### Magellan's Venture Was

Completed by Del Cano On August 10, 1519, Ferdinand Magellan, a Portuguese navigator in service of Spain, set sail from Seville with five ships, carrying 237 men, for the purpose of reaching the Moluccas or Spice islands by sailing to the west.

On November 23, 1520, after a year and a quarter of anxious search, notes a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer, he passed through the strait that now bears his name, and entered the Pacific ocean, across which he sailed for 12,000 miles without seeing inhabit-

Magelian was killed in a conflict in the Philippine islands on April 17, 1521, but his lieutenant, Sebastian del Cano, reached San Lucar, near Seville, in the Vittoria, the only remaining ship of the five on September 7, 1522.

The Vittoria was the first ship to circumnavigate the globe, and ac-complished the journey in a trifle over three years. It brought back 31 men.





"The Little Church Around the Corner," which is not so well known by its proper name, the Church of the Transfiguration, is located at 5 East Twenty-ninth street, New York city. It is an Episcopalian church avenue," but the corner to which its name has reference is that of Madison avenue, at the other end of the

The tradition is that Joseph Jefferson and other actors appealed to the pastor of a Madison avenue church to conduct the funeral services of an aged member of their profession. The Madison avenue minister refused, but advised the actors that there was "a little church around the corner" where they might be accommodated. 

### COMMON SALT SOLUTION WILL KILL POISON IVY

NEW YORK, July 14.-According o Prof. G. P. Van Esseltine, of the New York experiment station, the best method for eliminating poison ivy is grubbing, but chemials can be used where other plants of value are not nearby.

The cheapest method, according o Professor Van Esseltine, is to dissolve three pounds of common salt in a gallon of soapy water Sprayed on the leaves when the lants are in full growth (early June), it is usually effective. Other applications several days apar nay be necessary for a complete

If the ground near the plants is not valuable and some time can elapse before it is needed, the poison ivy can be sprayed with old lubricating oil (crank-case drainings) thinned to spraying consistency with kerosene.

### HUNGARIAN HAS PEACHES WITH ALMOND FLAVOR

BUDAPEST, July 14.—Peaches with an almond flavor are flourishing in a Hungarian nursery whose owner thanks a busy bee for the discovery. The owner thinks he will be able to place the peaches on the market soon.



Roy Capps, Mason county ranchman, said Barfield had offered to sell him 92 head of sheep, presumedly the same that the Ringers bought, in San Angelo in December. Other witnesses heard yesterday included Jimmy Martin, Kimble county ranchman, who declared it was not unusual for sheep to be hauled at night; and Jim Barron, Tom Green county ranchman, who said that he sold the Ringers 150 lambs last fall


