JAPANESE MINISTER ASKS LOWER AGE FOR ARMY

TOKYO, April 21.—Lowering of the age at which youths shall scientific discoveries or developments being hurried from the laboratories to make the New York World's Fair unusual navy is under consideration by military and naval chiefs.

The present age is 20. Reduction to 19 or 18 is proposed by the ministry of education. 

"One of the films we saw showed the criminal walking about, lighting a cigarette, writing a letter and stooping to pick up something. We were shown a 'close up' of him as he answered questions. We were also able to hear his voice.

"But I am afraid we could not possibly adopt such a system over n England. Prisoners here are not allowed to be questioned. But the American idea is an interesting ex-
