



Istanbul, Turkish City, Founded by Constantine

Two years after Constantine founded the city once called Constantinople, he made it the seat of the Roman Empire in the east and officially named it New Rome to indicate its political position. But it was popularly called Constantinople to perpetuate the fame of its founder. After the capture of the city in 1453 by the Turks it became the capital of the Ottoman empire. Constantinople is really a collection of towns and villages lying on both sides of the Golden Horn and along the Bosporus. There are four general sections, however, consisting of Eyup, Istambol (the Greek section south of the Horn on the

the Horn) and Scutari. When Cromwell was in power in England the Scots feared that the crown, believed to have been worn regalia, consisting among other things of the sword of state and the mace of the Royal Treasurer, would be destroyed. They spirited the pieces away to Dunnottar cas tle and later when it was besieged the wife of a parish minister buried the articles in her garden.

At last the regalia were returned to Edinburgh castle, but kept behind barred doors and windows in the Crown room because it was feared that the sight of the pieces might rouse a rebellion. For over a hundred years they lay in an oaken chest, unseen by anyone. In 1817, however, the novelist Sir Walter Scott persuaded the authorities to let him open the chest, and to the great rejoicing of the Scots, the regalia were found intact and later put on exhibition.



Gourds were long known and freely used by American Indians from Florida to Mexico. Along the Rio Grande, they are grown by Pueblo Indians, who prize them as household utensils.

The dipper, Hercules club, serpent or snake gourd and many others require the long growing season to which they became accus-tomed in the countries of their ori-

The largest growing, best known members of the gourd family are pumpkins and squashes. Since they have strong growing vines that travel far they are usually grown in cornfields as farm crops.

Many curious qualities and characteristics have been attributed to the fruits and seeds of gourds. That the ancients were familiar with them is proven by references in many herbals and plant books centuries old. One of them, the herbal of Dr. Lonicerus published in 1558, lists an even dozen of cucumis and cucurbitas. Medicines prepared from them

were supposed to cure many human ills. Nearly all of them were looked upon as remedies for bladder ailments. Others were credited with qualities to purge the system of poisonous substances. Melon juice mixed with bean flour was supposed to be a good complexion remedy.

Quinine's Discovery Is

Credited to Peruvians When the Spaniards reached Peru and fell ill of fever, the natives swore to save their country by not making known their cdre for malaria, realizing the disease would kill off their enemies.

For centuries the Peruvian Indians had fought and conquered malaria, the "great sickness," with a powder made of the healing bark of the "holy trees."

Yuma, a beautiful Indian girl, became the companion-maid of the Countess Chinchon. The countess fell ill of fever and Yuma gave her a native medicine in powder form. She was accused of trying to poison the countess and was con-demned to be burned alive in the great square of Lima. But meanwhile the countess recovered and Yuma was set free.

So enthusiastically did the countess speak of her recovery and its cause that the bark was known as "Countess' Powder," long before it had a scientific name. This, ac-cording to Drug World, is the beginning of our knowledge of quinine which, besides being a positive specific for malaria, is used to treat more than twenty diseases.

Memorial to Captain Cook On Kealakekua Bay, Hawaii island, stands an obelisk commemorating Captain Cook, who was slain near that point by natives. In 1928 a bronze tablet was dedicated in his honor and placed just below the surface of the water to mark the exact spot where he fell.





Legends About Salt Are Traced to the Ancients

There are almost as many salt superstitions and legends as there are stories of bread, says the Mon

a person is not worth his salt and that it is bad luck to spill salt, bu and from it evaporate their own sal and by their ability to prepare th salt their value as salt workers

The spilling superstition may have come to us from the Arabs or from what causes the bad luck. In the Hebraic language, "salty" is synon der the ground barren and the city to spill salt was bad and from that has come the modern superstition

On the other hand, among the Far it is easy to understand how the spilling of salt would be construed as an unfriendly gesture and would lead to the superstition that such an accident would foretell a quarrel.

Turtle Market, Ancient Industry in New Orleans

Probably one of the most curious sights in New Orleans, La., is the turtle shops in the Old French market, notes a New Orleans United Press correspondent in the Chicago Daily News.

Every night, approximately 1,000 pounds of snapping turtles are brown upon the chopping block to be cut and sold for making stew or soup. This scene has been going on since the market was established nearly 100 years ago

The turtles, of two distinct va-rieties, the Cowan and the Logger-head, are caught in fresh water marshes north of Baton Rouge.

Fishermen patiently wade through marshes and wherever they see bubbles coming to the surface, they probe with long rods until they hook the struggling turtle. Some of them weigh as much as 300 pounds. Then begins the job of pulling them out of their holes of the mud where they have burrowed.

Once they are caught, most of the turtles are penned, frequently on shallow barges filled with water and mud. In this way they are kept alive until they can be deliv ered to the market in the winter when prices are nearly double what they are in summer

It is just a short journey for the turtle from life in the swamps to the stew pots of New Orleans.

Honey Bees' Cells

Into small hexagonal wax cells the queen honey-bee deposits eggs which will develop into worker bees (partially developed females). Into slightly larger hexagonal cells go the eggs which will become drones (males). Yet a third type of cell is prepared for the incubation of queens; it is circular rath er than hexagonal, observes a writer in the Literary Digest. The cells are made from beeswax, secreted in paired pockets on the under-side of the last four segments visible on the abdomen of the bee. Secreted wax hardens as it comes in contact with air, is used to form the marvelously precise hexagons of the comb which bee engineers ages ago developed as the strongest and least space - consuming structure known to geometricians.



"The state house in Boston, with its red brick walls and gilded bulbous dome gleaming from Beacon Hill, was, from 1800 until the co pletion of the capitol in Washing ton, the most notable public build ing in the country. In its hall representatives hangs a wooden codfish, four feet long, symbolic of the importance of cod-fishing to the

"Largest of all the capitol buildings is found appropriately in Tex-as, the largest state. Second in size only to the National capitol, it has less length, but several feet more height than the latter. Built of Texas red granite, it is topped by a Goddess of Liberty holding the 'Lone Star.'

"During the revived enthusiasm for Gothic architecture which flooded America during the 1860's and 1870's when builders adorned uses with observation towers, jigsaw fretwork and 'gingerbread' dec-oration, state houses for the most part escaped this ornamentation.

'Two striking departures from the traditional classic forms are the modern skyscraper capitols of Louisiana and Nebraska. That at 1932, was the tallest building in the

south its tower rising 450 feet.
"Visible for miles across the Nebraska plains is the 400-foot tower of the new capitol at Lincoln, rising from a square base which is 437 feet each way. The building is a copy of no other. Its symbolism is indigenous to the state and much of it is grasped only by Nebraskans. It is decorated with buffalo and pioneer panels, with designs taken from the state's flora and fauna, and from beadwork patterns of Plains Indians.


