent over the preceding month and 102.1 per cent over the corresponding month last year, the University of Texas bureau of business research has reported. Cloth produced totaled 5,720,812 yards, increases of 20.8 per cent and 65.6 per cent respectively over the preceding month and December, 1935, while sales, 6,187,986 yards, were up 12.9 per cent and 131.9 per cent respectively.

Unfilled orders on December 31 totaled 21,075,638 yards, an increase of 12.6 per cent over November 31 and 200.6 per cent over December 31, 1935. For the entire year 1936 cotton consumed, cloth produced, and quantity sold increased 99.3 per cent, 31.5 per cent, and 78.8 per cent respe tively.
